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

From the Rector



Dear Friends,

This summer we have seen one of the great nature spectacles that our country can manage! Each summer a few painted lady butterflies make it across the English Channel for the summer. Every ten years or so they arrive in huge numbers, in millions. It is dependant on weather patterns, wind direction, etc. The last time it happened was in 2008. And then it happened this year.

I suspect many of us have seen significant numbers of the butterflies in our gardens. I was in Glasgow by the Clyde by a mature buddleia bush. There were literally thousands flying all



over the bush. The painted lady butterfly is mainly brown and black speckled, with white spots at the end of the wing. It is really quite beautiful and totally harmless.

Perhaps the amazing thing is the huge distances they can cover – thousands of miles. Each butterfly only lives for two weeks, but as they breed on the way, so they can travel the great distances.

Having seen the butterfly, I looked up the caterpillar on Google images. He seems to be a very hairy grey and green ringed creature which particularly likes thistles and hollyhocks! The caterpillar is not beautiful!

All very interesting you might say, but what is all this doing in the Rector's letter? I mention it here because it is a pattern built into creation, built into our lives, built into the nature of God himself. The pattern where there is birth as something ordinary. Then some sort of death, then a new life comes where whatever is created is transformed from the ordinary to the amazing.

Think of it in terms of the butterfly. It is born an ordinary caterpillar, then “dies” into the pupae form, then springs into new life in the beautiful butterfly.

Think of it in terms of the seasons, the summer, goes through to autumn, goes

glory of God.



A Scottish Hymn Writer

– James Montgomery

Like many people, giving the bare outline of a life gives no sense of what a person may have been through in that life, and for James Montgomery that is particularly the case. He was born in November 1771 in Irvine in Ayrshire, dying in April 1854 in Sheffield. He never married. His life, however, was very rich.



Montgomery's parents were Moravian Missionaries. The Moravian Church was really established in Germany, but believed strongly in Ecumenism and Mission. It was the first group to send out missionaries all over the world who were not ordained, rather had secular jobs. Montgomery's parents had ended up in Irvine where James was born. Aged 7 he was sent to Fulneck Moravian College in Sheffield where he had his education and began training to be a Moravian Minister. His parents left for the West Indies. Unfortunately while there both died. Montgomery was a rebellious child, and failed to complete his education – in 1887 he ran away from the college and from the Moravian Church. When he was 43 he was received back into the church.


He went to be an apprentice to a baker and then to a store keeper. In 1792 he moved to Sheffield and worked for Joseph Gales, an auctioneer, bookseller, and owner/printer of the Sheffield Register, the local newspaper. Throughout this time Montgomery had studied – as a hobby – poetry, borrowing books as he could.

This time was also a time of political unrest, stoked by the French Revolution. Joseph Gales was rather a political hothead, upset the government and had to flee the

country, first going to Germany then spending the rest of his life in the United States. Almost by being in the right place, James Montgomery inherited the Sheffield Register, a paper he renamed the Sheffield Iris, running the paper until he sold it in 1825. Montgomery himself was imprisoned a couple of times for political writings in the paper – once publishing a poem celebrating the fall of the Bastille, once for publishing an article criticising a magistrate who had forcibly quelled a protest in Sheffield. In total, he spent nine months in prison in York.

After selling the paper, he spent the rest of his life as a respected local philanthropist, and important figure in local church life. He was a founding member of The Sunday Schools Union. His poetry books were commercially successful, and he also received a government pension, perhaps as compensation for the time he spent in prison.

Through his life, Montgomery had continued to write poetry, and had a number of collections of poetry published. His poetry was often overtly political, covering topics from the abolition of slavery, wanting to help child chimney sweeps and condemnation of the French annexation of Switzerland. Much ►


Having said that, James Montgomery is still best remembered for the hymns he wrote. In 1817 James Cotterill became Vicar of Sheffield's only church – St. James. He had produced a hymn book in 1810, but the parishioners in Sheffield did not take to it. He requested James Montgomery to help produce a new hymn book. These were the days before nationally recognised hymn books. Montgomery through his life wrote over 400 hymns, and added some of these to the new

compilation which was produced in 1820. Montgomery produced his own hymn book in 1822. From those roots, a handful survive and are still sung today. Perhaps his most famous hymns are:

- Hail to the Lord's Anointed.
- Angels from the Realms of Glory.
- Stand up and Bless the Lord.


In the Sheffield area, Montgomery is remembered fondly, with streets, halls, a theatre and even a drinking fountain named after him. For the rest of us, we have his hymns



Backpackers 2019 – A Big Adventure!

We travelled through Europe in five days. It was a big adventure (as we sang in our theme song) starting on Monday 5th August. As we took the children on this journey, they learned through fun activities and crafts about the journey Jesus took in the week leading up to his death and then coming to life again.

Day one saw us in Gare du Nord in Paris, the busiest station in Europe. We designed a passport for our travels and at crafts we made our backpack for this adventure. We danced the Can-Can round the hall and introduced a few common French words and phrases. The scene helped the children to enter into the story of Jesus' arrival into Jerusalem with throngs of excited people all around.

Day two brought us to the Royal Palace in Stockholm. The children designed their own crown, learned some Swedish words and painted some glass for the palace. They heard the story of the woman anointing Jesus with expensive perfume as a king, but also for burial.

Day three and we are now at a restaurant in Rome. Ciao! Today's story was of Jesus and

his friends having their last meal together. For fun, we asked the children to build the biggest leaning tower they could. There were points to be won for the biggest. The first messy game of the week was to create a few pizzas to the children's instructions. Somehow, some of the ingredients, especially the flour and tomato paste managed to find their way onto our young leader chefs (*below*)!




Day four and we have moved north to the mountains of Switzerland. They're beautiful, scary, dangerous and exhilarating all at the same time. We had a ski exercise and a massive 'snowball' fight. It was like an avalanche! There were points for keeping your



designated area clear. Today's story was the scary one about Jesus being arrested, but him knowing he had to go through this trial to reach his eventual goal. Our craft for the day was a circle mat of pegs. Very challenging to make, but showing God's everlasting love – no beginning, no end.

certainly speeded up the arrival process (about 45 seconds) and saved a vast amount paper. We also avoided single use cups and bowls for the water and fruit – a bit more work for our kitchen volunteers, but virtually no waste to dispose of. The water came from the tap, so no waste there either.



Day five and we're back home in Glasgow. The children designed a postcard to tell everyone what they enjoyed. We had highland dancing and taught them how to do the Eightsome reel with some degree of success. Our craft was making a small garden with a gift of a dianthus showing that, with nurturing and tender loving care, we will blossom as people. This tied in with our story of the women in the garden finding the empty tomb and then meeting the risen Jesus. It helped to remind us that God is with us everywhere in our peaceful garden.

Personally, the fellowship and the willingness of the leaders of all ages to work as a team was fabulous. Definitely, Lenzie churches working together is a witness of God's love in our community. I feel truly blessed and privileged sharing God's love with children we met, sharing in their lives and forming great friendships with everyone who helped. Thank you for being you, sharing your many talents and skills to make the club what it is today, unique and special. We are all on a journey. Jesus will always point us in the right direction. Like backpackers we have to remember that GOD is with us every step of the way, AMEN.

The final concert for 2019 is planned for 16th November with the theme, *A Musical Christmas*. The performers for this concert are planned to be locally based professional

baritone & pianist duo, Phil Gault & Claire Heslin, who will be joined by Scottish Opera violinist, Katie Hull offering a musical feast for the ears!

Into the new year, concerts are planned for 1st February, 14th March and 18th April.

The latter one is likely to be a follow-up to the highly successful concert featuring young string players from East Dunbartonshire, held in February this year. It should see a return of the side by side project combining talented young musicians and five professional players in a concert of wind serenades, featuring music by Mozart, Richard Strauss plus a new composition commissioned by Milngavie Music Club. It was brilliant this year, so one definitely not to be missed.


four years of daily readings and


