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Curate's Corner



Dear Friends,

I wish you all a happy and healthy new year, one in which, I hope, our church grows in strength and everyone works together, guided by God, to find the right person to lead us. I hope that a good number of the congregation have signed up for our Four Studies and a Party on the 20th February. If you haven't already signed up, it's not too late; there are still plenty of places. We need as many people as possible to attend this study day to help us discern the type of person we would like at St. Cyprian's.

As we leave Epiphany and head towards Ash Wednesday and Lent, I wonder what commitment you will make towards "giving up" or as I prefer to do "doing more" in Lent. We move from a time of new beginnings to a time of re-evaluating our faith and journeying with Christ through his trials and suffering. It should be a time for Christians to re-commit themselves to Christ and to look at how much time is given in prayer communicating with God. Something that I feel is very important to our lives and have been emphasising in recent sermons. During the period of Lent, one of the ways we can come closer to God is

by joining with others from the churches in our area in the ACTS Lent Studies. See pages 20 and 21 for information on this and please check the weekly Link pew sheet for further updates (also available on our website).

I read recently in a Bible Reading Fellowship book that the word 'Lent' comes from a very old Anglo-Saxon word *Lecnten* which is where the modern word *lengthen* comes from. And of course the period of Lent falls during the time when the days are lengthening and leading up to the real new beginnings of the season of Spring. So perhaps we should think of this period of Lent as a time for 'spring cleaning' our lives and also as a time for dusting away the cobwebs of winter and re-energising our batteries.

During Holy Week we also have an opportunity to come closer to God and to follow the journey of Christ to the cross. This year there will be two opportunities to follow the Stations of the Cross and an evening to meditate on Christ's Journey. Our usual Maundy Thursday service with the washing of feet and the solemn stripping of the altar followed by the watch of the passion will also be taking place. And on Good Friday I encourage all who can to take part in the ecumenical Walk of Witness. It is a wonderful way to witness to our

Meet the Next Bishop

ELECTED the new Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway on 16 January, the Very Revd Dr Gregor Duncan is well known in the diocese, having been Dean since 1996 and Rector of St Ninian's Pollokshields for over a decade. Before taking a well-earned holiday after the election, he found time to tell DNS readers a little more about himself...

Back in 1984 when you were ordained as a vicar in the Church of England, could you have imagined yourself becoming a bishop?

No! I think I saw my future then as continuing as a vicar.

How did you see the role of bishop then?

My bishop then was someone of great authority and significance who lived in a medieval palace in the huge Diocese of Peterborough, which covers Northamptonshire, Rutland and Peterborough itself. He also had the reputation of being the rudest bishop in England! And he hated the Alternative Service Book. But he was much loved. He was someone of deep prayer and theological acumen. He was very pastoral-minded and took an interest in all of his clergy. I knew he prayed for me and cared what I was doing.

What's different now?

Apart from the rudeness? Well, the scale is very different. Whereas the size of an English diocese can make a bishop quite a remote figure, in the Scottish Episcopal Church, you are much closer to people. A lot is fundamentally the same, though: you are there to support and care for the clergy and lay leadership, offering your personal presence, giving people time, space and prayer every day. That's particularly important in a church of our size. Ours is also a very diverse diocese, and part of my role will

be to hold it together and help people feel they belong to one another.

Tell us something that you're especially grateful to have inherited from Bishop Idris.

I learned a lot from working with Bishop Idris. He is a genuinely open-minded and very loyal person who helped me see I also could be open-minded without being unprincipled. I also have gained a wider theological grasp than I would have.

What were the hardest things about being a candidate?

To be exposed to such deep scrutiny by my peers, especially at the Electoral Synod. Wondering if I would be found wanting, and knowing that if I fumbled the final stage it would have haunted me. Besides that, there was the huge sense of uncertainty with my life and my congregation's. At times it seemed hard to keep that in perspective.

What was the best thing?

The sense of being prayed for and supported with love and concern was quite tangible. When it came to it, it was wonderful to know I could share myself and be open, especially with the preparatory committee and Electoral Synod.

What will you miss most about your parish work?

Being in the midst of just one congregation, helping them as they try to be a community of faith. Apart from a brief time as a theological college chaplain, being a parish priest has been meat and drink to me for years. That intimacy is not going to last much longer.

Three things you pray for Glasgow & Galloway as you look forward?

◇ That our clergy will know they are val-

ued, encouraged, challenged and prayed for by their bishop;

- ◇ That all of us as a diocese could be more together, enjoying God's gifts and finding delight and joy in being together in parish life;
- ◇ That the main focus of our lives as Christians is what we do in the world and not what we do in church, so we are energised, sustained and transformed by Word and Sacrament in order to live faith day by day.

Three things you want us to hold in our prayers when we pray for you?

- ◇ That I remember to seek proper support and counsel - because it is an isolating job otherwise;
- ◇ That I remember to sustain the daily discipline of prayer when I no longer have my 'own' church to go into;
- ◇ That I, too, will find joy - in being bishop.


Dean Gregor Duncan (59) succeeds the Rt Revd Dr Idris Jones, who retired last year after serving the diocese as Bishop for 11 years.

A graduate of Glasgow University, he went on to study for his PhD at Cambridge. He was ordained priest in 1984. In 1986 he returned to Scotland to serve as chaplain at Edinburgh Theological College. Before moving to his present charge in Pollokshields, he was Rector of St Columba's, Largs from 1989 to 1999.

His interests include collecting records and CDs, cooking, entertaining, and reading modern novels, travel and history books.

The election was carried out by an Electoral Synod (comprising representatives of clergy and lay church members from the Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway) and was chaired by the Most Revd David Chillingworth, Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, who said:

"I am delighted to welcome Dean Gregor



Duncan as the next Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway. He has faithfully served the Scottish Episcopal Church and the clergy and people of Glasgow and Galloway for many years.

"He is widely respected and admired for his faithful pastoral care and the strength of his spirituality."

His service of consecration will be in St Mary's Cathedral. The date will be announced shortly.

A unique event takes place in south-west Scotland this year with a St David's day Eucharist in Welsh...

It will be at Ayr's Holy Trinity Church, led by the assistant priest, Revd Professor Peter Neil.

Native Scot Peter learned Welsh while he was a professor at the University of Aberystwyth. He's now based in Ayr as head of the school of education at the University of the West of Scotland.

Holy Trinity's congregation includes a number of Welsh speakers, and it is hoped that other ex-patriots from around the diocese will come and support this event.

However, you don't need to be Welsh or speak the language to take part.

Although the liturgy will be in Welsh, a translation will be provided and the sermon, preached by the rector, Revd Dr Ian Meredith



will be in English (despite the Welsh surname).

Ian says there are no prizes for guessing what one of the hymns will be!

In case you haven't figured it out yet, 'Tyred pob Cymro Dydd Gwl Dewi' is Welsh for 'Come all Welsh people to the Feast Day of St David'. The service takes place on Monday 1 March at 7.30pm.

Holy Trinity Church is in Fullarton Street, right in the centre of town, next to the bus station.



From the City Centre

Take Great Western Road from Anniesland Cross, then A739/A81 Aberfoyle/Bearsden Cross. At St Andrews College fork right, A809 and at Stockiemuir roundabout, go left to Baljaffray Road. Take first left opening and turn left again into Grampian Way, leading to the Buchanan complex.

From Lenzie

Head for Torrance either via Kirkintilloch and Glasgow Road or Boghead Road, Crosshill Road, and Cole Road, avoid the village and take the first exit at the roundabout onto A807 towards Balmore and Bearsden. At the next roundabout, take the second exit onto B8049/Boclair Rd (past Dobbies) Continue to follow B8049 through the lights by the council offices (Boclair House) and then turn left onto A808/Roman Rd. At the lights by the shops, turn right onto A809 Drymen Road towards St Andrews College and then proceed as above.

Thinking of quitting?

Don't!

‘...Be steadfast...’ 1 Corinthians 15:58

George Frideric Handel was a musical prodigy. At twenty-one he was a keyboard virtuoso. When he turned to composing he gained immediate fame and soon was appointed Kapellmeister to the Elector of Hanover (later King George I of England).

When Handel moved to England his renown grew. By the time he was forty he was world famous. But despite his talent and fame he faced considerable adversity. Rivalry with English composers was fierce. Audiences were fickle; sometimes they didn't turn out for his performances. He was the victim of the changing political winds. Several times he found

himself on the verge of bankruptcy.

His problems were compounded by failing health. He suffered a stroke which left his right arm limp and damaged the use of four fingers in his right hand. Although he recovered, it left him battling depression.

Finally, at fifty-six, Handel decided it was time to retire. Discouraged, miserable and consumed with debt, he felt certain he'd land in a debtor's prison. So on April 8, 1741, he gave what he considered his farewell concert. Disappointed and filled with self-pity, he gave up.

But that year something incredible happened. A wealthy friend named Charles Jennings encouraged Handel by visiting him and giving him a libretto based on the life of Christ. The work intrigued Handel, so he began writing. Immediately the floodgates of inspiration opened. For three weeks he wrote almost nonstop. Then he spent another two days creating the orchestrations. In twenty-four days he had completed the 260-page manuscript of *The Messiah*. Thinking of quitting? Don't! 'Be steadfast.'

Project Bangladesh

On the 18th January 2010, I headed off on the Emirates flight to Bangladesh. The purpose of my visit is to set up a College of Nursing in Partnership with the Grameen Health Trust in Bangladesh.

I have been appointed as the Principal of the Grameen Caledonian College of Nursing and will be working in Bangladesh for six months of the year. I will also be retaining my professorial position at Glasgow Caledonian University (GCU). GCU is funding my time and covering all my expenses whilst in Bangladesh. This commitment is part of the Universities response to its social mission which it takes very seriously.

We are working in partnership with Professor Mohammed Yunus, the 2006 Nobel Peace Prize winner, who developed the micro credit scheme in Bangladesh, which is now used in impoverished communities in countries worldwide. This system has lifted many millions of people out of poverty. He is an honorary graduate of GCU and in addition to his joint project

with the University to set up a Grameen bank in the East End of Glasgow, his newest venture is to build a Medical University and Hospital that will provide educational opportunities for those young people coming from the poorer areas of Bangladesh to study as doctors and nurses. The hospital will also provide affordable and accessible care for all members of the society. The intention is to provide international standards of care and the first step is to prepare the nurses with the high quality skills and expertise they will need.

I have already made two visits to Bangladesh in preparation for the establishment of the College. During these visits with my colleague from Bangladesh we have identified suitable accommoda-

tion for the College, including hostels, to be used while we wait for the new building to be completed. We have also appointed six members of staff from within Bangladesh and selected 55 potential students from the 212 applications. We now have to further select 25 from the 55 to join the first cohort. We have obtained approval from the Dhaka Medical Faculty and the Nursing Council in Bangladesh for the curriculum and we are planning out the courses for the first year of the programme. We are also building up the library and lab facilities using some equipment and books from GCU.

In order to establish the highest standards of teaching and instruction I am setting up a volunteer programme for visiting lecturers to assist in training the staff and teaching students for short periods of time. I hope to raise funds

organisation. I have spent many years working in partnership with Muslims and have found that we have many things in common. I have many Muslim friends and I have great respect for humanitarian work being carried out by Professor Mohammed Yunus and his colleagues. As a Christian, I believe that Christ has led me to this work and that I can witness for him in this situation sharing the love of Christ through it. This is no different to working here in the UK or as I have done previously working in Afghanistan and Tajikistan.

Both Dave and I would appreciate your prayers and support during this time. It's not easy to be away from home and family for these long periods but we both feel it is the right thing to do at this time. For how long I am not sure.

Please keep us in your prayers and when I return in April, I will be happy to share progress on the project with you.





Haiti Earthquake Response: Update 18/1/10

A major earthquake measuring 7.0 on the Richter scale struck Haiti hitting 15 km southwest of the capital just before 5pm local time on 12 January. There has been devastation on a large scale. The capital Port-au-Prince has been badly damaged, but the towns and remote areas have suffered devastation too.

The Christian Aid office in Port-au-Prince was destroyed, our staff Prosperity Raymond (Country Manager) and Abdonel Doudou (Programme Officer) were personally affected being trapped in the rubble for a number of hours. They are shaken but fortunately, they are unharmed and are now responding to the emergency.

Ninety per cent of housing in the area where the CA office is located has collapsed. Housing particularly in poorer and in slum areas is flimsy, so the overall damage of infrastructure and loss of lives is likely to be very severe.

This is a disaster that has affected every part of society including the humanitarian community. Our staff and partners have been badly affected. The quake crushed offices and all the equipment and information in it. It is a challenging environment to work in and resources are being stretched to the limit. However, despite the circumstances, our staff is working around the clock to meet the needs of those affected as fast as possible.

At the moment, CA is sharing offices with the ACT partner Diakonia and we are using one car as the other one was flattened by the

quake. This situation has made the response challenging and slower than in any other type of disaster. Food for staff is also in short supply.

We anticipate that thousands of people have lost their homes. There are many wounded. The hospitals are running out of medicines and have no access to electricity. The most pressing needs of the survivors right now is for shelter, clean water, food and medicines.

What is CA doing to help?

CA launched an appeal on 13 January in response to the earthquake and quickly released £100,000 for immediate emergency relief to help those affected. Funds raised from the appeal will go to support the work of our partners in Haiti.

Christian Aid is responding to the emergency in Haiti by working with its long-standing partners in the country. At the moment, these partners are sourcing emergency relief items for distribution to more than 15,000 people in eight different locations. Whilst most of the emergency response has focused on the capital Port-au-Prince, there are hundreds of people in other areas devastated by the quake in dire need of assistance right now.

Our partners will shortly begin the distribution of the following supplies including food, tents for shelter, jerrycans for storing water, blankets and hygiene kits in these locations: Carrefour, Leogane, Petit Guave, Miragoane, Plaine du Cul de Sac Delmas.

Our partners have the capacity to reach 15,000 people in the following locations:

Koral: 4000 people - 3,000 in Leogane,
600 in Font National and 400 in

du Cul de Sac and up to 1000 in
Delmas 33

CA has partners in the Dominican Republic working to support Haitians in the DR for example Solidaridad Fronteriza a DR partner based at the northern border and the Jesuit Refugee and Migrant Service.

The Jesuit Refugee and Migrant Service sent trucks with supplies on 17th January into Port au Prince carrying a generator and fuel both which are urgently needed. Further supplies will be gathered and sent to Barahona and other collection points.

DR partners and other members of civil society are working together to ensure the response from this side is as coordinated as possible. Partners with offices at the border have offered these as bases. The Centro Bono with other organisations is currently coordinating the collection of emergency relief supplies and food to be taken to Haiti. They have a chain of warehouses and collection points and links with transportation companies to ferry this once it is possible to ship it across the border.

What is CA's position regarding military intervention in humanitarian operations in Haiti?

Christian Aid welcomes the involvement of the US military in the relief effort. It is entirely logical that they should step in as they have the necessary resources close to hand. We would hope that the military forces of

other nearby countries would also play a role.

In providing security for the relief effort, we would urge the US to coordinate with UN forces in Haiti, and work under the auspices of the Haitian government. We would also urge that the US military includes local agencies in the decision making process about what is needed and how distribution should take place.

The involvement of the US military is not a long term solution, but in the short term they will undoubtedly help speed up the relief effort.

Significant amounts of aid have been promised by various governments, which we welcome. We would hope that as the true scale of this disaster becomes apparent, donor governments will increase their commitments. Some governments during previous disasters have promised much and delivered little. We would urge all donors to honour their pledges. The help that is given must be additional to each government's aid budget.

Christian Aid at St Cyprian's

We are currently looking for a new Christian Aid rep. Eileen Ferry has decided that it is time to retire after taking on the MU Secretary role. We are very grateful to her for her many years of faithful service.

If you think you could take on this role, please speak to any member of the Vestry. The main duties are to organise the street to street collection during Christian Aid Week (early May) in the area covered by St Cyprian's and to represent St Cyprian's at the local group meetings.

We're also looking for people to help at the Spring Fair on 6th March and the night before (see overleaf for more details).


