Sometimes God says – hang about, wait. Take your time – in my time I will meet your hopes and expectations.

Sometimes God says - yes - I will meet your hopes and expectations, but maybe in the way I choose, and not the way you think they should be met. But my way will be better than what you want.

Sometimes God simply says yes.

The important thing – whatever God answers to our hopes and expectations, it will be good because God is good, and it will be out of his love for us, because he is infinitely loving.

There is a famous prayer written by Minnie Haskins in 1908, and used by King George VI in his Christmas broadcast in 1939, a prayer which sums it up beautifully:

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way." So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

Over the last year I have written about some of my heroes of faith. I think I've run out of heroes to write about!! With that in mind, this year I thought I would write about something else I find fascinating – the story of individual hymns. Hymns are part of the lifeblood of our life and worship as God's people. For me they become all the more pointed and sacred as we learn the story behind the hymn. Over this coming year I intend to tell the story of some our most famous hymns. This is the first:

# A Story of Exile, Suffering and Dependence on God......

Joseph Scriven was born in County Down, Ireland, in 1820, and died in 1886 in Rice Lake, Ontario, Canada, either after an accident, or more likely after committing suicide, his body found in a local river. Little is known about his life.

As a young man Joseph Scriven aspired to follow in his father's footsteps as a Royal Marine, but poor health made that impossible. Instead he studied at Trinity College, Dublin, graduating in 1844 and then began to teach. Scriven was engaged to be married, but soon after graduating his fiancée drowned the day before their wedding. Scriven was a man of faith, but on the death of his fiancée he recommitted himself to the Plymouth Brethren, then moved to Canada in 1845. He moved perhaps to start a new life, but also because his faith caused tensions with his family.

In Canada He taught, and established a home in Rice Lake, Ontario. While living there, he became engaged again, but his fiancée became ill and died before they could be married.

In his grief, Scriven determined to devote himself to a life of service, inspired by the "Sermon on the Mount." He sold all his possessions and vowed to give his life to the physically handicapped and financially destitute. He was especially known for



carrying a bucksaw and cutting firewood for people in need. Scriven seems never to have married.

In 1855, Scriven heard that his mother was ill. He couldn't afford to return to Ireland, so he sent his mother a poem in the hope that it would comfort her. It is the only thing he is known to have written. Later when Scriven was ill some friends found the poem and submitted a copy of his poem to a religious journal, where it was published, then linked to a tune written by a lawyer called Charles Converse. When asked about the poem, Scriven is supposed to have said: "The Lord continued on page 8

## LENT.....

## A Time for Misery .....??????

Lent starts on Ash Wednesday - 18th February. On Ash Wednesday, we will have a special service to mark the beginning of Lent at 7pm. I checked on Wikipedia what they said about Lent, and I quote: "Lent is a solemn religious observance.....which begins on Ash Wednesday and covers a period of approximately six weeks before Easter Sunday. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer through prayer, penance, repentance of sins, almsgiving, atonement and selfdenial." I have to say - even the best advertising agencies would struggle to sell "Lent!"

We tend to make Lent an "unappealing" time in our worship. We choose more solemn hymns. We leave out the Gloria from our communion services and add in the commandments. Clergy wear purple, and we dress the church in purple, the colour of mourning. We tend to talk about "What are we going to give up for Lent?" and see it as time to give up chocolate, or cigarettes or...... That advertising agency is having real problems with this!!!!!

Is there anything good about Lent? Maybe it is time to rethink a bit, and ask – how can we make Lent a much more positive time, how can we help the advertising agency?

Well, the first thing to note is that on some of the Sundays during Lent, in our lectionary, we have readings about the last days of Christ. There is Passion Sunday – the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent. There is Palm Sunday – the 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent. During Holy Week – the week leading up to Easter, we have services such as "The Stations of the Cross", and the Good Friday

Vigil. Each of those services focus on Christ in the way he was in the run up to his own murder. And if we watch Christ suffer, and face his accusers, we see something of real beauty. The contrast of the time makes that beauty even more poignant: the people, the leaders, the Romans all behaved in a despicable and corrupt and brutal way, yet in the face of that, the way Christ behaved was truly stunning, truly astonishing, truly beautiful and full of grace. If we look to the events leading up to Easter we see Christ showing infinite beauty.

Personally I want to make beauty the theme of Lent. It is in seeing beauty that we change. It is in searching for beauty that we find we want rid of the darkness in our lives. It is in meditating on beauty that we find light coming into our hearts. One of my favourite sayings is one by Dostoyevsky when he says "Beauty will Save the World." Perhaps the emphasis of Lent should be less on beating ourselves up, rather more on what we should seek, and seeking beauty in our lives, in our community, in our world, in our church, and most importantly of all, seeking the beauty of Jesus Christ.

Through Lent we will be having some special weekly activities in preparation for Easter. I'm not sure what format they will take yet. However, I think I will take that as the theme – seeking beauty. A time for turning from the darkness of our lives, a time for seeking the beauty in our world and in Christ. Look out for details in the Link in the next few weeks

and I did it together". A few years later, in 1886, he died. His last years were plagued by ill health, poverty and depression.

The poem had been published in an obscure journal, but was discovered by D.L. Moody, the great American Evangelist, and was sung throughout his campaigns in the 1890's and published in the famous hymn book "Sankey's Sacred Songs and Solos," Sankey being the singer to Moody the preacher. From that non-conformist background, the hymn is now sung widely throughout the world. And the words?

What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear! What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer! O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear, all because we do not carry everything to God in prayer.

Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged; take it to the Lord in prayer. Can we find a friend so faithful who will all our sorrows share? Jesus knows our every weakness; take it to the Lord in prayer.

Are we weak and heavy laden, cumbered with a load of care?
Precious Saviour, still our refuge; take it to the Lord in prayer.
Do thy friends despise, forsake thee?
Take it to the Lord in prayer!
In his arms he'll take and shield thee; thou wilt find a solace there.

# Four advent stations – what were they all about?

In our church, in the run up to Christmas, a group of us set up four stations based on Advent candles. What was it all about?

There is no set pattern for what the four candles of advent represent. Or perhaps better to say, there are several different patterns used in different churches. This year we chose to use the pattern that the first candle is the candle of hope, the second the candle of peace, the third the candle of joy, the fourth the candle of love – it is a pattern used in many churches from a "low" church tradition. How did we envisage the stations we had?

The first station used light – we put a spot light inside a made up box with a stained glass


and we have peace.

Our third candle represented joy, and we simply made it as colourful as we could, with lights on candles.

Our fourth candle was the candle of love. For this we had a crib scene, but from the crib scene was a link to Jesus on the cross, crucified. It gave two thoughts – the person born in the stable was the same as the person who died on the cross. Second, we first saw a hint of the love of God in a baby born in a stable, but the true picture of love, the complete picture of love, was shown in the sacrifice that Jesus made for us in his death, a death caused by the depth of love he had for

Our hope was that everyone would enjoy

the colour and the fun of what we did, but see



effect on the front which lit up! Light and hope for me go hand in hand – it is hope, and hope in Christ, which takes us out of our personal darknesses.

For the second – representing peace – we used the words of the angel to Mary: "do not fear." Remove the fear, as Christ removes fear,



beyond that to the truth we were trying to get over in those stations.

# Mission Action Planning and St. Cyprian's Church

Bishop Gregor was elected When bishop, one of the pledges he had made was to set in place a process which would enable the diocese to grow. Over the previous 20 years the diocese had considerably, declined losing churches and members of congregations. To turn this around, his pledge was developed into a process called "MAP-ping," the letters MAP standing Mission Action Planning. for charges were strongly encouraged/ expected to be part of this process, and through diocesan synod agreed to be involved.

St. Cyprian's has not, until now, entered the process for two reasons – firstly, before there was a Rector in place, the church wouldn't enter the process. Secondly, our consideration of the process has been delayed by my health problems. We are now getting involved! So, what is it all about?

Firstly, the diocese appoints someone to work with us through the process. I met with him – Steve Thompson – before Christmas. It is strongly emphasised that the facilitator is NOT going to tell anyone what to do, rather would help and serve our church though the process, as we work out for ourselves what our Mission Action Plan should be.

Secondly, there is a four stage process that the church works through, with the support of the facilitator, and a small group of people from the church (the "MAP group"). The four stages are:

1) Trying to understand our church and the area in which we minister. The diocese has identified six what they consider the most significant areas of church life, and asks us to

reflect on each of those six areas. Those areas are:

- **\$** Worship, prayer and Spirituality
- Learning and discipleship
- Missional leadership
- \* Welcome, Integration and Numerical Growth
- ♣ Imaginative outreach to our communities
- Children and Young people.

These headings can sound a touch "jargonistic," but are good headings for what a church should be about. For us, the "MAP group" will oversee this part of the process, and will gather together information on our church and the area in which we minister, and may canvass the views of members of our church to help in this process.

- 2) Setting out a growth strategy which is realistic and achievable, a strategy which is based on one or two of the six areas listed above.
- 3) Setting out how we will achieve that growth strategy. Steps two and three are the designing of our Mission Action Plan our MAP.
- 4) Reviewing and refreshing the strategy, adapting it in the future as we need to change our emphases, as we may achieve our goals.

The process from first meeting to putting a MAP in place could take up to a year. That year long process would involve three or four meetings of our mapping group, perhaps one or two congregational meetings where the process and the plans can be presented to the congregation, and challenged by the congregation. When we have a MAP in place, then there would be some sort of special event (probably part of a Sunday Service) where the plan would be signed and launched.

At the recent vestry meeting it was agreed

we should be involved in the process, and appointed a group of people – Paul Hindle, Eileen Ferry, Adrian Clark and Jackie Barker as the MAP group. We hope to have perhaps two or three others join that group – if you want to know more please have a word with the Rector – we would love to have a representative, for example, who regularly attends our early Sunday service. (If we don't get any volunteers I may have to "nobble" people!)

So what happens next? I know Steve Thompson is hoping to join us for worship one Sunday morning, and I know we will make him welcome, as well as give him some idea of what we are about. Steve and the MAP group will also meet in the near future and plan out how the process will happen over the coming months. Please watch out for more news, but if you want to know more you can check our diocesan website (put into Google, Glasgow Galloway Diocese), then towards the bottom of the front page there is a link to a whole



section of the site about the Mission Action Planning process.

Spirit of our Loving God, in your mercy and compassion inspire, encourage and empower us to live and work together as a Diocese, to allow your mission for us to take flesh through Jesus Christ our Living and Eternal Lord.
