

# From the Rector



*Dear Friends,*

**Sometimes this part of the church year can feel very busy. Certainly November has a number of things which keep us distracted, and is probably our busiest month of the year!!!**

November starts with Remembrance Sunday, an important day for many people, as well as the wider country. For us, it is special to hold our own remembrance service, as well as co-ordinate the Remembrance service at the Woodilee War Memorial.

Shortly after, we have one of our concerts, this year featuring music for Christmas. We also intend to have our Pet Blessing Service. At the end of the month we hold probably the biggest event we have in our church life – our Christmas Fair. And then we're off to Advent and the journey to Christmas. In many ways, Advent and Christmas are a bit quieter as we focus more and more on the birth of Jesus Christ – who is our Lord and Saviour. But back to November! There is no doubt that November is busy!

One of the images the Bible uses for our faith and for Christians is of salt flavouring the meal (Matthew 5:13). Another image of our faith is of yeast, leavening the loaf (Matthew 13:33). The verses come with a warning and an encouragement, that we should make sure

that we don't lose our ability to flavour or our ability to create food. We should not lose our saltiness, we should not stop being yeast. We should work to ensure that we are flavouring our world, feeding our world through our faith in Christ.

For me personally, one of the problems of business is that we don't forget our faith. I hope we never lose our faith, and I try to ensure our faith is central to our life both within our building and worship, but also in our life outside the structures of our church. I don't think we forget our faith, I think that sometimes we forget to allow our faith to flavour and work through all that we do, all of the business. What do I mean?

Well, it is not enough simply to have "Remembrance," as much as remembrance is important. We should ensure that remembrance is inspired by the Holy Spirit, and leavened with the hope that comes through Jesus Christ, a message that should be part of our remembrance activities.

It is not enough to simply have concerts. We should ensure that as people share with us in listening to good music, they will also experience the love of Christ through the way we greet people, host people, welcome people, such that part of the experience of coming to a



# For the Fallen

**On Remembrance Sunday, one verse from one poem will be repeated and read and spoken more than any other verse is likely to be read throughout the year. It will be read throughout the world. At St. Cyprian's, we are likely to speak it at least three times – in our two services and at the remembrance service up at the Woodilee War Memorial.**

The verse is the middle one of seven in a poem called “For the Fallen” by Laurence Binyon. Who was Laurence Binyon? Well, truth is he was a very unlikely war poet . . . .

Binyon was born in 1869, the son of an English Vicar in Lancaster. He studied at St. Paul's School in London, then graduated in classics from Trinity College, Oxford in 1893. He had already won prizes for his poetry by this time. On graduation, he started work at the British Museum in the printed books department. He spent his entire working life there until retirement as head of department in 1933. During his time at the museum, he wrote many books and became a particular expert on Asian art.

Binyon, outside of work, continued to work on his poetry and was a close associate of Ezra Pound. In 1913, he was a candidate for Poet Laureate along with Rudyard Kipling, Thomas Hardy and John Masefield, although in the end the post went to Robert Bridges.

Binyon also married and had three daughters.

After retirement from the British Museum, Binyon was appointed as professor of poetry at Harvard University, then later professor of English Literature at the University of Athens. Binyon had to escape from Athens quickly with the threat of the German invasion at the beginning of the Second World War. After returning to Berkshire, which he had made



home in 1933, Binyon continued to write poetry, including what was considered his greatest masterpiece “The Burning of the Leaves,” about the blitz in London. Binyon died in 1943 in hospital in Reading following a botched operation, aged 73.

Binyon's daughters also became artists, one a book illustrator, one a calligrapher and art scholar, the other an expert on puppetry. Some would say, probably correctly, that Binyon spent his life in a rather “rarified” literary/academic atmosphere. He certainly wrote “For the Fallen” from that vantage point in 1914, after he was horrified by the war and death from those early days of the Great War. He was staying in Polzeith in Cornwall at the time. The poem was printed in *The Times* newspaper in September that year.

However, Binyon was also a man who served. He was too old to fight at the time of the great war. However, he spent some time in France working as a medical orderly in 1916 and, on returning to England, worked as a medical orderly looking after returning injured soldiers.

This is the poem complete. A poem of deep feeling, deep agony, deep respect. ►

**Our trip in September on the Seagull Trust boats from their boathouse at Falkirk was extremely interesting. We headed away from the Falkirk Wheel towards Edinburgh along the Union Canal which proved to be very different from the Forth and Clyde Canal, which we are perhaps more accustomed to.**



It seemed more secluded, despite running alongside the housing and industrial units we passed, and didn't have nearly as many people walking or cycling beside us. There is also a long tunnel section that passes under Callander Park, which was very interesting. Some of us even had a go at steering the boats – this was not as easy as it sounds! After our cruise, we



had afternoon tea at the Boardwalk, which also proved to be delicious. Altogether, we had a very pleasant afternoon, with lots of laughter, chat and great fellowship.

Mothers Union Listening, Observing, Acting (MULOA) is a process which helps us to look at what we do – as a Branch and beyond – helping us to decide if what we do can be improved on. Our October meeting focused on this process as we joined with our sister Branches of Bishopbriggs and Cumbernauld. Our meeting was led by Ann Wren who is our Diocesan Faith and Policy Adviser. We looked at the passage about blind Bartimaeus focusing on the words that stood out for us. Listening was key to the exercise and we all have 'homework' to do before our second meeting when Ann will be back to lead us again – next February. The prayer we used throughout the meeting was 'Take our thoughts and turn them into prayer, Take our prayers and turn them into love, Take our love and turn it into life'. A message for all of us, perhaps.

Our next meeting, on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm, will be an occasion to hear from our own Paul Hindle about his trip to Rwanda earlier this year. Paul is a Trustee on the Worldwide Board for MU and as such represents the Province of Scotland on our behalf, so this should be an interesting evening.

Aileen Mundy and I have also been involved in an MU project which involved us in helping with a holiday for women and their families from North Ayrshire Woman's Aid. More of our adventures in the next magazine!



# Music at St Cyprian's

This winter's season got off to a great start with a concert given by the Menyie Trio. They are Amy Turner, Lauren Reeve-Rawlings and Hebba Benyaghla, who performed a range of music for oboe, horn and piano. The photo to



the right shows them during practice on the afternoon of 21<sup>st</sup> September in advance of the concert that night.

A new feature made possible by the generous sponsorship granted by Music Enterprise Scotland was the hiring in of a grand piano to show off Hebba's playing at its best.

In the photo, you can also see the new banner specially produced for the season.

The October concert featured *Baba Yaga*



(below), a duo of Karen Dufour, saxophone and Gwen Sinclair, harp. The interesting combination of instruments led to a concert of great variety and beauty. Most of the pieces were specially arranged by Karen and Gwen to show the capabilities of themselves and their instruments. The final piece, which formed the second half of the concert was their own arrangement of Mussorgsky's *Pictures at an Exhibition*. It was a particular challenge as the original score for piano uses all ten fingers and that is not possible on the harp, so some notes

have to be left out. Our challenge was to spot which ones! I have to say I failed completely in the task! It was beautifully done and very enjoyable.

The final concert for 2019 is advertised opposite. Called *A Winter Warmer* this concert will feature locally based baritone and pianist duo, Phil Gault & Claire Heslin, who will be joined by Scottish Opera violinist, Katie Hull offering a

musical feast for the ears!

The first concert of the new year, on 1<sup>st</sup> February, will be a performance of Stravinsky's *A Soldier's Tale*, a strange morality tale performed by the McOpera Ensemble and presented by Flora Munro, alongside a showing of a special film by Edinburgh based director, Roddy Simpson.

The March concert will feature Escocia Duo a newly established duo of Chilean Guitarist Roberto Kuhn and Yorkshire Violinist Katrina Lee who will play a diverse variety of music ranging from Paganini to Piazzolla.

The April concert will be the last of the season and will be a follow-up to this year's highly successful concert featuring young string players from East Dunbartonshire. More details later.
