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Rector's Letter



Dear Friends,

Last Easter, I set an Easter challenge for the entire congregation, to pray for six of your neighbours who did not go to any church. Enid provided a prayer framework which people could use to help with their prayers. At Whitsun, we gave people the opportunity to give the names of the people for whom they were praying to me and I would present them to God during the Service. A number of people did that but others were reluctant to do so, thinking I was going to read the names out and undermine confidentiality. That was not my intention; it was simply a means of encouraging members to realise our praying was a joint effort. Perhaps later in the year we might make another opportunity to present the names to God.

It seems some people are finding this a very daunting task, for some it is difficult to find the right people, for others praying is far from easy. It was not intended to be that demanding and numbers were only a guideline. I have written a little poem to express my thoughts about numbers. It appears at the end of this letter on page 5.

For those of you who find praying for people you may not know very difficult, I thought some guidelines might be useful. Many people feel that you cannot pray unless you use words and they must be the right words. This is just not the case, after all God knows all about these people. So how do we do it?

There are many ways to pray. One is to find a quiet place where you will not be disturbed and simply say the person's name, (aloud or in your head) i.e. bring the person to God, pause for 30 seconds and just think about that person. You will discover that God will speak to you: reminding you of things that you had forgotten. Or, you may think you should invite the person around for coffee. Follow through these thoughts because quite often this is God's way of speaking to us. Once you feel you have spent enough time on that individual, say "Amen" and move on to the next person. This technique does not take a lot of time, but it does help us to focus as we pray.

New Courses Set to Follow a Busy Year for Education

THE Education Action Network has had an extremely busy year, as some readers will know.

Journey in Faith Units 1 and 2 have been presented in Hamilton and Paisley, and Unit 1 in Dalbeattie.

Unit 3 has been running in Ayr and Paisley, with Unit 4 due to start in September.

These last units cover The Bible: Contextual Bible Study, Matthew, and Paul's letters, and all the Sacraments, Prayer in Monastic and daily life, in Scripture and tradition, Liturgy and Worship, and Lay Participation and Authorisation.

Some of these aspects of our faith were lightly covered in Units 1 and 2 but Units 3 and 4 explore these subjects far more deeply.

We are indebted to our tutors who have all tackled the tasks with enthusiasm. As we plan to introduce Units 1 and 2 to new areas we hope they will continue to work alongside us.

Our thanks also go to the churches who

host these evenings for Education Action and to the facilitators who make the evenings run smoothly.

The Bishop's Certificate was presented to those who completed Units 1 and 2 this year at a Eucharist at Holy Trinity and St. Barnabas in Paisley, followed by a buffet lunch.

Certificates for Units 3 and 4 will be awarded in October.

Although much of this report has been concerned with *Journey in Faith*, we do have other resources to offer parishes in the way of training for Intercessors, Readers, Eucharistic assistants, and worship leaders.

If you need our help, please get in touch.

We did send out a questionnaire in 2006 for ideas for workshops and we are still working through this list. However, if you have any suggestions for a workshop, we would gladly consider them.

We held a workshop on Conflict Resolution recently. Unfortunately it clashed with other events on the day so the attendance was not good. However, it was an excellent day and the foundations have been laid to have this day again.

We are planning a day on Eco-congregations and the work of the Church in Society but again the date is proving difficult—so watch this space!

I have thanked our tutors, our host churches and facilitators and it would be very remiss if I forgot to thank the members of Education Action. We all work very well together and with our busy schedule this is essential. Thank you for your sustained hard work and support.

It's a worrying time, yet in Matthew 6.24 onward, Jesus tells not to worry. Instead we are to have faith and trust in God, who supplies all our needs.

So, what is faith?

Is faith the same as belief or hope?

Or is there a difference?

I believe that there is, but I also believe that you cannot have belief or hope without having faith.

One of my favourite passages is from Hebrews 11-12, particularly chapter 11, verse 1:

To have faith is to be sure of the things we hope for, to be certain of the things we cannot see.

Faith is intangible, illogical, but enables us

to keep going, to pursue our dreams and believe that they can be achieved.

Faith is a gift from God and I constantly thank him for it.

So I shall stop worrying and go to Edinburgh trusting that he will guide me (and all the representatives) to say and do at the right time that which will further his kingdom here on earth

A Cry for Prayer from Zimbabwe

If you're following the Zimbabwe situation, you will know that the candidate for the opposition, Morgan Tsvangirai, withdrew from the run-off election, declaring that the election was no longer credible and the loss of life among his supporters was too high.

Below are parts of a letter that has come to Glennis from an anonymous (for his own safety) pastor in Zimbabwe via a circuitous route involving the United Congregation Churches of Southern Africa (UCCSA), which includes the Synod of Zimbabwe, the United Free Church and the Church of Scotland. Please read this cry for prayer from the front lines:

As I sit here in my office writing this update, I have a sense that we as a church have reached the point that Habakkuk reached in the turn of the 7th and 6th century. God has brought us to a point in our experience where we ask Him, "Lord, do You hear? Lord, why are You doing nothing?"

It seems unlikely that the President will relinquish power in any scenario. The army and air force and police are puppets, or rather fellow dominoes who realise that when one domino falls over, the whole lot will collapse. So, without wanting to raise panic, or undue fear, my feeling is that the future is most serious indeed.

What has been happening? Well, after the first election we were shocked as a nation. It was all so calm, so peaceful—the parliament was won by the opposition, as well as the presidential vote. We foolishly believed that we were getting a new government. And many of us concluded that there was no way that the government, and the president in particular, could manoeuvre out of this. He had lost, it


was clear, it had to be accepted!

Oh no it did not! We have seen what can only be described as diabolical cleverness and demonic wickedness in the past months. Long delays in announcements, frustrating the work of the electoral commission, miring the issue in court proceedings and then the violence. Slowly but steadily, well planned and orchestrated the violence has grown. Intimidation has always been one of the political tools of this regime. In this election, it is the only tool. There is one sentence, indeed one word on the manifesto of this election campaign. It is the word "fear". In past elections votes could be bought, bought with food, bought with promises, bought with land. Now the food has run out, promises are seen to be hollow, land is taken and misused. Now, votes must be coerced, and coerced through violence.

And what is happening? Youths are being given ruling party T-shirts and formed into mobs, transported to areas other than their home areas, and given the go-ahead to beat and assault at whim. Rumours are that criminals have been released from prison on the proviso that they fulfil certain duties for the powers that be. Minibuses used for public transport are being stopped and the drivers beaten. Passengers have to get out and chant ZANU-PF (ruling party) slogans or they are beaten. People are asked to repeat the party slogan and if they do not know it, they are beaten.

Reports come to our ears daily of acts of torture and oppression and violence. Abductions happen regularly, murders occur and are unreported. And in the midst the government maintains the posture of pretended indignant integrity, hypocritically acting as though their hands are clean and the opposition had better stop the violence.

What does that mean on the ground in our country at the moment? It means that all of us are somewhat fearful. I recently went to buy some maize meal for our staff and social con-



cern ministry. I had heard about its availability (on the black market of course, none in the shops). On the way back, I took a longer, more circuitous route just in case I was stopped. Is carrying food a crime? No, but Churches have been stopped from distributing food. Even an organisation that feeds street children was told to stop operations. How tragic to live in an environment when doing good has to be done in secret, lest it be seen and stopped.

Many of our church folk learn the slogans of the day for their own protection. Minibuses plaster themselves with party posters as a form of protection. We cancelled our youth meetings last night and encourage people to be off the streets during the evening. Late last night, taking our assistant caretaker to catch a ride home and having to drop him in town, I myself was feeling a bit nervous. Even writing these words, letting you know some of the things that are really happening, I have a concern about who might get hold of this and what might it be used for. Such fearfulness is wrong.

Friends, we need you to pray please. God must hear, and God must do something. The economy spirals in free fall. Food is short, unavailable on the shelves of stores or far too expensive, if there, for the average person, the black market thrives for all basic commodities, inflation figures make no sense, in the millions of percent now. Food procurement is challenging and expensive, the government charges an



iniquitous duty of 65% on food brought in, a duty charge that is levied on transport as well. The wickedness is unbelievable, the lack of concern for struggling people is demonic, the deafness of those in power to the cries of the suffering is hard to believe. How can any in power inflict such suffering upon their own people?

We need you to pray please. As a church, in our fear and uncertainty and concern, we seek to remain faithful, we look to God, but we are honestly asking the Habakkuk questions. We feel that we pray and God does not listen; we feel that we cry and God does not act.

So please, this week especially, pray that we will understand God's larger purpose and be willing to endure with an eye on that. Pray for God's righteous judgement to come, for God to lift His powerful hand, for evil to be crushed, for those that dig a pit to fall into it, and those that spread a net to be caught up in it, that God will be seen to defend the defence-less and father the fatherless.

Please pray that God will hear, and that God will act. And that suffering will cease.

We are grateful for your interest and concern. Let my regular apology for the length of the communication bring it to an end.

May God be glorified in all things.

Lenzie Churches' Holiday Club 11th to 15th August 2008 — 2 - 4pm

The Lenzie Churches' Holiday Club has been held each August for over 15 years. It is organised by volunteers from the three Lenzie Churches and meets during the last full week before the children go back to school after the summer break.

The club is based at Lenzie Union Parish Church New Hall and is open to **all** children who have just **completed** any of the school years from Primary 1 to Primary 7.

The aim of the club is to provide a fastmoving, fun and action-packed holiday club programme in safe and welcoming surroundings, with leaders who care about what happens to young people.

The activities this year will follow the theme of Scripture Union's latest holiday club resource, *Champion's Challenge*, published earlier this year. It is a sports-based programme based on Luke's gospel. It tells stories from Jesus' life and ministry: the story of two builders, Jesus healing the army officer's servant, the feeding of 5,000, the crucifixion and the resurrection.

The format of the afternoon is well tried and tested over the years:

- Registration and ice-breaker games
- Holiday Club song
- Champion's Challenge drama
- Crafts, games, or preparation for drama
- Tuckshop and entertainment
- Champion's Challenge DVD story
- Teaching/discussion time in age groups (e.g. Primary 1 &2, 3, 4 & 5, etc.)
- Messy games
- Final song and depart.

The DVD tells the story of the day in a sports programme, called First Century Sport-scene. The pundits on the programme discuss the day's Bible story and an interviewer interviews the main characters in the story and asks them to review what happened with the aid of slow-motion replays.

The Holiday Club only works because lots of people are prepared to help. With over 150 under sixteens attending each day, we need at least 25 over eighteens to attend each day. Tha means we need around 40 volunteers to cover for those who can't make it every day.

If you feel you could help in any way, we would love to hear from you. Since we are just over a month away from the beginning of the week, please give me (or Aileen) a ring as soon as possible.



This was followed by a series of presentations on




the Road to Stirling






Vestry Notes

There have been two Vestry meetings since the last report in the May & June 2008 Edition of *Cyprian Life*. They took place on 23rd May and 25th June. The notes below refer to the first meeting. The notes for the June meeting will appear in the next issue.

- 1. An adjustment to the Rector's remuneration has been agreed that will now reflect an input of up to 40% of a full time commitment. The Staff Group will work out appropriate terms of engagement for Geoff and Enid to achieve this for final approval by the vestry.
- A new telephone line has been installed in the Rector's Vestry (0141-776 0880) and the Vestry has approved the purchase of a suitable telephone with answering machine in preparation for the creation of an office at church to improve communications and to facilitate smoother running of affairs.
- 3. It was agreed that Gavin Boyd would join the 3C's group to represent the Vestry and that Eric Parry would join to represent the Staff Group.
- 4. A Finance Group was formed to assist the Treasurer with budget setting and the monitoring of performance against this. It will be chaired by the Rector and the other members will be: Eric Parry, Maxine Gow, Sally Pitches, Gavin Boyd, Paul Hindle, David Parfitt and Sandy Jamieson. Others can be invited or co-opted as required and the position will be reviewed in one year.
- 5. The Vestry authorised the purchase of the Bible Reading Fellowship Commentaries for £175. There had been an offer to contribute to half the cost of this



The vestry noted that the painting of the church interior had been completed and that the church looked very good as a result. The Property Convener also reported that the concrete base for the storage area had been laid and that shelving for the cupboard next to the Choir Vestry had been approved and would be installed soon.

- 7. It was agreed that it would be helpful to encourage members of the congregation to let the Vestry know if or when they are moving so that a church leaflet can be made available to the new people who move in
- 8. The Kirkintilloch & Lenzie ACTS group is actively planning services within the local churches that are designed for the deaf. The proposal is that each church is allocated a month in which it will designate one service where appropriate aids will be available to aid the deaf (and potentially those who are deaf-blind). This is part of a move to establish our locality as the first area in Scotland to provide definitive services to help the deaf. The Vestry agreed that St Cyprian's contribution to this scheme will be the Service of Nine Lessons & Carols that will be on 21st December
