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

From the Rector



Dear Friends,

I sat down to write this letter just after arriving back from our holiday on the Isle of Lismore—a 50 minute ferry ride from Oban. And a good holiday we had! However, the day we came back was a bit wild. The wind was blowing, the sea was covered with white horses as the swell whipped down the Firth of Lorne. We arrived to get the ferry back to the mainland several minutes before it arrived. We were lucky—or unlucky—to see it turn up!

The ferry carried a maximum of 5 cars, although our return journey had a lorry with a load of gravel and just two cars jammed onto it. It has a flat front, which doubled as the loading ramp. As it appeared, it looked a pretty wild journey. The waves were crashing into the front of the ferry, the ferry was going up and down in the sea, and water seemed to be spraying all over, and sometimes appearing even to swamp the ferry. We dreaded the return journey, a dread made all the worse by how we had to get the car onto the ferry. We had to reverse it down a steep slipway, then up the narrow entrance to the ferry where the sea was swilling over the ramp. It did not bode well!

So, was the journey back bad? No! Quite

the opposite! The return journey was with the wind—going in the same direction as the wind and swell. There was hardly any up and down. No water being splashed onto the deck. And no feeling of the wind blowing. Even better—the journey took 10 minutes less than it should have.

The journey from the harbour looked frightening, but the reality was wonderful!

For many people, looking from the outside, the Christian faith can seem like that. Frightening. Many people watch, because they believe that to get involved with God, and with Jesus, and with the Holy Spirit is a frightening thing. What will I have to do? How will I have to behave? What will be expected of me. It is the same with scripture. If I start reading it, or dealing with it, will it ask things of me that I cannot deliver, or will hurt me? Will it challenge things that I hold dear? People look from outside, believing a poor caricature of what scripture is, rather than dealing with scripture itself. And because of the fear, they remain watching.

When we saw the ferry arrive we both thought—blimey, I don't want to get on that! Perhaps we should stay on the slipway! But we had to get home, or else we wouldn't have got back to take the services on the Sunday!

For too many people, they get an

We receive no Government funding for what we do. Instead, we are reliant on fantastic people like you, local businesses, churches and charitable trusts to sustain and grow our work.


The money you raise will help us to: reconnect with people on the brink of collapse; to show them there is hope for their future provide for immediate needs such as food,

Through new eyes

looking at the locale by a recent incomer!

“You’ve got to see the Burrell Collection.” Any discussion of what is good to see as a newcomer to the area always ended up there—“You’ve got to see the Burrell Collection.” So on Bank Holiday Monday we did, and first impressions were very good—it was set in a beautiful country park, it is free to get in and the parking only cost a quid!!!!

So what did I think of it? Well, to be frank—utterly amazing! I will certainly return.....

Remarkably the “big name” articles I found rather underwhelming. There may have been a Rembrandt, but it wasn’t his best! And Rodin’s “Thinker” was a lot smaller than I thought it would be, and frankly, for me, was second fiddle to an amazing Epstein Sculpture next to it. Burrell was known for his collection of rugs and textiles, but again I was rather underwhelmed by them. As I was by the painting collection by Degas. Having said that—opinions vary, and Lucy and the friend who went with us had very different opinions (they would probably say opposite opinions!)

Having said that, there were many amazingly beautiful things, many of them created by people we will never know and will never be known—and were probably barely known except by their families and friends when they were alive.

Top for me was the Chinese Ceramics—particularly the older more simply decorated pots and plates. Then came the medieval stained glass windows. There were the medieval church items—plaques and silver. And the furniture was stunning.

Having visited the Burrell collection I was left with three thoughts.

Firstly, I felt overwhelmed by all the

beauty. There was so much of it that I found overwhelming.

Second was the thought that if that was less than a quarter of the whole collection, what other amazing things did I not see?

Thirdly, it reminded me yet again of one of my favourite quotes—a rough quote from “The Idiot” by Dostoyevsky, which says “Beauty Will Save the World.” Beauty has the capacity to lift the heart beyond what it is, to the sense of something greater. The effect the Burrell collection had was to leave me simply feeling overwhelmed by the presence of something so much greater—glory, that the individual objects themselves disappeared into their cabinets. It is the same as what meditating on Jesus does. Look at Jesus, and how beautiful he was in word and action, in the midst of a pretty grubby world, and we are in the end overwhelmed by the beauty of the love he showed us. Jesus defines beauty for me, and truly when our hearts are moved by the beauty of Jesus it comes true—“Beauty will save the world.”

On a more practical note, I hope people don’t think I spend all my time reading books by Dostoyevsky, although he was a remarkable Russian Theologian who wrote almost all of his theology into novels, something I did in a much simpler and much less famous way in the novel I wrote! However, I didn’t get the quote from reading Dostoyevsky! There is a Serbian Tennis player called Janko Tipsarevic (second best Serbian tennis player to Novak Djokovic) who had won a match at Wimbledon and was being interviewed on the telly. The final question he was asked? What does that tattoo on your arm mean (it was in Chinese script). His reply? “Beauty will save the world!”



Farewell to Prim Parry



Prim died at the end of April and her funeral was held at St. Cyprian's on 2nd May. It was very well attended, which we hope will be a great comfort to Eric. More recently, on 23rd June, her ashes were interred in the Garden of Remembrance in a quiet ceremony after the 10.30am service.

I'm sure our prayers are with Eric at this time, and it is great to share fellowship with him in the life of the church again, after the burden of caring for Prim has been removed.

Below is a slightly edited version of the address given by Moira at the funeral highlighting some of her own memories of Prim.

Prim's parents were Nellie and Neville and her sister is Christine. She first met Eric at a Sunday School Party held at All Saints, Bromsgrove where Prim was one of the helpers and Eric was invited along by a friend.

Eric was only 14 at the time and Prim was a few years older. They became friends and kept in touch and later they began courting, as it was known then.

Eric and Prim were married on 22nd April 1957, which, by the way, was Easter Monday—a fact which didn't go down too well with some of the guests who had to travel to Bromsgrove for the wedding.

Prim began her working career as secretary in the Premises Department of Lloyds Bank where she worked until Denise was born. She then gave up work until Adrian was older and at school and returned to work as a secretary, but this time for a printing company, Copywright, which published quite a number of church magazines.

When Eric and Prim finally settled in Kirkintilloch, Prim once again found employment as a school secretary at the then Middlemuir School for senior pupils who had behavioural problems. When this unit was finally moved to another location, Prim went to work for Harestanes Primary and then Merkland School. Prim finally retired from work at the age of 67, which I think, shows great dedication to her secretarial work.

The Prim that I like to remember always had a cheery word for me as I came into church or as I sat beside her at a church event. She would be ready with a hug when I visited and loved to tell me stories of her grandchildren Emily, Shannon and Shareen, showing me photographs which I loved to see. In the early years when Sandy and I moved to Lenzie and began to attend St. Cyprian's, I remember that Prim was very creative and always had a sewing project or knitting project which she was in the middle of.

The Ladies Work Party was one of the regular groups which Prim was part of and she helped to prepare for fund-raising events, especially the Annual Christmas Fayre where

she ran the Arts and Crafts stall for many years. Prim also served on the rota for decorating the church with flowers and she helped out with the Banner-making group who produced many creative banners for the walls of St. Cyprian's. Home baking for coffee mornings also kept her busy and I'm sure her grand-daughter Emily will remember lots of favourite home bakes which her grandma made for her.

As you can see, Prim played a very active part in church life at St. Cyprian's and I'm sure many people here today will have lots more memories to recall, both of her church life and home life.

Later in life, Prim's health began to deteriorate and her eye sight sadly began to fail. This was a big blow to Prim as she was eventually unable to continue sewing or knitting and even worse, reading which she always loved, became impossible. Prim's mobility also began to decrease as her problems with osteoporosis increased and her eyesight dimmed and it became more and more difficult to get out to church services. However, I was pleased that Prim was happy to receive home communion and I continued to visit her and Eric in their home in Uist Drive and later when they moved into their flat at Kelvin Court.

I remember well Prim telling me about the move to Kelvin Court, which she was very apprehensive about and as the move came even closer Prim was none too happy. It took a little while for her to settle into the flat at Kelvin Court, but eventually, once the house in Uist Drive was sold, Prim accepted that Kelvin Court was her new home now.

I was also very touched and delighted that Prim was able to come along to my ordination service at St. Cyprian's, and also last August Eric and Prim were able to be in church for the wedding of my youngest son David.

Prim always loved to talk about her family and the earlier years of her married life, moving around with Eric as he changed jobs or had to travel for work. Family meant a lot to Prim and I know that she appreciated the love and care that she received from Eric and the family when her health declined.

Prim worked hard as a Secretary, mum, home-maker, and loving Grandma throughout her life and for me it was a privilege to get to know Prim over the years.

Farewell Prim, may God keep you in His care as you go to be with Him and all His faithful servants departed this life.

Amen.

It's been quite an eye-opener for me in many ways. Pictures from the "Souls of Our Shoes" exhibition are there. If you haven't seen them, they will also open your eyes to the prevalence of domestic abuse.

Also represented in the group is AMINA, the Muslim Women's Resource Centre. I was asked to add some links to their resources to the website, so naturally had a look at them. They have started the "YOU CAN CHANGE THIS" campaign to change attitudes in the Muslim community and to highlight that there is no support in their scriptures for violence against women (or against anyone else). 
