## BROTHER SISTER LET ME SERVE YOU

*Dear Friends,*

**As I head off on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> July for another Ordination of a fellow TISEC Student, I am reminded of this article which I wrote last year for our local newspaper. I believe that we all need to be reminded of its message from time to time. And may I add my Best Wishes to Vera as I cannot be with her on her birthday because of the Ordination, but I will see her on Sunday 4<sup>th</sup>. Happy 100<sup>th</sup> Birthday Vera!**

Over the last three years of my training, I have had the great pleasure of attending a number of Ordinations in various parts of Scotland. These were the ordinations of fellow students who had become more than just that, they had become like brothers and sisters to me. It is interesting that one of the most frequently used hymns at services like these is “Brother Sister Let Me Serve You” and often this hymn and its words are in my mind. The words of this hymn are not only meaningful and relevant to those entering ministry, but

they speak to everyone who is a Christian and who wants to lead a life following the example of Jesus. In our interactions with each other, at home, at work and in our church communities, it is not just the “servant” part of our lives that is important, but also having the grace to receive from others. For some people, this is the hardest part, to let someone “be my servant too.” Sometimes parents are so caught up in their busy lives, providing for their children and looking after them that they have no time for themselves, time to relax and be refreshed. This is a time when receiving from others is often very difficult. Taking time out for ourselves is often seen by us as a luxury we cannot afford. For Jesus, from the time of his calling of the disciples, up to his death at Calvary and his resurrection, there was very little time to be by himself, to relax and be refreshed. And yet, no matter how busy he was, Jesus always made time to pray to his Father. He would go up to a high place, into the mountains and he would connect with his Father God, who gave him refreshment. Jesus, the servant of others, received with grace the encouragement, the support and the love that enabled him to carry on serving others. At the heart of that refreshment was prayer, a connecting with God, and prayer should also be a

# Readers' Talks Broaden Horizons

**Turning the Page was the first ever Scottish Episcopal Church National Readers' Conference held over the weekend of 7<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> May.**

This had never happened before: Episcopal Church Readers from all over Scotland gathered for a weekend conference.

We became aware, as the weekend progressed, that we had so much to share and learn from each other. Our horizons were suddenly broadened to give us a Scotland-wide perspective of the ministry of Readers in the SEC. Many of us had never met before, and for most of us our knowledge was confined mainly to our own diocese.

There were 52 Readers present, about half the total. We were blessed by the presence of the Primus, Rt Revd David Chillingworth, and Rt Revd Bob Gillies, Bishop of Aberdeen and Orkney, plus several clergy who act as Wardens of Readers in their dioceses.

We all became aware of the major resource for ministry represented by the Readers, with their combination of theological training and lay perspective and experience. Readers as a body are able to give valuable input into the development and decision-making of the SEC, and this gathering was able to begin that process.

The conference included many valuable workshops on different aspects of Readers' ministry.

I learnt much about ministry to older people and about bereavement and funeral ministry, both relatively new topics for me. We also had reports on Readers' ministry in other denominations and in the Church of England. The highlights for me, though, were the address from the Primus and the Bible teaching from Dr Christina Baxter.

The Primus spoke of the opportunities for growth that go with being a numerically small

denomination, and the opportunity for Readers to model the ministry of the laity. The church grows on its margins, and Readers are well placed to work there.

Christina Baxter gave us many insights from Luke 24, and here are three of them:

- The story that the travellers to Emmaus told Jesus turned out to be his story;
- we need to be serious about understanding Jesus in the light of the whole Bible; and
- we need to accept the hospitality of strangers, so we can extend the hospitality of Christ to them.

# ‘Amazing’ World Missionary Conference

**This year, the world church celebrated the centenary of the World Missionary Conference, held in Edinburgh in 1910 with another conference: ‘Edinburgh 2010’. Sandy Montgomerie reports on the closing celebration on 6 June in the Church of Scotland’s Assembly Halls on the Mound.**

The place was filled with delegates from around the world and we experienced an amazing celebration of the world church gathered here in Scotland. It certainly was a much broader and colourful church than had been at the previous missionary conference in Edinburgh 100 ago.

As the people gathered, a choir from several African congregations in Edinburgh sang in full national dress colouring the hall and drawing us to the celebration that was before us.

Experiencing this African music inspired the gathering to stand up at one point and join in the celebration by following the movements and singing of the choir.

Revd John Bell, from the Iona Community, led us in a musical extravaganza singing as God’s global family with songs from Asia, the

Americas, Europe, the Pacific and Africa.

## **No E-mail**

We listened to a dialogue of how the conference 100 years ago would have reflected on the present day; one thought was how they could have organised a conference without email. Descendants and representatives of people who attended the conference in 1910 spoke warmly of how that opportunity had inspired and allowed them to see mission as a domestic responsibility rather than being imposed by colonial powers which subsequently had freed them as Christian leaders in their witness and mission within their own countries.

Then a song from the gathering that had been sung 100 years ago paid tribute to the work started by those people a century before: Through midnight gloom from Macedon.

A young Indian dance group graced us with some beautiful worship through dance and using this medium danced out the gospel reading for us from John 4.1-30 (‘A Samaritan woman came to draw water...’).

We were given time to share with our neighbour in what we had heard and sung and how the church should be witnessing today and what resources and insights are needed to carry out that witness.

The Most Revd Dr John Sentamu, Archbishop of York, based his address on ‘the valley of the dry bones’ from Ezekiel 37.1-14. ‘Can these bones live?’

He offered encouragement to exercise loving hospitality towards others and humility in Christian outreach and his voice echoed with an evangelising passion that recalled preachers of the past who spoke in the same space.

# Young peacemakers visit from Holy Land

**A CHANCE for young people to meet teenage peacemakers from Israel and Palestine is offered in Scotland by Windows for Peace (UK).**

The organisation works with Windows—Channels for Communication in Israel and Palestine to promote dialogue and understanding amongst Jewish, Muslim and Christian young people.

The young people (aged 13-15) work together with media and art to promote mutual understanding and reconciliation between the two communities. They run a media programme for young people; publish Windows

magazine in Arabic and Hebrew, written by and for 12-14-year-olds; and mount art exhibitions which present the visions of Israeli and Palestinian children on war and peace and dreams for the future.

Sixteen young people from Jenin, Tel Aviv and Nazareth are visiting Edinburgh in July.

# Floral Celebration for Buddies' New Building

**A Festival of Flowers at Paisley's Holy Trinity & St Barnabas takes place this August, as part of celebrations to mark the completion of its new building.**

From 27 to 29 August, enthusiasts from all over Scotland are expected to visit the exhibition which is inspired by the river that runs through the heart of Paisley town centre.

The River Cart was once the lifeblood of Paisley and a source of water for the weavers, factories and breweries. It continues to play an important role even today, just like the congregations of Holy Trinity & St Barnabas who have supported the less fortunate people within Paisley and the surrounding area for the last 190 years.

In 2002, however, it became clear that the well-utilised church halls, constructed in 1823, were in a very poor state of repair. It was also clear that they were not large enough to accommodate the demands from the community. Furthermore, the town-centre location had always meant that there was a much higher demand for their use than they could actually support.

So the congregation took action and launched a project to raise £750,000 to help replace the existing church halls with bigger and better facilities. The plan was to include more flexible and up-to-date meeting spaces for the range of community groups that already relied on Holy Trinity & St Barnabas. But the congregation also wanted to make sure they had extra space so they could help some of those groups that had been turned away in the past due to limited resources.

The project was called Pilgrim Buddies; 'Pilgrim' because it speaks of a journey that people make together towards a common goal, and 'Buddies' because it identifies with the

Paisley people. Saint James is also the patron of Paisley and his symbol, the shell, is the symbol of pilgrimage.

The new halls—named Bishop Court—opened in April and are already serving the community. Their design has drawn on history, the environment and natural materials to make the spaces as comfortable and uplifting as possible.

The congregation have already been able to extend the use of the facilities and are looking forward to holding a series of events at Bishop Court in the months ahead. Top of the bill is the Flower Festival which should extend the reach of Holy Trinity & St Barnabas even further, beyond the local community and into the heart of Scotland.

Under the theme '**Where the Cart rins rowin to the sea by mony a flower and spreading tree**', the festival will be open on Friday 27 August (11am-4pm), Saturday 28th (10am-4pm) and Sunday 29th (1pm - 4pm). Entrance costs £5, which includes refreshments. Holy Trinity Church & St Barnabas is in St James Street, Paisley.

**‘Imagine 2010’ was Girlguiding Dunbartonshire Centenary birthday party, held over the weekend of 11th-13th June at Auchengillan Scout Camp just above Blanefield. Dunbarton Guide County covers an area from Helensburgh and the Roseneith Peninsular in the west to Kilsyth in the east, running around the north of Glasgow. In total we have about 3000 members—from Rainbows to adult leaders.**

## Immigrant Mums Work on Parenting Skills with MU

**The secret to talking boys into eating vegetables was just one of the mysteries unveiled when Mothers' Union parenting facilitator Ann Cook (right) was invited to work with a group of overseas mums who are new to Scotland.**

The call came from Glasgow International Christian Church, part of Heart for the City, a charity with a vision of restoring and transforming cities for the glory of God. Most members are fairly recent immigrants from Africa and India, and there are many families as well as Mothers' Union members.

Hearing that MU offers parenting groups, the members asked if a facilitator could come and help them explore their parenting and discuss their problems.

Ann, whose husband David is rector at St Michael & All Angels, Helensburgh, is mother to six children, a career that must help in her role as one of four accredited parenting facilitators in Glasgow & Galloway.

Helped for some sessions by MU's Enid Scobie and Hilary Moran, she counts herself lucky to have been chosen for this mission. She found herself among a group of enthusiastic mums who approached the weekly meetings eager to explore ideas and techniques, and ready to share their experiences and advice.

She said: "We discussed when to allow children to go to the park on their own, how to ensure that the rules your family sets are adhered to and how to persuade boys to eat vegetables (answer: develop great acting skills, lick your fingers and shriek with delight



as you prepare a salad!).

"We met for seven Tuesday mornings, the presence of several small children—without exception gorgeous—only adding to the positive atmosphere.

"There was a final session with the dads (always more nerve-wracking than all the previous sessions put together!) where Hilary and I were met with great courtesy and rapt attention, and some very perspicacious questions.

"Since most parenting groups are attended by only one parent per family, a session for partners, briefly covering the main topics discussed, is invaluable, as one of the recurrent themes of all parenting advice is consistency.

"Overall, it was a very positive experience for me, and I received not only sincere thanks, but also the promise of another group to meet with."

# Silence and Tolerance Hinder Tackling Domestic Abuse

**Some progress, but an end to toleration and silence are required to make a real difference!**

**The above statement summarises the 10th year report on Scotland's Domestic Abuse Strategy as discussed at a conference in Edinburgh at the end of April.**

Since the introduction of the strategy, both the reporting and detection of abuse has improved, although police caution that domestic abuse is still vastly under reported. The extent of the problem is illustrated by the statistics for the 2008-2009. There were 53,681 incidents of domestic abuse reported Scotland. More than half of those—27,616—were reported to Strathclyde Police and included 11 homicides, 28 attempted murders, 241 serious assaults, 41 rapes and many incidents of threats, stalking, harassment, extortion and abduction.

The strategy has resulted in a change of approach by the police who have moved from treating incidents in isolation to an intelligence-led approach and by identifying times of greatest risk. This proactive approach prevents abuse taking place, protects the innocent and has resulted in more offenders being brought to justice.

The introduction of Glasgow Domestic Abuse Court with its two full-time courts, Specialist Sheriffs, Specialist Clerks of Court and Victim Advocacy Project, has proved a success along with the introduction

of Assist which coordinates a multi-agency approach that protects and places the abused person at the centre of the process.

## **Tolerated**

Despite these successes, domestic abuse is still tolerated today. The fact is one in five women in Scotland will experience abuse in her lifetime. The rape conviction rate is at a 25-year low; and 25% of girls reported physical partner violence in a recent NSPCC survey. Although women are at the greatest risk of domestic abuse, men and members of the LGBT community are also victims and survivors of domestic abuse.

Witnessing abuse of one's parent (usually the mother) is abusive to children, but domestic abuse also carries with it the risk of actual child abuse. The barriers to children disclosing abuse mirror those of adults—fear of not being

believed, not wanting to worry people, fear of repercussions for themselves or the non-abusing parent, and concern about unwanted interventions.

A representative from the faith communities quoted a survivor of abuse who expressed the view that ‘the church seemed almost the last place for honest sharing of pain and vulnerability—the violence is IN the silence’. The silence in the place that should offer sanctuary was causing destruction to her soul.

There was a call for people in authority to correct bad theology and teachings which can be used to justify abuse. There was also a call for faith communities to show willingness to work with other agencies involved in domestic abuse and to walk alongside victims, survivors and perpetrators so that the needs of all are placed before the grace and healing power of God’s transforming love.

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
## St Cyprian's Communication Network


