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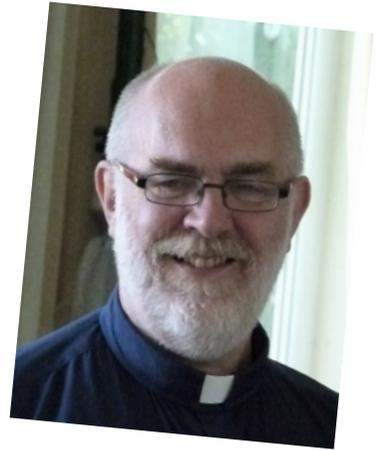

From the Rector



Dear Friends,

Often we are on the receiving end of behaviour or words which leave us upset, or hurt. We mention it to someone and their response is: it's just human nature I sometimes think a lot of difficult behaviour is justified by that phrase "it's just human nature!" The suggestion that this is perfectly normal, or what we should expect, or not be surprised by – it's human nature. Sometimes we expect better, but it was just human nature

One of my favourite programmes of the telly is called "Money for Nothing." In the programme, the presenter takes three items being thrown away at a tip, and with the help of crafts-people turn those things into something new, and extremely special. Some of the crafts-people produce absolutely amazing, beautiful things. There are a couple of young guys who took some old parquet flooring and turned it into an amazing dining table. There was another guy who took an old leather jacket and turned it into some amazing handbags.

"Money for Nothing" is a great programme. When Josh and Ollie took the parquet and made a table, no-one said – look at that old parquet flooring – they said look at

that amazing table, we'll have Christmas dinner off that! When Neil took the coat and made handbags, no-one said – look at that old coat! Everyone said – amazing handbags!

So why when someone has come to the great craftsman, the great creator and re-creator, and have been transformed into children, friends, servants, followers of God – we say look at that person who has always been the same, just someone with a human nature????? If we have been touched, welcomed by God, we should not think of ourselves as having ". just human nature." God works in us and makes us like Jesus. When we see others in church we should never think of them behaving with ". just human nature." We should think of them being transformed through the Holy Spirit into the likeness of Christ.

Our behaviour should never be ". just human nature." Our behaviour should reflect our nature as people touched by and filled with the Holy Spirit of God. And perhaps I could put it another way. We should expect Christians to behave as Christians! I hope the way I live is as someone living out the life of Christ in my daily life.

It is always dangerous talking about "living as a Christian." For two reasons:

judgementalism of people who are Christians. Along the lines of “You are not a Christian, doing that” It can lead to people watching others, and judging them as not living as Christians. That is totally wrong. None of us are God, and none of us are as good as God, and none of us are perfect! The bible is quite clear about this – all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God (Romans Ch3). And of course talks of taking the beam out of our own eyes before we take the speck out of our brother’s eye. DO NOT JUDGE OTHERS!!! That is for God.

Secondly, many people have quite a negative picture of what it means to live as a Christian. It means having to give up stuff. It means being puritanical in attitude. It means being aloof. NONE of which have any foundation in truth, but a lot of foundation in up-bringing, experience and caricature.

It is about allowing God to change us more and more into the likeness of Christ in the way we live. And a few words can begin pointing


us in the direction, and hope they are words we want to have applied to us.

Important people you may never

Robert Stephen Hawker

If you are searching for an eccentric, Hawker was one. If you are looking for a deeply compassionate man, that was also Hawker. If you are looking for a great priest, you have probably found one! And Hawker has given a legacy of one thing, specifically, to the church.

Hawker became Vicar of Morwenstow in Cornwall in 1834. Morwenstow had been in interregnum for over a century! He had been ordained three years before after studying at Oxford, and had been born in 1803 in Plymouth. He remained in Cornwall the rest of his life, dying in 1875, becoming a Roman Catholic on his deathbed.

Many different aspects of his life could be described as eccentric. His dress. In an era when all clergy dressed in Black, it was said the only thing he wore that was black was his socks! He loved bright colours, and dressed in a burgundy jacket, blue sailors jumper, a yellow poncho made from a horse blanket and pink hat! He kept many cats, and had a pet pig! He married when 19, marrying Charlotte who was 40. After she died, he re-married when he was 60 to Pauline who was only 20.

This is just the beginning of his eccentricities! He is said to have excommunicated his cat for mousing on a Sunday. He is said to have dressed as a mermaid! Much of this was apocryphal! He certainly built a hut out of driftwood on the cliffs where he wrote his poetry and letters (now the smallest building owned by the National Trust). He built a vicarage, where all the chimneys were modelled on the towers of the churches he had an association with.

I have a very small association with Hawker. As a child I loved the song (and still



do when I remember it) about the Cornish Hero Trelawney “The Song of the Western Men” with the great lines: “And shall Trelawney die? Here’s 20,000 Cornishmen will know the reason why . . .” Hawker wrote the song. (There are many versions of what is considered the unofficial Cornish National Anthem on YouTube!).

So what were Hawker’s achievements?

Locally he was known for transforming views on Shipwrecks, and sailors shipwrecked. Before he arrived, Morwenstow

have heard of

was a fairly lawless place, with many wreckers active – attracting ships onto the rock of the coast to steal cargoes, allowing sailors to die, and simply rot in the sea. Hawker fought to get rid of the wreckers, to protect sailors, to give them proper burials if dead, to try to save those whose ships naturally became wrecked on the dangerous coast. His natural compassion drove him on in these activities.

However, Hawker’s contribution to the wider church was one specific thing, which we still remember each year, and has been important in church life ever since. Hawker created the modern Harvest Festival. The first Harvest Festival as we know it was held on the 1st October 1843. There had been many

different forms of celebration of harvest before that date, but this was the first time the celebrations were taken into church. Hawker wanted to say thank you for the plenty he had received. Bread made by the first cut of corn was used for the Holy Communion. That was it – the traditional Harvest Festival was launched, and grew, and spread rapidly. The writing of hymns such as “We Plough the Fields and Scatter” was inspired.

An eccentric! A compassionate man. Hugely creative. And we remember him for one thing above all others – this was the man who was inspired to give us the Harvest Festival.

I LOVE IT !!

At our congregational day on the 10th June, we asked people what they liked about St. Cyprian's Church. I said I would collate this and write something for the magazine. I thought I would count the number of contributions, but this wasn't practical – some people wrote on one piece of paper, some on a lot of bits! So this is a flavour of what people thought!

Firstly, by far the biggest group like the sense of family, the sense of friendliness and support within the church. People expressed this in different ways. One person said: "Feels like a real family – I know everyone by name." There is, of course, a caution in this. So many churches are being so friendly with each other that they forget to be friendly and welcoming to the stranger who may appear in church, or show interest in the life of our church. Watch and welcome the stranger

Further to that, was an interesting comment from one person, which I thought was very positive: "I like the space to find our role for ourselves, not being coerced into a job/role/activity."

Perhaps the second group of "likes" was around worship. Two people actually said they liked the sermons! People particularly like the "participative" nature of our worship, with people doing readings, prayers, and having the opportunity to choose hymns. Others like the variety and rhythm of worship through the year. One even liked the wacky activities we sometimes did in worship! People liked the music in our worship.

The third group of "likes" was around the wider life of the church. People liked the concerts and carboot sales. Someone liked the catering, another liked the coffee after the morning service, and another, the social events we hold.

The fourth group of "likes" expressed was the role we play in the community. The fact our hall is so well used by community groups. The role our church has in the wider community. The fact we are simply present in the community.

The final group of "likes" was around the physical part of our church. People love the building and architecture. Some that it is a peaceful space. Some for the flowers we have in church for special occasions. One person appreciated that it was within walking distance of where they live!

This is just a snapshot of what people like. My guess is, that if people had longer they would have mentioned more things. And if those who couldn't make the meeting had been there, they too would have added to this picture.

Generally, if you ask someone what they think of something, they will tell you all the things they don't like! This is simply a reminder – we shouldn't be like that. We should remember the good – and there is a lot to celebrate at St. Cyprian's, and be thankful we are part of the life of our church.

Your Choice

In the last couple of years we have given people the opportunity to choose the hymns for our services in the autumn, and would like to offer that opportunity again this year. Anyone can do it!

You need to choose five hymns from one book. A lively one for the beginning and end. A quiet one for communion. Two others. Choose your hymns, write them down and give them to the Rector as soon as possible.

As Rector I reserve the right perhaps to change one, or swap the order around a little – although I don't think I ever have!

Data Protection

New rules about data protection came into force on the 25th May. While many people get concerned about these sorts of rules and regulations, for us this has two practical issues. “Us” in this case means the Vestry of St. Cyprian’s church, which, as trustees for the church, means the Vestry is the “Data Controller.”

Firstly, as the Data Controller, the Vestry has to make public our statement on Data Protection. We have done this – copies are pinned on the church notice boards and posted on our website. Please have a look if you want.

Secondly, we have to let you know what personal data we keep, and how we manage that data. There are two types of “lists.”

Firstly, there are lists we use for “marketing” purposes. For these lists, we have asked people who are on each of them already if they want to remain on the list, and if they have not responded “positively,” then they are removed from that list. We only have one such list which we use for advertising our concerts. It is a list maintained by the Secretary of the Vestry, and is used only for advertising the concerts we hold.

Secondly, there are lists that are used for the legitimate operation of our organisation. Anyone is welcome to unsubscribe from these lists whenever they choose by contacting the Rector of the church or Secretary of the Vestry. As far as we can identify, we have the following lists:

Electoral Role and Communicants role, which includes names and basic contact information. These are kept by the Secretary and Rector, and such information is never given out to others without the individual permission of those on the list.

We have two “round-robin” lists – for the wider church community and for the Vestry. These are E-mail contact lists,

maintained by our Secretary, and are only ever used for sharing of news and business for the running of the life of St. Cyprian’s. They can only be used by using a generic E-mail address.

We have a list of those who are part of the envelope scheme, or pay by standing order, and those who Gift Aid to the church. This is kept by our Gift Aid officer, and only used for the administration of the Gift Aid and the distribution of envelopes.

We have a list of those who are registered under the PVG scheme, kept by the Church’s Protection Officer.

We have church registers for baptisms, confirmations, weddings and funerals. These are kept in the church safe, and kept as historical documents.

Diocesan Synod

The Synod took place on 12th May having been delayed from its usual time on the first Saturday of March due to snow!

Beyond the usual business that Synod must transact, data protection as described on this page took up most time. However, there were two items that are likely to be of particular interest to the congregation. The first being the Bishop announcement that he intends to retire on his birthday this year (11th October). The second was a presentation to Beryl Scott, who turned 90 that very day. Beryl is the widow of former rector, John, who served at St. Cyprian’s in the late 80s.

This year the concert was made even more




