Rector's Letter



Dear Friends,

When I first came to St Cyprians in June 2006, I did not expect to be here more than six months at the most. It is now three years and I have got to know you and it will be very difficult to leave. However, I have now reached the age where I can no longer hold a formal appointment. As a consequence, my last Sunday at the Church will be 12th October 2009, which will be our Harvest celebration. I hope you will be able to be present on that Sunday so that I can say goodbye to each one of you. It is still a few months to go, but I thought you should have the date to put in your diary.

There are some important dates to come before I leave; one of the most important is Moira's Priesting on July 5th 2009. This is the second phase of ordination and it will mean that she will be able to undertake all the responsibilities of a priest, particularly the administration of Holy Communion. The only time the Bishop was available was in the evening. As a consequence there would be four services on that day, as it is the first Sunday in the month. The Staff Team gave some consideration to this situation and decided that

it would be too much for me to cope with. We have decided to reduce the number of services to three. Our plan is to have a Said Communion at 9.30 a.m. but no 10.30 a.m. service. The Sung Eucharist will be at 6.00 p.m. as part of the ordination. The afternoon Communion will be as usual at Lilyburn at 3.00 p.m. If this is a problem for any one, please let me know. More information will be given out about this event nearer the time.

Over the three years of my time with you, we have accomplished a great deal, we are an open and friendly congregation working effectively together. The Bishop was very impressed by the MU Festival Service on the 23rd May and he has asked to see the Vestry in June so that we can begin the process of seeking for a new Rector. This is very gratifying as only a few months back he was expressing some doubt about our readiness to move on.

There are still challenges. We are now a small congregation and face the task of attracting new people into the Church. One of the best strategies we have as Christians is to pray. You were asked to "pray for six," that is six of your neighbours who do not go to Church. Then you were asked to give a candle to someone, telling them that you were praying for them. Your prayers will bear fruit when you invite these individuals to our special event.

The Making of a Bishop

AS Bishop Idris Jones has announced his intention to retire at the end of July, the process of appointing his successor is starting.

The electoral process will involve four meetings of Diocesan Synod.

The first is a special Diocesan Synod on Saturday 20 June. Voting members of this Synod will form the Electoral Synod.

The purpose of the June meeting is to discuss a draft description of the diocese (see below) and to elect two clerical and two lay members of the Synod to a Preparatory Committee whose job will be to produce a list of three-five candidates to be put before the Electoral Synod. The Preparatory Committee will be convened by the Primus (or senior Bishop) and will also consist of one other Bishop, and five members of the Provincial Panel for Episcopal Elections (including the two from Glasgow & Galloway: Revd Kenny Macaulay and Mr Graeme Hely).

The second meeting is the Preliminary Meeting of the Electoral Synod to consider the working of the process for the election. It will probably take place in the first half of September.

At the third meeting, probably around December, the Electoral Synod will meet the candidates.

The fourth meeting, possibly in January, is the Meeting of the Electoral Synod to elect the new Bishop.

It is the Diocesan Council's responsibility to have the Description of the Diocese compiled. A draft has to be ready for the June Synod, and the document must be finalised by the end of July. The Council was due to appoint compilers at its meeting on 9 May, and nominations were invited of suitable candidates for this work.

The nominees did not have to be members of any diocesan committee or Synod but should have sufficient knowledge of the diocese, its personnel, workings, buildings, traditions, expectations, trends, options and geography, to give them a feel for what is relevant; and sufficient knowledge of the Scottish Episcopal Church to be able to provide a context for applicants from outside the Province.

Manage Your Church's Carbon

LEARNING how to manage your church's carbon footprint is the subject of a new action pack to be issued soon from Eco-Congregation Scotland (ECS).

In preparing the course material for this 13th ECS module, the compilers worked out the carbon footprint of about 20 church buildings from their fuel bills.

The results ranged from 20 tonnes of CO₂

a year to 150 tonnes.

Just to put that in perspective, the average UK citizen's annual output is 10 tonnes, while Bangladesh produces 0.3 tonnes per person.

Of course, the church buildings in the survey differed a lot in size and in the way they were used.

And the research didn't calculate what congregation members were contributing to global warming.

But doing that is a major part of this new

Kindness and Curry

LAST summer I went as 'doctor' to one small party in Leh in the Himalayan region of Ladakh, to complete and paint a small Buddhist nunnery for up to 40 young nuns.

I have just returned from a tour with the charity's chief executive, this time visiting four projects in desert and jungle areas of India.

An orphanage for 45 children in Zainibad, near the Little Rann of Kutch in Gujarat, was up and running.

But the orphanage it was supposed to replace was again bursting with more children.

New and more serviceable buildings are now planned to house the children - some orphans, some children of one-parent families, and some victims of abuse - and the local community is committed to running the new set-up and caring for the children, making the project sustainable.

In Jamba, Rajasthan, a school is to be built in the desert outside the village so that families who somehow scrape an existence out of the sand have somewhere relatively near to send their children for basic schooling.

As the authors say: "Reducing the carbon footprint of your church is just the beginning... the collective footprint of a congregation will almost always be far larger than the footprint of the church buildings. So the next step is to take action in your own lives."

ECS Module 13: Managing Your Carbon Footprint is at the pre-publication review stage right now.

This project again has local support and commitment, with promises of teachers and land. Lotus Flower will provide the school, and the community will provide the schooling.

In Corbet National Park, in the foothills of the Himalayas, Patrani is a village built in a huge circle enclosing crops, thus keeping out wild elephants (and tigers) that roam the protected area.

There is virtually no central government support as living in a National Park is illegal, but after over 40 years attitudes are softening. Lotus Flower is again funding a school building for children in a community desperate for education, and education in English. With a building in place, the community is keen to provide that education.

Everyone has a right to education, and these deprived kids lap it up.

In Zainibad I saw 12-year-olds working at their books from 8pm till midnight to pass exams to the next stage. It is hoped that they will become teachers and nurses or bring employment to the villages, and begin to break the cycle of poverty.

In Ladakh the projects are similar, with the added challenges of altitude and infrastructure. Children in one village have to walk five days to get to school. When they are 11 they are allowed to do it by themselves! Lotus Flower is building boarding houses and schools there.

Buddhists, Hindus, Sikhs and Muslims all live together and learn together. The two trips have been eye-opening experiences, full of colour and kindness and curry!

News from Gothenburg, Sweden

The Scottish Episcopal Church and the Church of Sweden (Lutheran) are linked through the Porvoo Convention and Glasgow and Galloway is partnered with Gothenburg Diocese. The notes below include reports from Daniel Uddling in the diocese.

Same-sex marriages became legal in Sweden with effect from 1st May 2009. Sweden became the fifth European country to allow such marriages, joining The Netherlands, Norway, Belgium and Spain. The new law lets homosexuals wed in either a civil or religious ceremony, though individual churches can opt out.

The Lutheran church has offered to bless gay partnerships since 2007 but has still not given formal backing to the term 'marriage'. It will decide its position on the new law this autumn.

For the third year, the Church of Sweden participated in the HBT (homosexual, bisexual and trans-sexual) Festival which took place recently in Gothenburg. As well as services, the church offered seminars. And in Gothenburg Cathedral, the Sunday service during the festival took up the theme of IDAHO (International Day Against Homophobia).

Revd. Martin Lennartsson and trainee deacon Teresa Egfors are just back in Gothenburg after two-month exchange placements in South Africa and Swaziland within the east diocese of ELCSA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa).

Martin was working at the diocesan centre in Mbabane, Swaziland, and Teresa was involved in an HIV/Aids project in South Africa.

Martin's and Teresa's experiences from the exchange will now be communicated at parish level in the diocese of Gothenburg and we hope that this will deepen the relationship between our dioceses.

From this month the diocese of Gothenburg will be host for a group of young folk from ELCSA on an exchange with Church of Sweden youth from Gothenburg Diocese and in August, the Church will host a pastor and an evangelist from ELCSA for two months.

On 1st July, Sweden takes over chairmanship of the European Union. The Christian Council of Sweden has decided to focus on four themes for advocacy work: migration, climate, the arms trade, and the enlargement of the Union.

It seems our two churches have something to learn from each other when it comes to funding and volunteering.

Although Church funds come from members, the State collects and then allocates the money. Each congregation decides what to ask its members to contribute and this cash is only paid by members. This service is offered to every religious group. It isn't a tax but a voluntary individual subscription. The State also allocates grants to churches for maintaining publicly important and culturally and historically interesting buildings.

By tradition the vast majority of over-18s are church members, but the last 10 years have seen a notable drop in the numbers who contribute financially to the church.

Because of previous good financial stability, the church has been seen as a good employer with people being paid to do what we in Scotland do voluntarily.

Now, with smaller budgets, reorganisation is taking place with small congregations joining together to be more viable.

Vestry positions in the past were seen rather as status appointments - now these people are having to do the jobs themselves!

We shall watch with great interest to see what new strategies they find to solve difficult problems - so we might learn from them as they have learned from us how Scots churches Kirkintilloch, Lenzie & District Christian Aid Group

Kirkintilloch and Lenzie branch of Christian Aid have been very busy fund raising in the first six months of 2009. St. Cyprian's Church being part of the group has fully participated in all events which took place.

The final total raised at the first event of the year, the Spring Fair (report and picture last time), was £3,115.64. This was in St. Mary's Church Halls on Saturday, 7th March, where our task was to run the ANTIQUES/HOUSEHOLD STALL!! It was quite an experience; hard work, but also lots of fun.

More recently we took part in the Lenzie Churches Coffee Morning in Lenzie Old Parish Church Hall on Wednesday, 13th May, during Christian Aid Week. The Coffee Morning was a huge success, the Hall being packed with people enjoying their tea, coffee, and home baking while chatting to their friends and people whom they had not seen for a while. But not least, the team managed to raise £416 for Christian Aid, with thanks to all those who helped. It will be St. Cyprian's turn next year (2010) to host the Coffee Morning.

Christian Aid Week door to door collecting this year was a little disappointing as I didn't manage to recruit sufficient collectors. However, those regulars who did respond managed to bring in £613.18 which really was wonder-



ful. A big thank you to all who made this possible.

By the time you read this, the Erskine Bridge Cross 2009 will have been and gone. This took place on Saturday, 30th May, between 2pm and 5pm. Last year's event raised over £20,000.00. Hopefully it will have been well supported again.

Finally, to all the many people who have helped in any way, a very big THANK YOU.



Gordon, our Reader Emeritus, died on 11th May at his home in Cumbernauld. His funeral was held in St Cyprian's on 15th May 2009. Revd. Sally Gorton, who knew Gordon for 40 years, gave the address. It is reproduced as a further tribute to Gordon, who made a contribution to the life of St. Cyprian's over many years.

We gather here today with mixed emotions; sorrow that we are saying Goodbye to Gordon; trust as we commend his soul to Almighty God; joy as we celebrate and give thanks to God for Gordon's life on earth among us, for all that he meant to his family and friends. Gordon's was a life lived well.

He was 82, a good age, and he had a good life, not always an easy life - everyone has to cope with life's ups and downs, its joys and sorrows, its pleasures and its pains. Mary's death in 2003 was a great blow, but characteristically Gordon picked himself up and got on with his life, although latterly his deafness was a source of frustration. In 2006, he moved to Springfield Court, and in January this year to Carrickstone Nursing Home, where he was well cared for.

Gordon grew up in the Cumbrian village of Blennerhasset, near Aspatria, home to Mary whom he was to marry in 1949. He was just too young to serve in the forces in World War II, but was in the Home Guard. Like other young men of his time he was called up at the age of 18 and joined the army, where he was soon identified as officer material and was sent to Sandhurst, before joining the Border Regi-

ment, organising famine relief trains to Rumania, and also serving in Palestine.

On leaving the army in 1948 Gordon joined Laing's Construction, the firm he was to work for until his eventual early retirement. Laings were building trunk roads and later motorways all over Britain, and Gordon and Mary moved around as each part of the country got its roads, eventually settling in Kirkintilloch in 1964. By this time they had two sons, Kenneth and Michael. Later their wives Helen and Janette became part of the family, then grandchildren Stephen and Caroline, and Stuart, Alistair and Ian. They are all married, or about to be, and the first of the next generation, Caroline's baby girl Cameron Eilidh, was born on Wednesday out in British Columbia. I'm sure that Gordon is delighted.

Gordon started attending Evensong at St. Cyprian's not long after moving to Kirkintilloch, and soon he and Mary became regular members of the congregation. They were among the first folk that we got to know on arriving in 1968. Gordon's faith shaped his life, and his contribution to the life of St. Cyprian's over the decades cannot be overestimated; he sang in the choir for many years, he was a Vestry member, serving as Chairman during at least three vacancies; at one time he was Lay Elector; before that post was amalgamated with Lay Representative; Stewardship Convenor; he was an expert at running the Tombola at many a Christmas Fair; he helped with the grounds, taking special care of the WRVS roses; he and Mary were a great team in all sorts of ways, for example the beautifully decorated cakes that would appear on special occasions; and of course, his ministry as Lay Reader was an integral part of St. Cyprian's.

This is by no means an exhaustive list - he was always ready to roll up his sleeves and lend a hand with whatever needed doing, and I'm sure that many people here remember his quiet kindness. On a personal note, I really valued his support and encouragement when I was training for ministry.

Gordon was a man who wasn't afraid to speak his mind - he was always ready to stand up for what he believed in - and if he inadvertently offended anyone he apologised graciously and things moved on.

He had a number of hobbies; his garden was a picture; for many years he was a Venture Scout leader; he and Mary enjoyed Scottish country dancing - despite being from south of the border he cut a fine figure in a kilt; after retirement he joined the Probus club; and he had a love of hillwalking: I think I'm right in saying that he had climbed all the Munros.

Mountains are very significant in the Bible. Moses received the tablets of stone with the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai. The transfiguration of Jesus took place on a mountain top. We speak about "mountain top experiences". There is something very spiritual about mountains, something that makes us aware of our own insignificance, on the one hand, and paradoxically, at the same time, our individual personal relationship with God. Anyone who has ever struggled to the top of one of Scotland's mountains, never mind the really high peaks of the world, will understand why the people of the Old Testament believed that God dwelt on the mountain top.

We are pilgrims on this earth, gradually ascending the mountain towards God, and each step that each one of us takes is unique. Jesus Christ revealed to us the true goal of our earthly ascent. The summit that we're striving for



is not a physical location with a magnificent view - it's something even better - a special relationship with God our heavenly Father. Our ascent of life, our real climb, is a spiritual one

For a Christian this spiritual trek begins at baptism. In baptism, Gordon's life was linked to that of Christ, and he joined the people of God. This means that he did not travel alone; we are all children of God, and heirs to the Kingdom of Heaven.

We cannot attain the ultimate peak without passing through death, but our parting in death from those we love is only temporary - we shall be re-united in our Father's house.

Each one of us here has our own memories of Gordon. He meant something special and unique to each one of us, and a part of him will always be with us. Though we are separated from him just now, remember that death is not simply the ending of this life on earth, it is also the beginning of a new life, it is transformation to a whole new mode of being, and to an heritage in which we are all invited to share when our time comes. To die is to go home to the Father's house, not to a physical place, but to union with God. As St. Augustine reminds us "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts will never rest until they rest in you."

The evening will also feature Andrew Martin who lives locally and is a long standing member of the RSNO. The soloist from the Kirkintilloch Band will be a treat. It should be an excellent night!

Finally the Celtic Night features a variety of local talent. Again it promises to be an excellent occasion. We hope all the events will be well supported.
