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Rector's Letter



Dear Friends,

Particularly for those people I have not been able to see over the last few weeks, I hope you had a blessed Christmas and are already experiencing a happy and enjoyable New Year. Many of you, like me, have been enduring a particularly nasty bug over the Christmas period. I hope you recover soon and begin to enjoy this New Year. May I take this opportunity to thank all those people who have helped ensure the Services have continued while I have been ill, particularly Moira, Glennis, Eric and Fred.

I have been thinking over the last few weeks just how easily means become ends in themselves and we forget the original reason for the things we do. This seemed to apply to many Christmas activities. For example, Christmas is the time we celebrate the Incarnation when God in Christ came to earth as a baby to save and redeem us, but the celebration has become an end in itself. For many people Christmas is just a celebration party without any religious significance at all. Our gift giving and card sending was supposed to be a token and a reminder of just how much God has given us in Jesus Christ, but probably

as a consequence of commercialism our gift giving has got out of control. People, especially children, are inundated with presents they do not need and often do not want: gift giving has become an end in itself. However, there are many good things about Christmas. People are very generous at this time of year as the Charities will confirm, and if we are buying presents for others we are not just thinking about ourselves. In addition, there is recognition that the family is an important aspect of Christmas, a reflection of God's blessing of family life by entrusting His Son to the care of Mary and Joseph.

The main point I am making is just how easy it is to lose sight of the original purpose of an activity and get caught up in the activity itself. As a consequence, we often end up not having a clear idea why we do certain things. So, it is valuable to ask ourselves why we do certain things because it reminds to look at ends not just to focus on the means.

This applies to our Christian lives and worship; we need to ask ourselves why we do things (end) not just do them because we always have (means). Why, is a good question: what is the point and purpose of reading the Bible, praying, singing hymns, listening to sermons, reading or singing the liturgy etc. The first question in the Westminster Shorter Con-

fession (preparation course for those about to be baptised) gets right to the point.

Question: What is the chief end of man?

Answer: Man's chief end is to glorify
God, and to enjoy him forever.

The answer is at first very straight forward; to glorify God i.e. it is to recognise His nature and character and to give voice to His love for mankind as expressed in Jesus Christ and through those who serve Him by seeking to meet the needs of others. But what does it mean to enjoy God? There does not seem to be much joy around in many churches! Perhaps there is in the more charismatic churches, but are they enjoying God or enjoying themselves or one another's company? Enjoying God, or even enjoying another person—what does that really mean?

When we fall in love with someone, we long to be with them; we simply want to enjoy their presence. Perhaps that is how we should be enjoying God. This sounds reasonable but how do we enjoy someone we cannot detect

with our five senses, it is beyond us. It is of course the work of the Holy Spirit to make God real to us. Can we help in the process? The answer is yes, there are a number of meditational techniques referred to as practising the presence of God, which can be used to enable us to draw closer to God and begin to enjoy Him more. I will try and deal with this topic in my next letter.

The main point to emphasise is that it is not Bible reading, praying, saying the liturgy, singing hymns or anything else we may do—these are all 'means', to an end—that 'end' is to Glorify God and enjoy Him forever.

The Future's Not Rosy for Midges

ONE of the highlights of last year's General Synod was, for me, the arrival of the MiDGeS.

This was the Overseas Committee's imaginative way of drawing our attention to the importance of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs, geddit) which we're supposed to be achieving by 2015, a prospect which is not, at the moment, looking too rosy.

The Overseas Committee wished to encourage us to become like midges, annoying and needling people into doing something about these goals.

There's a theological principle at stake. God has created a world in which people should be able to live without fear: without fear of starvation, persecution, homelessness, poverty, ignorance, torture.

Human rights—on which the MDGs are based—is another way of talking about our God-given human dignity. So, at the risk of harping on, let me do a bit of midgy work.

Among the MDGs is that of banishing hunger and food insecurity. Initially, some

progress was made towards this goal but recently things have got worse again.

More of the world's crops are being used to fuel our greedy cars; more grain is being used to feed animals for the table, as living standards rise in India and China. Generally this pushes food prices up, making life harder for the very poor.

In December I visited Malawi as part of a Scottish Government project, looking for products to import into the UK. One of the principal aims was to visit the rice-growing area in the north of the country, as we (the Balmore Coach House with our partners Rainbow Turtle in Paisley) are planning to bring in a container of rice early this year to serve in schools and to sell in shops and on church stalls.

I spent a fascinating day touring round the country areas around Karonga, which are intensively farmed.

Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world, with a per capita income of US\$ 170. For Africa it's densely populated, with 13.5 million people. Some 85 % of the popula-

What's Good about Being 104? No Peer Pressure

IT was hailed the best quote from a conference on old age jointly backed by the Scottish Episcopal Church, ACTS and Faith in Older People.

'Wasteland or Harvest Field?' was an ecumenical exploration of the needs of older people and the benefits they bring to churches.

In all, 120 people attended the successful one-day gathering held at Gillis College in Edinburgh. It drew speakers and participants from as far afield as Inverness and Norwich.

The purpose was to share recent work on old age and spiritual care. A spokesman said:

"Demographic change alerts us to the importance of considering the needs of the older members of our society not least within our congregations.

"We hoped to encourage those involved in training pastoral carers, elders, clergy, chaplains and all who visit or work with older people on behalf of our churches to take the topic seriously!

"We had to refuse places to 40 people as the conference was fully subscribed so we hope to offer a similar event in May."

tion derives its living from agriculture; 90% of all farmers are small holders.

Typically such farmers will own 4 acres, but farm only about half of it, will have a hoe as their basic tool, will use 60% of their production for food and 40% as a cash crop.

Daudi Phiri, a 'model farmer' whom I met, farms all his land, uses 1.5 acres for maize and cassava and the remaining 2.5 acres for rice, producing an amazing 2.4 tonnes.

Most of this he sells to purchase agricultural implements, seeds and fertiliser, to improve the family's housing, to pay for health care and for secondary education.

Unusually, Daudi Phiri owns a plough and oxen. Nevertheless the achievement of planting, weeding (three times during the growing season) and harvesting/threshing 2.5 acres by hand is extraordinary.

It is more than many can achieve, partly because of the cost of seed and fertiliser, and of agricultural implements, partly because of the sheer scale of the labour involved.

How can we help poor farmers in Malawi? By providing them with an international market where they can get a better price for their crops and so begin to work their way out of poverty.

If all you can do is grow just enough to live off, you will never make progress.

If you can grow a surplus, get a better price for your crops, then you can start to buy some basic tools, spend more on seed and fertilizer, and send your children to secondary school. You can plan and build up your family and your community.

Over the last year, we have had a tremendous response from Episcopal churches across Scotland to appeals to sell the products we import from Swaziland.

If over the next few months you hear an annoying buzz, it means we're after you again to try some rice as well.

Companions Together Worldwide

March will see delegates from around Scotland gathering in Glasgow to exchange ideas on how to strengthen Companion Links with Dioceses overseas, building on relationships developed at the Lambeth Conference.

Before last year's Lambeth Conference a number of overseas bishops and their spouses visited dioceses here in Scotland.

Many were from our Companion Dioceses and this time shared was clearly appreciated by our visitors.

Sharing in the life of other dioceses enabled many within our congregations to feel a closer link with our Companion Dioceses.

But where did that lead us?

The need to keep such conversations going has to be a high priority.

With that in mind the Provincial Overseas Committee will host a conference on 21 March in Glasgow to examine how we can develop our Companion Links with Dioceses overseas.

Chaired by Revd Canon Duncan McCosh, convener of the Overseas Committee of the SEC, the conference will be opened by our Primus, Bishop Idris Jones.

Bishop Idris said:

"First and foremost Lambeth 2008 was an experience as a result of which we felt ourselves to be part of a living and lively community that was of great relevance in the world at large.

"Ongoing dialogue is of the utmost importance to the future of the Anglican Communion. Mutual sharing and support increases the sense of partnership with dioceses that are far from us in physical distance and reduces emotional and theological distance too.

"Also we must not forget the needs of the poor as expressed through the walk of witness that bishops and spouses shared together through the centre of London and the commitment of the Communion to support those agencies working to achieve the Millennium Development Goals."

Bishop Idris will open the discussion with a scriptural introduction to companion linkages and a reflection on what he has brought back from his overseas experiences, and a discussion exploring what global links are for.

Other speakers include Revd Canon Edgar Ruddock, director of the international relations team at USPG: Anglicans in World Mission.

He will speak about how mission works in practice in today's world and how has it changed.

Revd Canon Stephen Lyon, general secretary of PWM (Partnership for World Mission), will offer practical advice for making Companion Links work and lead a discussion on what can we do to respond to the agendas.

Speakers will also share experiences of Companion Links in the Scottish context.

At the end of the day delegates can expect to have identified actions building on the value of the pre Lambeth Hospitality Initiative to develop and deepen the quality of Diocesan Link relationships and workings. These are expected to include ways in which we can:

- Seriously engage with the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and Five Marks of Mission;
- Renew and refresh relationships;
- Live out the challenge of the Lambeth Conference of 'listening and learning';
- Develop stronger more informed prayer links;
- Build on successes by sharing stories.

New Festival of Arts, Culture & Faith

Have you ever been to Greenbelt (the annual, edgy Christian arts festival in Cheltenham)?

Have you never attended, but know of the concept?

Have you ever thought it would be good to have a similar festival in Scotland? Not MacGreenbelt, but something distinctly Scottish, arty, cultural and relevant to today.

Think faith meeting culture - arts - theology - ecology - politics - philosophy - spirituality - justice.

If so, read on for the background to 'The Project'.

Last August's Greenbelt hosted a conversation for anyone interested in 'doing something like Greenbelt' in Scotland.

At a second meeting in Perth in November, Dot Reid, John Cross and Graham Maule were appointed to take the idea of a Scottish festival a step further by asking people to join a steering group.

Graham Maule, of Iona Community's Wild Goose Resource Group, explained: "This we are doing.

"People are currently being approached, and in the meantime we have done a little bit more thinking and a little more organising so that we have more of a presence and more opportunity for people to join and have a voice in this thing."

The working name of the project is 'The Project: a Scottish festival of arts, culture and faith'.

Graham added: "We agreed in Perth that a series of smaller gatherings would be a good thing to shape the bigger event and to create a community of people willing to invest their time and energy in it.

"That will be the first task of the Steering Group—to call us together a couple of times in 2009."

"Quiet hope in a bad world"

The following is an extract from a letter from Cyprian. He lived in the 3rd century, became Bishop of Carthage and was martyred for his faith. The letter was addressed to his old friend Donatus.

"This seems a cheerful world, Donatus, when I view it from this fair garden, under the shadow of these vines. But if I climbed to some great mountain and looked out over the wide lands, you know very well what I would see: brigands on the high roads, pirates on the

seas; in the amphitheatres men murdered to please the applauding crowds; under all roofs misery and selfishness. It is really a bad world, Donatus, an incredibly bad world.

"Yet in the midst of it, I have found a quiet and holy people. They have discovered a joy which is a thousand times better than any pleasure in this sinful life. They are despised and persecuted, but they care not. They have overcome the world. These people, Donatus, are the Christians and I am one of them."



Appeal to St. Cyprian's

In December, I attended a M.U. meeting at Cumbernauld where the speaker was Revd. Andrew Low, the Chief Executive Officer for Glasgow City Mission. I was very impressed by his talk about what brought him from Canada to work in the mission field in Glasgow and to hear about the work of Glasgow City Mission.

After the meeting I spoke to Andrew and told him how we at St. Cyprian's were supporting the mission by providing food and toiletries from time to time and he thanked me for this support. I asked him if there was any other way that St. Cyprian's could help and have since received the letter printed below.

Moira Jamieson

You mentioned that I should contact you if GCM had any specific needs that St Cyprian's Episcopal Church may be able to help with. I recently had a meeting with GCM staff about our ongoing food costs as we serve Glasgow's homeless and vulnerable men and women. I was amazed to find out that we spend roughly £1,300 per year on Knorr Bouillon Stock for our soup. Yet, this cost isn't actually that surprising when I consider that we actually serve over 32,000 cups of soup each year!

We have a dedicated team of volunteers who come in during the day and make homemade soup for our evening opening. Soup may be simple, but it is warm, freshly made and full of vegetables and nutrients. What better to offer men and women coming in from the cold? Especially as this soup may be the only source of fresh food and nutrients that they will get. We never underestimate how much it means to an individual to serve them and treat them like someone of worth. This action is such a practical expression of Christian love.

I wonder if St Cyprian's Episcopal Church could help by providing some of the stock that we need? The church congregation could either collect packs of Knorr stock cubes or make a donation towards the financial cost that we incur. I appreciate that the total amount we require is great, but if the church could help with a months supply, or collect stock cubes on a continuing basis, then that would be a great help.

We currently purchase this in 2kg tubs in two different varieties (vegetable and ham), but this is quite expensive for an individual to buy on their own. If individuals from the church could buy packs of vegetable and ham Knorr stock cubes from the supermarket then that would be equally as useful.

This really is a practical way in which the church can ensure that we can continue to meet the immediate needs of Glasgow's most vulnerable.
