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

From the Rector




Dear Friends,

I decided to write this letter at the same time as I was thinking of booking a holiday for a few weeks time. We have always loved to holiday in Scotland – often in the Western Isles, or the west of Scotland, and it has been good coming to work up here from Manchester because it has taken off the first 180 miles and 4 hours of the driving to get to some of the great places in Scotland! When I was 8 we had a holiday in Nairn, but have never been more towards the North East part of Scotland – along by Banff, Buchan or Peterhead, so think that is where we might go this time.

One of the things I've enjoyed particularly over recent times on holiday is fishing, normally using lures off harbour walls, or rocks. Truth be told I'm not very good at it, although

one holiday I caught loads of Pollack, but they were still small and I threw them back. I dream of catching cod, or herring, or mackerel, or flounders, or dabs, but bad fishermen tend to stay as dreamers. My father came from North Devon, and he told of going fishing, with tales of people having legs broken by conger eels hiding in rocks near the coast. Apparently conger eels grow to 6 foot, and have a vicious bite – don't fancy catching one of those! More often in North Devon the standard fish to catch was the garfish – a long thin green inedible monstrosity with lots of teeth and a long thin nose!

Sometimes I wonder if Jesus smiled, or others caught the sense of humour, when he said to the disciples "I will make you fishers of men!" They were fishermen. They knew what fish looked like. If it was on the basis of beauty alone, I suspect male and female fish would never get together!!!! Fish just look odd. A lot look ugly. Some are distinctly weird. And they all look very different. Here is Jesus saying – you know what it's like catching all those weird fish – it's exactly the same with catching people. There's a lot of different looking people!

The event is called *Savour the Flavour* and it will take place in Lenzie Academy on Thursday 3rd October, starting at 6.30 and lasting approximately two hours.

This will be an evening of Fairtrade cuisine with an African twist and there will be live demonstrations of African dishes to view and to taste. There will be African music and DVDs, quizzes and recipe cards on offer, as well as the opportunity to browse and purchase Fairtrade products and produce from other associated groups.

Through new eyes

looking at the locale through the eyes of a recent incomer!

A few years ago I was very lucky to go to a theological conference in Finland, at a place called Saaksmaki, which claims to have the oldest Church in Finland – it is very beautiful, even if no-one is really sure how old it actually is. However, I remember much more, just outside the village, the suspension bridge – called Saaksmaki Bridge.

There is no doubt that Saaksmaki Bridge was not built for beauty! All the bolts used still show. The suspension wires and rods were just that! There was no sense the metal girders had their corners rounded off for aesthetic reasons. It wasn't built for beauty, it was built for strength, to stand firm through the harsh and snowy winters they have there. However, it was beautiful. The industrial with the natural, in that spot, was absolutely wonderful.

Each of us see different types of building as beautiful. For some it is old houses, or castles. For others it is modern buildings (half the charm of the Burrell collection, for example, is the building in which it is housed). For others it is churches. But for me, I particularly like industrial architecture, represented by that bridge in Finland.

Every so often, I give Lucy a lift over to Shettleston. We drive through Stepps, then along Avenue End Rd, before heading down into Shettleston. Just off Avenue End road are two “industrial” buildings I love. They were built for very functional reasons, with no attempt to look good. They are water towers. To me they are fantastic. One of them is even lit up underneath at night with changing colour lights – so perhaps I'm not the only one who likes them! They may have been built to be

functional, but in their patterns and design something quite beautiful has been created, quite by accident!

Lenzie and Kirkintilloch have much that has the same effect. The canal has produced its share of beautiful industrial architecture. Deliberately made “industrially beautiful” is the Falkirk Wheel, which is something special. Personally I particularly enjoyed the tunnel behind the wheel, which was made to be functional. Closer to home there are lots of little gems. The little bridge under the canal at Harestanes is bonny. The canal bridge just up from the East End is attractive. The triple bridge in Luggiebank Park is impressive. Even nicer is some of the architecture generated by the railway. The footbridge over the station. The road bridge under the station. I often wish I had seen the Spider Bridge across Woodilee – the photos of it suggest it was wonderful.

Perhaps the one difference about industrial gems is you have to look for them, and have a mind switched into the idea that there is beauty in all sorts of places where you may not expect it.

Themes like finding beauty in ugliness always remind me of something else! For me it is the cross.

The cross was ugly. What happened there was brutal and horrible. How a man was so brutalised is beyond imagining. And yet in the very middle of the cross there is an infinite beauty, if only we can see it, if we can look for it. In the midst of the cross was a man who said about the people who created the infinite ugliness of the end of the man called Jesus: “Father forgive them, they don't know what they are doing.”

140th Anniversary Celebrations


The celebrations were brought to a climax during the weekend nearest our Patronal Festival when, on the Sunday, the Bishop came to celebrate and preach. This was followed by a party in the Hall and the cutting of the anniversary cake by Nancy Hogg.

Les had written to many former members and it was lovely to have quite a number of them join us for the service and the party.

Les had also written to as many churches dedicated to St Cyprian as he could find and has received a number of replies wishing us well and congratulating us on reaching our 140th anniversary. On the Saturday, the church had been open as part of the East Dunbartonshire Doors Open Day and at the same time we had our most successful Car Boot Sale ever, with around £600 added to church funds.

The anniversary party was the last event to



be held in the Hall before work started on rebuilding the east wall. You can see in the picture on the left below the bulge in the wall that made the work necessary and why we have had internal supports to take the weight of the roof off this wall. At the time of writing, the wall has been demolished and a new and more substantial timber-frame structure built. The new wall will be finished with an all-brick external leaf on a new foundation. We expect to be back in the Hall in good time for the Christmas Fayre.

The work will put a big dent in our finances, so if you are able, we would much appreciate any additional financial support you can offer in the future.

My dear brother in Christ,

I send you greetings on behalf of Saint Cyprian's, North Adelaide, South Australia, as you celebrate your patronal festival.

It was a delight to hear from you as you look forward to your 140th anniversary. This year we are 130 years old.

We celebrated our patronal festival one week early because of a particular circumstance which meant that 15 September would not work for us. You were remembered at our celebration today.

We are not a large parish (40 to 45) on an average Sunday. For most of our history we have only had a part-time priest and there has never been a parish residence – the priest has always lived in his own home or unit. We are a parish in the catholic tradition. On festivals (Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Pentecost, Saint Cyprian's Day and Christ the King) we enjoy a Sung Eucharist with incense; on other Sundays we have a sung Eucharist but no incense.

Our Church is quite small – we can

accommodate 100 in our pews. We have a spacious Sanctuary. We will be sending you a copy of our first 125 years and I expect to put that in the post in two weeks time.

I have been the part-time priest-in-charge of Saint Cyprian's for the past 3 years. On reaching the age of 70, I retired from being the Bishop of Bunbury (Western Australia) and returned to Adelaide. After a 6 month break the Archbishop asked me to look after Saint Cyprian's. It is a real joy and truly delightful to hear from another Church with the same patron.

May our Lord pour many blessings upon you as you celebrate 140 years! Saint Cyprian's, North Adelaide, greets you in the name of our risen Lord in communion with Saint Cyprian and the whole company of Christ's people in this life and in the life to come.
