Dear Friends,

It is with great sadness that we mark the passing of three long standing members of St. Cyprian's who lived out their lives as true Christians, serving God and serving their community. The first was Ray Hardman, about whom you can read more on page 14. Then Bill Morris and his beloved wife Pauline died within a week of each other. Their joint funeral takes place on Thursday 10th February 2011 at 10am in St Cyprian's.

It is at these times of sadness that we often reflect on our own Christian commitment and look back at our lives, to see if there is anything more that we can do in the service of God. We must also remember that we are not alone in our times of trouble or sadness. Like the anonymous poet who wrote the 'Footsteps' poem, we should know that we are never alone. Jesus journeys with us throughout our lives, even if we are not always aware of His presence. In our times of sadness and trouble, Jesus is our 'bridge over troubled waters,' He is the way to the Father. Our lives are a journey, taking us ever closer to God and as on any journey, the road is not always smooth. It is at these times, as the poem says, that we are carried on His shoulder and our troubles are taken to God.

It is also important that we, as a community of Christians, should always be aware of those around us who might not be coping in their day to day lives or who may just need a kind word of encouragement to help them on their journey. Never forget that all of us, at some time in our lives, face difficulties and need a helping hand.

Here at St. Cyprian's we have a Pastoral Visiting Team who are always ready to give encouragement and support to others or just to be a friend who visits for a while. If you, or anyone you know would like a visit from myself, or from a member of the Pastoral Group, please do let us know. It would also be of great assistance if anyone hears of a member of our church community who is ill or in hospital that they let me know so that I can visit. Quite often I don't hear that someone has been in hospital until after they are home.

Future Ministry at St Cyprian's

After a long period of reflection, we are now in the latter stages of preparing to search for a new leader for the congregation.

The supporting document for the benefit of a new leader that I mentioned last time has now been updated and copies will be in church on Sunday 6th February so that everyone has an opportunity to improve it and ensure it truly represents the views of the congregation.

The business plan that Maxine, our Treasurer, and I have been working on is now complete and has been reviewed in detail by the Vestry. Financial projections have been produced for four different possible future scenarios. They are:

- Continue as we are with volunteer leadership;
- Full-time Rector who has a mission to grow the congregation;
- Half-time Rector who also has a mission to grow the congregation, but at a slower rate;
- House-for-duty Rector where we have assumed there would be minimal growth.

The results of this work will be shown in the support document booklet.

The exciting thing to report is that while the Full-time Rector scenario is certainly challenging, especially for the person who might be appointed, it looks as if it is a realistic possibility. We would need some limited support starting about two years after the person was appointed (we're targeting the Autumn of this year for that) to tide us over a period of about three to four years.

The Vestry has called a **Special Consultative Meeting of the Congregation after the 10.30am service on Sunday 13th February** where Maxine and I will present the highlights of the work done so far and ask for your feedback. The Vestry needs to be confident that the congregation is fully behind the proposals we shall be recommending. I do hope you will take the time to read the booklet and to come along to the meeting so you can make your contribution. If you have any comments, questions or suggestions in advance of the meeting, please do contact me or any member of the Vestry..

The next move after that is a presentation to the Bishop's Staff Group. This is penciled in for 24th February. We hope from that meeting to gain the support of the Bishop and the Diocese for the plans agreed with the congregation.

Then we can start to look for our new leader and bring this long interregnum to an end.

Please pray for the Vestry as we move through this important phase and for Moira that she will continue to have the strength to sustain all the work she is doing for us all.

Bishop's Lent Appeal: Mercy Ships

WHEN retired art teacher Pat Duncan gave a talk last year to our Galloway Regional Council, she could scarcely have dreamed every member of the diocese would soon be encouraged to support the charity she loves.

Mercy Ships, an international Christian charity that provides free medical and humanitarian care to some of the world's poorest people, is the choice for 2011's Bishop's Lent Appeal.

Faith-based volunteers from over 40 nations give up their time to bring hope and healing to thousands of people, serving on board the Africa Mercy, the world's largest charity hospital ship.

Pat (59), from Twynholm, near Kirkcudbright, is one such volunteer. She has volunteered aboard the Africa Mercy three times as a dining room steward and launderer. She spends her time back in the UK fundraising and spreading the word about the work of Mercy Ships.

In the next few weeks the Africa Mercy will arrive in Sierra Leone to begin a 10-month outreach—as the country celebrates its 50th vear of independence. An advanced team has already spread the word across the country to let people know the ship is coming. Recently pre-screening days have taken place to arrange surgeries for over 7,000 people.

The Africa Mercy has been converted from a Danish rail ferry to a state-of-the-art hospital ship, with six operating theatres, X-ray facilities, a CT scanner, a pharmacy and a laboratory. As well as housing 450 volunteers, the vessel has capacity for 78 in-patients with four wards and a small intensive care unit.

Pat says she is 'aching' to join the team again in October when she'll start her next three-month stint aboard the ship. She said:

"Mercy Ships is an incredible organisation, I feel like it is my mission from God to help others who are less fortunate and give them the chance for a better life. It is my faith and belief in God that keeps me coming back to help others "

Growing in Welcome

ALL congregations believe they are 'friendly and good at welcoming people' and-in honesty - all congregations need to work at this aspect of their life!

Just completed by Glasgow & Galloway's Mission Core Group is a new workbook that encourages each of us to look at the level of welcome we offer people who come to worship alongside us or who visit our churches, and to keep working at improving our ministry of hospitality.

In Growing in Welcome, the Mission Core Group offers a palette of resources which will find sufficient tools for the journey in these

"We work alongside people who are experts in their field—mariners, nurses, engineers and surgeons—and they all come motivated to do their absolute best, not because of financial remuneration as there isn't any, but because they are passionate about what Mercy Ships is doing," she added.

"Living and working on the Africa Mercy is a completely different way of life. There can be moments of great sadness when we cannot help a patient, but there are also so many moments of joy when lives are saved."

In addition to the dramatic transforming surgery on board the Africa Mercy, medical and dental teams establish land-based field clinics carrying out free vaccination programmes, dental care, minor operations and medical screening, as well as supporting the training of local doctors and nurses. Mercy Ships also runs education programmes in hygiene, nutrition, basic health care (including AIDS prevention) and micro-enterprises to generate income for the poor.

Over the last 30 years Mercy Ships has

treated more than 230,000 people in village medical clinics, performed more than 41,000 surgeries, 205,000 dental treatments and completed over 1,000 community development projects focusing on water and sanitation, education, infrastructure development and agriculture.

Sierra Leone is one of the world's least developed countries. According to the World Health Organisation, there are only two doctors per 100,000 people. The physical conditions at most medical facilities and hospitals are inadequate for even the most basic of care.

Without access to quality health care, many people are needlessly suffering and dying from curable medical conditions. As a result, almost one in five Sierra Leonean children die before reaching age five.

Pentecost Target for Growth Strategy

Pentecost will see the launch of Glasgow & Galloway's Growth Strategy. It's a framework that will lead to each charge setting itself a Mission Action Plan (MAP) for growth in six areas:

- Prayer and spirituality
- Learning and discipleship
- Missional leadership
- Numerical growth/welcome and integration
- Imaginative outreach into local communities
- Children and other young people.

The aim is to have facilitators in each region to help individual churches draw up their own plans.

Journey in Faith Inter-faith Course

Scottish Churches House to Close

A new tenant is wanted for Scottish Churches House after its owners decided to stop running it.

Member churches of ACTS (Action of Churches Together in Scotland) decided last month that the Dunblane operation, which has been running at a 'substantial loss', should close on 15 July. Redundancies will be negotiated with staff.

The trustees are now inviting enquiries and tenders from organisations who might wish to

lease the SCH property on a care-and-maintenance basis.

An information pack with terms and conditions is available from ACTS. The closing date for tenders is Friday 8 April and a decision about whether to accept any tender will be made on Wednesday 5 May. A new business operation at the House could begin on 15 August.

Lenzie Action Group Bibleworld Mobile in our district 14th—18th March

Bibleworld Mobile is an interactive educational experience for P5 - S1 children. It is housed in a large semi-trailer and staffed by SBS with assistance from local volunteers.

That's where we need your help to fulfil our commitment to SBS and to give the children a great experience.

Each session lasts 70 minutes and the children, in groups of up 6, each visit 3 out of the 6 zones on board. There are a mixture of high- and low-tech activities in each session.

The job of the 2 volunteers on board during each session is to:

- Turn up promptly 30 minutes before their first session starts for training (5 to 10 minutes before, if already trained).
- Lead up to three groups of children through one of the six zones on board (normally either the Museum or the Library)
- Help tidy up and setup for the following session.

It is helpful if a volunteer can make more



than one session as they will get more into it during the week. It is especially helpful if a volunteer can do both morning sessions as there is often little time between sessions for a new volunteer to learn what he/she has to do. However, it is okay for a volunteer to manage only one session. It is essential that volunteers are Disclosure checked.

Learning from Children's Spirituality

People from near and far, from Glasgow & Galloway and the Diocese of Edinburgh, came to Paisley in November to hear from Dr Rebecca Nye on the subject of children's spirituality.

Speaking at a conference arranged by the Diocesan Children's Ministry Action Network, she talked about her research with primary-age children in Birmingham and Nottingham, reports Judy Page, and we were amazed by the level of spiritual experience displayed by these children in conversation.

We fell to wondering how it was that, as adults, so many lose the art of pondering on, and expressing, their experience of God. We reflected on the importance of taking children's experience seriously—never embarrassing them by laughing at them or telling them off for giving the 'wrong' answer. In her second session, Rebecca gave a demonstration of Godly Play, of which she is a principal exponent in the UK. This was met with great enthusiasm and requests for further exploration.

Despite the snowy and freezing conditions, there was a large turn-out at Lenzie Scout Hall on 4th December 2010 to help Moira celebrate her 60th birthday (the actual day was the previous Thursday).

It was a lovely occasion helped along by the lively music of the ceilidh band. Moira had asked that donations be made to Glasgow City Mission in lieu of birthday presents. Around \pounds 1,000 was raised, which was much needed considering the extra hardship the exceptionally cold conditions presented to rough sleepers and others in need.

Ray Hardman

Ray died on 9th January 2011 at the Glasgow Marie Curie Hospice after a long battle with cancer. She donated her body to medical research, so a Memorial Service was held at St James the Less, Bishopbriggs on Monday 17th January to celebrate her life. Below, is the eulogy given by her daughter, Lynda, at that service. Our sympathies are with Peter and the rest of the family. May she rest in peace and rise in glory though as was mentioned in the service, that might be a great surprise to her!

Raymonde Moorhouse, was born in Brussels in Schaerbeek of an English father and a mother of mixed pedigree, on 30th March 1931.

She never liked being a single child, and confided her complaints about her parents to her beloved Wally—a very ordinary teddy bear who was so loved by her that when I met him 25 years later he was wearing a second skin.

Mum's family moved to England at the beginning of the War just before the Germans occupied Belgium, first to Sawbridgeworth and then later to Bristol.

Even as a girl she knew her own mind and after going to the Herts and Essex high school for girls she joined the mixed St. George grammar school in Bristol for her final years where she was one of the few girls studying science.

She worked and studied as a medical laboratory technician, and became part of the social life that centred around the women working at the Bristol University pathology labs.

When Ray met an electrical engineering student called Peter, a keen motorcyclist, for the first time she didn't yet have her



motorcycle license. He gave her plenty of unwanted advice about how to ride her new Lambretta scooter. Her opinion of Peter was, "Who is this guy who thinks he's always right?", while Peter thought "Who is this argumentative woman?" and 53 years of marriage has never changed these opinions.

After only a few dates, Peter asked Ray for her hand in marriage, and after Peter graduated two years later they married.

Peter, however, has never let her forget that she was late for their wedding because the taxi driver took her to the wrong church.

As a fashion-conscious young woman in the nineteen fifties, she was able to afford designer clothes by making them herself. She even made her own wedding dress.

After marrying they left their parents behind in Bristol and came up to Glasgow and the joys of living in a one-bedroom rented apartment in Hillhead. Mum would put crumbs out for the mouse with whom they shared the living room. From there they spent a couple of years in a room and kitchen in Partick.

They moved to Bishopbriggs at the end of 1959 and set up home in a detached house in Muirton Drive. Mum wanted a house where any children could make as much noise as they possibly could and still not disturb the neighbours.

Mum has lived in different cultures and was sometimes frustrated by the insular attitude of people around her. For a number of years she led the *Adventurers* at St. Cyprian's, where she taught teenagers at Sunday school about children in other cultures. Through these lessons she showed others the richness of other cultures and respect for them.

As well as always being there for her own family, she contributed to the community around her. While she was a full-time Mum, she did voluntary work, including driving around meals on wheels for WRVS and looking after mentally handicapped kids. She was a long-term active member of St. Cyprian's congregation. In addition to leading the Adventurers, she sang in the choir, was a member of the ladies' work party, and served on the vestry. Her chocolate and orange sponge cakes and Christmas puddings were always best sellers at the annual sale of work.

When my brother and I got older she went back to her work when a colleague who had known her from her first days in Glasgow asked her to join him at Glasgow Royal Infirmary pathology lab.

She worked part-time while Ian finished high school. Even after having retired she was asked again to return for a project for 18 months.

In the last 15 years, her grandchildren were a great source of joy and she always looked forward to her frequent trips to Amsterdam—a long way to go to babysit.

She always found jobs to do while the kids were asleep or at school, such as upholstering a chair, defrosting the freezer or mending my

handbag. She would bring presents for the kids that she had collected since her last visit: books were a favourite with both her and the kids.

When Mum was a girl she had always wanted to learn the piano, but her mother couldn't afford lessons. When she retired she took up singing and piano lessons, and enjoyed playing, although was frustrated that she learned so slowly.

Mum's Sisyphean task was the back lawn. No-one in her family has ever received as much care and attention as the 100 square metres of grass, struggling to win the battle of the moss in the damp west coast climate :-), not to mention the holes dug by the local resident fox.

The diagnosis of cancer two and a half years ago was a great shock to us all, but it did not diminish her enthusiasm for life. She looked the illness straight in the eye and dealt with it in a totally matter of fact manner. Yes, it was a huge shock but that was no reason to go around moping about it.

Last spring she travelled to the Dordogne in France to be with her children and grandchildren and to fulfil a lifelong wish to visit the region. In the summer she spent a few days in Fort William with the Dutch contingent of the family. We are grateful for the extra time we have had together and take comfort that she remained active for so long, looking after the house and garden and being diligent with her ironing.

Throughout her life, Mum was a great inspiration to those around her. Her encouragement and non-judgemental attitude meant that it was easy to talk to her, and listen to her advice. We will remember everything Mum has given to us and, as we live on without her, we will try to pass this on to others.



Grameen Caledonian College of Nursing

At the January meeting of the Lenzie Branch, Prof. Barbara Parfitt gave us a talk about her work in setting up a college of nursing in Bangladesh. This gave us further insight into the work that she wrote about in the last issue of *Cyprian Life*.

She talked about how the project is being developed on sustainable principles. It will have a proper economic basis so that it will be able to continue long after she and the seedcorn funding have ceased to be involved.

One of the big challenges is changing the educational culture and instilling more selfreliance and self-confidence in the leadership, but things are moving. The students are amazingly motivated and they pick up knowledge at a fantastic rate. For example, most will never have used a computer before they start the course, but in a matter of months



they are highly proficient in all the usual programs UK students use.

Barbara is now back in Bangladesh and took with her £200 raised at the meeting for the benefit of the students. If you have any good films on DVD that you no longer want, she can give them a good home as part of the student's education.

Maxine's Recipes

A number of people have requested Maxine Gow's parsnip soup and shortbread recipes, so here they are for you to try yourself.

Curried Parsnip Soup

1 lge onion2pt chicken stock1 lb parsnipssalt and pepperloz butter1 tsp cornflour1 tsp curry powder0.5 pint milk

Method:

- 1. Peel and chop onion and parsnip.
- 2. Melt butter and fry onion for about 3 minutes.
- 3. Add parsnip and cook for another 3 minutes.
- 4. Add curry powder and stock.
- 5. Cover and simmer for 15 minutes until parsnip is tender.
- 6. Liquidise until smooth.
- 7. Mix cornflour with the milk.
- 8. Bring soup to boil and add the milk mixture.
- 9. Heat and stir until just boiling.
- 10. Serve.

It's nice with parsley and a swirl of cream.

Shortbread

The basic ingredients are sugar, butter and plain flour in the ratio 1:2:3.

To make about 16 rounds, use 4oz of castor sugar, 8oz of butter and 12 oz of plain flour.

- 1. Put all ingredients into a bowl
- 2. hand in and knead until all ingredients are almost combined
- 3. tip out onto a clean surface.
- 4. Keep kneading until dough is made.
- 5. Cut in half.
- 6. Roll each half into a sausage then roll in demerara sugar
- 7. cut first half into about 8 rounds and place on baking parchment lined tray
- 8. repeat with other half.
- Cook in a low oven (about 160°C, 325°F, gas mark 3) until lightly brown.
- 10. Cool and store in airtight tin.



World Day of Prayer 2011: Chile

How Many Loaves Have You? Friday, March 4th



In the rural Chilean village of Copiulemu near Concepcion, young women are taught embroidery as a way to remember their ancestors and carry on traditions of the past. An embroiderer from Copiulemu enthusiastically created this colourful tapestry to depict the theme of World Day of Prayer 2011, How Many Loaves Have You? In the tapestry, we see images from Mark's Gospel presented in the context of rural Chilean life, in a way that honours Christ's presence in our daily lives everywhere.

This year's order of service was written by the Christian women of Chile

A global, ecumenical movement of INFORMED PRAYER and PRAYERFUL ACTION

The WDP Committee in Chile sees the theme question, "How Many Loaves Have You?", as an invitation to enter a process that draws us into the Bible, into the context of Chile, and into the real situations of our lives and communities. This year's Bible studies come from 1 Kings 17: 8-16 and Mark 6: 30-44.

The widow of Zarephath story in 1 Kings 17, when a woman's tiny amount of oil and flour do not run out even during a severe famine, has special meaning for Chile and its history scarred bv times of extreme exploitation. In four stories told in the service, the women describe critical devastating times when people chose to resist evil by forming community. Feel encouraged to consider times in your country or community when evil was overcome by people acting together for the common good.

We are ready now to turn to the Gospel of Mark 6:30-44, where the crowds listening to

Jesus are hungry. The disciples advise Jesus to "send them away ... so that they may ... buy something for themselves to eat." Jesus responds by telling the disciples, "You give them something to eat." It would seem to the disciples that Jesus does not fully understand the situation. Even if they had the day's wages of 200 men, they could not buy enough bread for this crowd. Nonetheless, Jesus maintains his position that they give them something to eat. "How many loaves have you? Go and see." The search uncovers five loaves of bread and two fish. This amount among so many people is as meagre as the flour and oil available to the widow of Zarephath.

It is important for us to seek out a deeper level of understanding by reflecting on the mystery of the widow's oil and flour that did not run out and the mystery of the feeding of the five thousand. During this year's service, we are asked to form small groups and to answer the question:

How many loaves have you? What are your gifts? What can you share?

There is a local Ecumenical Service in St Mary's Church, Kirkintilloch on Friday 4th March at 2pm, to which all are warmly invited.
