Curate's Corner



Dear Friends,

During the week of prayer for Christian unity, I was very happy to welcome Rev. Bryce Calder to come and preach at our 10.30 Eucharist as part of the pulpit exchange and it was good to hear his message from scripture on the passage Mark 1:14-20. At the earlier 9.15am service, I also preached on this passage, and the few who were present felt that the message should be shared with those who came to the later service. I would suggest that before you read any further that you re-read the passage from Mark and then come back to this page and I will share some of it with you.

The verse that comes out of this passage of scripture for me is, "Come, follow me, Jesus said, and I will make you fishers of men." The gospel is all about Jesus calling his first four disciples to come and follow Him. It is about the first people who were called to be the people that we are called to be today. Disciples who follow the ways of Jesus and who show His love and compassion in this world! Mark's story is not very elaborate. It is short and to the point. There is, I suppose, a

certain note of adventure as the four men leave their fishing business to go with Jesus, but there is not much in the story that seems terribly upsetting.

What the story doesn't tell us about, is just exactly what those men were letting themselves in for by becoming followers of Jesus. To find out what was really in store for them, we have to keep reading more of Mark's Gospel. When we do, what we discover is that being a disciple was not very glamorous at all. In fact, at times it was downright dangerous. Jesus was telling His followers and us today, that being His disciple is not an easy task. He was saying that the gospel is a disturbing force in the world which can and has upset individuals and nations alike. It brings change and new experiences to all who hear it. Being a disciple of Jesus will not be easy because the task of the disciple is to be the bearer of this revolutionary gospel message. It would be nice to be able to say that's all ancient history, but there are governments today who still oppose the gospel and persecute those Christians who try to spread its good news.

It seems to me that in order to be a good disciple of Jesus and to follow in His ways, we

need to have courage, and in an article entitled, "The Need for Courage" this is what Eric Ritz has to say:-

'A few years ago Richard Cardinal Cushing wrote about the church's need for courage. He said:

"If all the sleeping folks will wake up, and all the lukewarm folks will fire up, and all the disgruntled folks will sweeten up, and all the discouraged folks will cheer up, and all the depressed folks will look up, and all the estranged folks will make up, and all the gossiping folks will shut up, and all the dry bones will shake up, and all the true soldiers will stand up, and all the church members will pray up, and if the Saviour of all will be lifted up then we can have the greatest renewal this world has ever known."

Jesus lived three years with his disciples. They went everywhere together and did everything together. They ate, slept, and breathed the life of Jesus and yet it was

difficult for them to make the transition in their minds from a Messiah who would be a mighty King of Jews to a Messiah that would die for the sins of mankind. But Jesus never wavered in his mission. Throughout his entire ministry among the people and his training of the disciples, he held in his heart this hope: That Peter along with the rest of his disciples would lose their earthly ambitions and become feeders of sheep—fishers of men. The very first words of Jesus when He and Peter met by the lake was, “Follow me, and I will make you a fisher of men.” His very last words to Peter, again down at the waters of the Sea of Galilee, and after his resurrection, were, “Feed my sheep, follow me.” From beginning to end this is the mission of the Church. Our challenge for this week is to have courage and not to give up hope on Christianity. It’s been around for over 2000 years and with God in charge, we have nothing to fear. Like Jesus’ first disciples, we must be ready to always keep

God as first in our lives and to try to be the best disciples that we can by being feeders of sheep and fishers of men. One of the ways we can do this is by remembering all persecuted Christians around the world in our prayers and asking God to give them, and us, strength and courage to speak up for Christian values and to share His gospel with those who don’t yet know His love and His saving grace.

“Come, follow me, Jesus said, and I will make you fishers of men.” AMEN.

Diocesan Synod 2012

This year's Synod took place at Barony Agricultural College a few miles north of Dumfries. The meeting takes place within a Eucharist, which, up to the post-communion prayer, is the first item of business and contains the Bishop's Charge. The Blessing and Sending out are at the close of Synod.

In his Charge, the Bishop spoke of the issue of identity in the context of the proposed referendum on independence. He expressed the hope that this Church, fully part of the Scottish scene but not wholly defined or contained by it, might find the chance to grow, finally to break free from anxieties about its Scottish identity and credentials (i.e. not the "English Kirk"), and discover a new sense of being a church for a future Scotland, whatever that future may turn out to be.

The rest of the morning was taken up with constitutional items such as the appointment (actually reappointment) of Diocesan Officers, statistics, receiving reports from the Treasurer and Protection of Vulnerable Groups Coordinator, variations to Canons, motions and finally a presentation by Waverley Care, the 2012 Bishop's Lent Appeal recipient.

The variation proposed to Canon 13 is particularly relevant to our situation. The current Canon only allows for the suspension of the right of presentation of a Rector to an Incumbency for a maximum of two periods of three years. The revision allows much more flexibility by removing the limit of two periods. This was warmly welcomed.

One of the motions before Synod was the removal of Incumbency status from Holy Cross, Knightswood due to reduced numbers and its inability to sustain such status. This was approved. The current wording of Canon 13 could have put us in this position in a few months time (although of course the wheels

grind much more slowly than the Canon envisages).

Synod approved another motion that changed the quorum of the Diocesan Council, whose voting members are the charity trustees of the Diocese. The current quorum requires one member to be present from each of the seven regions of the Diocese and has proved unworkable. The revision just requires a majority of the voting members to be present.

After lunch, the members of Synod attended workshops on the six aspects of the Growth Strategy. I went to the Learning & Discipleship Development Team workshop. It was very good. We learned about what is going on to encourage people to learn more about their faith (e.g. the Journey in Faith courses that Pat and I are going to in April and May). The team was keen to encourage local initiatives and reminded us there was grant money available if we needed to buy resources relevant to these initiatives.

Next we came back together in the main hall to hear about and approve the Diocesan Budget. As usual the budget shows a small deficit in the expectation that some parts of the budget will not be spent and we'll end up with a small surplus!

In a complete departure from previous practice, we had been randomly allocated to tables of six in the main hall. This helped to make the meeting more interactive and was particularly relevant to the next item of business, the discussion of the Anglican Covenant (type this into a search engine to find the text, the pro and anti websites, and the Diocesan Secretary's report on our discussion). Led by the Provost and Vice Provost of the Cathedral, we were asked to consider questions about the covenant with a view to reaching an overall view that could be fed back to General Synod. The overwhelming view in the room was that we

Message from Bishop Gregor

In his most extended discussion of resurrection in general and the resurrection of Jesus in particular (1 Corinthians 15.12-57—well worth a very careful read at any time of the year), St Paul at one point says, *in fact Christ has been raised from the dead ...* (verse 20a).

As he not infrequently does, St Paul points us to the heart of the matter. For, when we come to the Feast of Feasts, it is supremely important to know what we are celebrating. We are not celebrating the faith of the women who were the earliest witnesses, or the faith of the apostles who, incredulous at first, eventually followed their lead. And we are not celebrating some new insight that somehow dawned on the dispirited followers of Jesus that he was still with them and they could carry on. In other words, at Easter we are not celebrating anything that they did or believed or thought or that we do or believe or think; no, not at all.

Rather, **we are celebrating what God has done**. And what God has done is raise Jesus from the dead. Nobody saw God do this, nobody can describe what God did—and most efforts in art to do that fail—or exactly how God did what God did. Yet, in fact, Christ has been raised from the dead.

We're not celebrating faith, the faith of the women at the tomb, the faith of the apostles, or our own faith, because faith does not make it true; rather, Christ's being raised from the dead makes faith possible. It is the proclamation of that Good News which either leads to faith, or evokes ridicule, or meets with doubt or indifference.

If it leads to faith, then what kind of faith? Well, certainly, as Paul also says in 1 Corinthians 15, faith that we can hope in Christ for a world beyond this, a world free from all that disfigures life, above all free from death, the last enemy to be destroyed as Paul has it. But faith, too, that it is supremely worth it now to live towards that kind of world we await and long for, by committing ourselves to the kind of Christ-like living that passes beyond death to resurrection, that meets vindication by God as Christ did.

At the Easter liturgy, in our churches, we have the chance to renew our baptismal promises, including the promise about serving Christ in all persons and pursuing justice and peace. To these, and many others of the questions, the response laid down is I will, with God's help. But it could equally at Easter, and perhaps more powerfully because of what it is we celebrate, be this: I will, because in fact Christ has been raised from the dead.

should not proceed to adopt the covenant. The key reasons for this in my view are: we do not want to establish an overarching governing body in the Anglican Communion; we value the diversity of the communion; and it won't prevent schism.

The meeting drew towards its conclusion with the announcement of election results, votes of thanks and the Blessing. Shelley Marsh from Bishopbriggs is now the Synod

Clerk following the resignation of Ken Steven from Dalbeattie after 25 years in the post and Scott Robertson (former MU Diocesan Chaplain) from Newlands is the new Canon following the retirement of Philip Noble. The Bishop presented Ken Steven with a card and gift on behalf of Diocese and thanked him for his many years of faithful service.

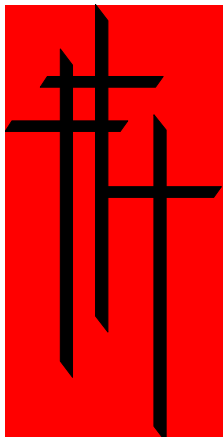

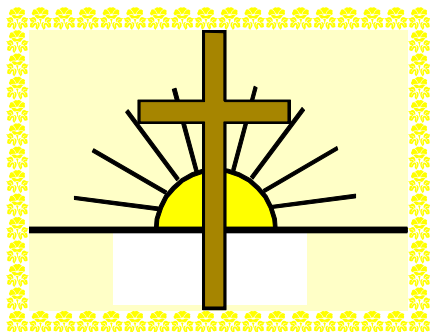

Changing Prisons, Changing Lives

WHEN Scotland's newest prison, on the edge of Bishopbriggs, went into operation in mid-March 2012, Mothers' Union members had already rallied a team of fellow Christians to play their part.

'Changing Prisons, Changing Lives' is the mantra at HMP Low Moss, Scotland's first public-sector prison to be built since 1978.

The aim is an environment that will provide the 784 prisoners with the opportunities to transform their lives; by learning new skills while working a 35 hour week, and engaging in education courses, sport and the creative arts. Worship and discussions on faith issues will be led by the chaplains in the multi-faith centre, supported by members of Prison Fellowship.

Christian communities in the surrounding areas have responded enthusiastically to a call by Mothers' Union to form a band of volunteers to support visiting friends and family, including children, during visiting times.

This ministry includes providing a welcome, hospitality, care of young children, and assisting prisoners and their children during homework visits. There are also plans for other innovative ministries with young people. More than 60 volunteers have come forward and more will always be welcomed to share God's love with our neighbours.

Both ministries are dynamic and will continue to be guided and sustained by prayer. Thus, the MU volunteers and their ecumenical partners show a willingness both to work together as Christians and to work with those

of other faiths or none in an environment that will be challenging and take them out of their comfort zones. However, by God's grace, there is hope that all involved—prisoners, families, chaplains, staff and volunteers—will be open to their lives being transformed in Low Moss.

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured as though you yourselves were being tortured.

(Hebrews 13.1-3)

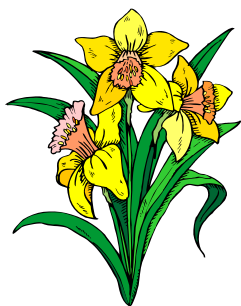

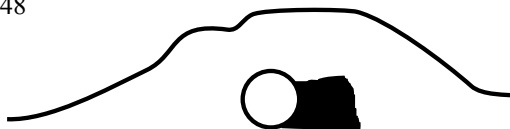
