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## **Rector's Letter**

#### Dear Friends.

Recently I preached a sermon about the calling of the Holy Spirit. Some of the material in that address should be available to all members of the church. Not just those at the service. I also think it would be appropriate for everyone to have a record of the points I made.

The Gospel for that Sunday was the visit of Nicodemus to Jesus (Jn. 3:1-17) where he told Nicodemus that he needed to be born again/from above. Jesus underlined this requirement later when He claimed that, "no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and the Spirit." That comment reflects Jesus' own experience. He was baptised by John the Baptist (born of water) and the Spirit descended on Him like a dove (born of the Spirit). He was then called by the Spirit into the wilderness to think and pray about His call. As He realised this meant His death on the cross, the Devil tempted Him to find an alternative way to fulfil God's plan. Throughout His earthly ministry the Holy Spirit called/led/ guided Jesus; in His dealings with people, His miraculous healings, and in His determination to fulfil the will of the Father.

Just like Jesus we are called by the Holy Spirit. First, we are called to follow Jesus: A new birth, a new beginning, we become a new person in Christ. Throughout our Christian

lives the Holy Spirit calls and guides us, in both big and smaller decisions e.g. deciding on a career, moving, responding to a need for help. Our calling is seen in the way we fulfil a given task as a Christian, not in the task itself.

We may be called to help in the church: as sidespersons, as servers, as gardeners, on the Vestry, in the various groups or sub-committees. Some people are called to help with the worship. When I first came to St. Cyprian's Eric, Moira and Jean had been given permission by the Bishop to undertake the reserve sacrament. Although they had attended the service for lay ministry they had not received a license. They are now appropriately licensed; Moira and Eric as Pastoral assistants (because they were already involved in visiting people on behalf of the church); Jean and Glennis (who was beginning her training as a lay reader), as Eucharistic assistants.

It is now the policy of the Diocese that everyone who offers themselves for lay or ordained ministry should go through a process of "discernment". The Bishop informed me that no one can take an upfront position in the worship without the full support of the congregation and the Vestry.

Recently Gavin Boyd has offered to help with the services. The Vestry has agreed that he should go through the formal discernment process. They have undertaken to enquire whether Gavin has the support of members of

the congregation for his calling.

The Vestry has also realised that some people are feeling on the periphery of our church. As a consequence, a Vestry member will be in contact with you over the next few weeks so that you can discuss any issues or concerns that are of significance to you.

We are called by Christ both as individuals and corporately as a church. Our focus is two-fold: our needs as members and our mission to those who are outside the church and seeking God. It is our responsibility to hear the call of the Holy Spirit to make St. Cyprian's a warm, inviting and pleasant place to begin a search for God.

One of the things we are trying at the moment is moving the Communion table in front of the screen so that we can more appropriately feel that we are sharing together in the service. Like every change, some people will appreciate this and others find it daunting and difficult. We have an experimental period during Lent so that we can make an appropriate judgement. The question is not only whether it appeals to us as members of the church, but will it be more attractive to newcomers? At services where there is a much larger congregation e.g. Christmas, Easter, Weddings, Funerals etc. we would need to revert to using the Sanctuary.

The calling of the Holy Spirit is different for each one of us and alters during different stages of our life. But He always challenges us to do the right thing and that may not always be the most comfortable thing!

# Love & Life are Stronger

# There was, as usual, a lot of comment about the way that Christmas should be celebrated.

Representatives of non-Christian faiths encouraged the Church to get on with its celebration because that made room for all to celebrate. Churches were filled at Christmas services as folk remembered that Christ is the centre of it all.

At Easter, although the hot cross buns and chocolate eggs made their appearance in supermarkets in mid January, there probably will not be quite the same debate—or increase in worship attendance for that matter—that we experience at Christmas.

Yet Jesus remains the focus of Easter. The hot cross bun carries a pastry cross to remind us of Jesus' death on Calvary, commemorated on Good Friday each year. The eggs are a symbol of new life as Jesus rose from the dead the first Easter morning.

Those two events together give meaning to each other. Had Good Friday been the end, that would have told us one thing.

Had there been an Easter event without the

preceding Passion, that too would have changed the nature of how Christians experience and talk about God.

The fact is that they go together and give us the content of our proclamation that God is love—so completely love that there was no end to God's commitment; and also that it is the urging to a life of love that shall in the end overcome everything that tends towards death.

It is hard to grasp this shocking idea that, because of Jesus, there is life after death and that death-defying life is given in him.

'Love is stronger than hate . . life is stronger than death,' say the words of a prayer by Archbishop Tutu and this gives us cause to hope against hope that, in spite of the truly terrible hurts that people inflict on other people, in spite of the fact that our own human life is limited by physical death, there is a continuing reality in which the love of God is finally and ultimately expressed.

May God give to each of us that sense of trust in his love that we may find fulfilment in this life and, in the world to come, life everlasting.

# Mothers' Union Members go to Gaol!

With moves afoot to form a new charity to reduce re-offending by supporting prisoners' families and their home communities, an MU delegation went to Ayrshire to visit HMP Kilmarnock in January.

Eleven of us met at the visitor centre where we left our handbags in lockers, had photos and electronic fingerprints taken and were given badges.

We went through airport-style security scanners, then waited again to get through the doors into the first area we were going to see.

Once we got used to waiting to go through locked doors with the staff and walking a distance to get to some areas (there weren't any shortcuts) and not seeing the outside much as the outdoor walkways are covered, it really wasn't intimidating or claustrophobic.

All the prisoners were either working or in the educational centre during the day, so their cell wings were empty for us to see. Remand prisoners wore blue polo shirts; convicts wore grey shirts.

On each wing of about 100, they had their recreation area, a pool table and table for eating their dinners on. They seemed to do their own washing as there was a laundrette. Cells were small, with a loo and a TV. There were bunk beds in some larger ones. The prison was at its capacity with 650 prisoners. There are a lot of young men in prison.

We visited the education centre where many prisoners take SVQs, Open University courses, computer courses and art classes. Prisoner mentoring is encouraged.

Prisoners have a choice of work and/or educational work. We passed three large workshops for metalwork, woodwork and recycling. There were outdoor recreation areas, a soccer pitch and a gym.

The visitors' hall has a small play area for young children and a snack bar where families

can buy snacks to share when visiting. Both of these are run by volunteers. Remand prisoners are allowed 45 minutes' visiting every day and visits do not need to be booked.

Convicted prisoners get 1-3 visiting hours a week, depending on their record. Chairs and tables are fixed to the floor, but the hall is an open, airy room with a good atmosphere. The prison manages visits 7 days a week from 10am until 5pm, week days and until 10pm at the weekend.

We were shown around by very friendly informative staff members as well as Joyce Bush, a MU member from England who is hoping for our help to improve the life of the prisoners' families. By encouraging prisoners to take responsibility for their families, it is hoped that the re-offending rate might be improved.

We talked with the new prison director, Wendy Sinclair, and with depute director Father Jim Green, who would love the side chapel off the main chapel room to become an Anglican chapel with our help. He joked about wanting altar frontals, altar linen and banners to decorate the main chapel space.

We need to discuss in our branches what help we can give. Over 1,000 Mothers' Union members work in 93 prisons and I would like us in Glasgow and Galloway to find something we can help with.

Suggestions include information packs for new visitors; toys; volunteers for the play area; gift packs for prisoners with new babies; Christmas and Easter cards to be sent to prisoners and cards for them to send to their loved ones; knitted teddies for young ones on leaving after a visit.



# Faith and Order Work is exciting and wide-ranging



THE Faith and Order Board is one of four Provincial Boards of the Church—the others being Mission and Ministry, Information and Communication and the Administration Board.

The Faith and Order Board considers questions of Church government and organisation, as well as relations with the Anglican Communion and other churches.

The Board is chaired by the Primus and its large membership includes all seven of our diocesan bishops, a clerical and a lay member from each diocese, as well as the convenors of the Board's four Pendant Committees:

- The Committee on Canons
- **❖** The Doctrine Committee
- ❖ The Inter Church Relations Committee
- The Liturgy Committee.

The Board meets about three times a year, including one overnight residential meeting usually held in the spring.

The task of the Faith and Order Board at these meetings is mainly to work with the Pendant Committees as they carry out pieces of work at the request of the Board or of General Synod. Members of the Board also have membership of one of these Pendant Committees.

In relation to the Committee on Canons our recent work has involved preparation for the revision of Canon 35—relating to congregational status; also on the grievance procedure for clergy and bishops' regulations.

The Board has heard from the Doctrine Committee regarding the topic for the next Grosvenor Essay—the fifth to be produced—as well as the Scottish Episcopal Church's response to World Council of Churches documents 'Called to be one Church' and 'The Nature and Mission of the Church'.

From the Inter-Church Relations Committee, we have recently been informed of progress in the development of links with other Churches within the Porvoo agreement as well as being updated on talks between the Scottish Episcopal Church, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church.

In relation to the Anglican Communion, a Pre-Lambeth Task Group has been established in preparation for this year's Lambeth Conference and a response has been made, based on feedback from around the Province, by the Scottish Episcopal Church to the draft Anglican Covenant document.

The Liturgy Committee has recently been involved in the International Anglican Liturgical Consultation which met to discuss Pastoral Rites concentrating on Funeral Rites.

Another major piece of work for this committee is the promotion of Liturgical Formation both within TISEC and the wider Church membership.

It is difficult in a short DNS article to do justice to the breadth of the work of this Board but, hopefully, you will sense something of it.

As you can see, the remit of the Provincial Faith and Order Board is both an exiting and a wide one. It is a Board that touches on so much that is central to who we are as Episcopalians and where it is we see ourselves going as a Scottish Church.

# The Clydebank Years

The Dean, Very Revd Dr Gregor Duncan, celebrated the final Eucharist at St Columba's, Clydebank, on Sunday 20 January, thus bringing to an end 120 years of unbroken service in the town and diocese.

The first priest in charge at Clydebank was Revd Malcom McColl who held the first Evensong of a new mission on Whitsunday 1888. The church of St. Columba was begun in 1895—the first service being held there on 8 December of that year. The church was formally dedicated on 27 June 1896.

Mission work was started from St. Columba's across the Clyde in Renfrew, where in 1900 St. Margaret's Mission was founded.

On 18 November 1917 the charge became an incumbency and the church was consecrated.

During the last half of the 19th Century and the first half of the 20th, Clydebank was at the heart of Scotland's industrial revolution and Clydebuilt ships could be found in every port in the world. During these years the church and the congregation grew and flourished.

However, the devastation of the town by the Clydebank blitz in March 1941 and the subsequent post-war development led to the scattering of the congregation and the increasing isolation of the church building. Although the congregation struggled on for many years their church remained on the periphery of Clydebank life and in 1996 it was decided to close the original building.

For the next 12 years the small but faithful congregation continued to worship in the Rectory, a fine sandstone building which had served as the incumbent's residence for over 70 years—first with Revd Robert Haslam who oversaw the move, then with Revd Darren McFarland and for the last six years with the Revd Allan Gray Boyd. Unfortunately with a dwindling and aged congregation, the decision finally had to be taken to close the charge.

To end this very sad occasion on an optimistic note, as the Dean remarked in his address, the congregation will be welcomed into other local Episcopalian churches where they will be able to carry on the dedicated service that they have demonstrated so magnificently for so many years.

# **Vestry Notes**

There has been one Vestry meeting since the last report in the February Edition of *Cyprian Life* and there are only a few new items to add.

Following earlier discussions and the Bishop's advice that, for the sake of his health, we limit the work we expect the Rector to do, the Vestry has agreed that the Rector's Commitment will amount to 20% of that of a full time incumbent. A small group, made up of the Treasurer, David Parfitt, Gavin Boyd, the Lay Representative and the Vestry Secretary, will work with him to agree how the use of this time will be prioritised. They will ascertain what responsibilities are felt essential to be undertaken by the Rector personally and those that can and should be delegated to others within the church.


The Vestry agreed that, for a trial period during Lent, the portable altar be moved from the Choir Vestry to a position in front of the rood screen from where the services will be conducted. Relevant feed-back after this trial period will be welcomed.

The Vestry has agreed to establish a simple Investment Policy to meet the requirements of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005

The various Church Groups dealing with Music, Pastoral matters, Social events, 3Cs and the Constitution have met and reported back to the Vestry. Mary Boyd has been asked to act as convener of the Marketing group and a meeting will be held soon.

David Jamieson intimated that he is likely to be leaving the district to take up a new employment opportunity in the near future so that his involvement in Youth Activities will lapse.

The Constitution Group has produced a revised draft Constitution taking into account comments received from members of the con-



gregation. This has now been referred to the Diocesan Authorities for review.

The Vestry has studied a sketch plan for refurbishing the entrance area to the Church hall and a more detailed plan has been commissioned to permit a more detailed costing of the project. It is anticipated that the new storage facility will be in place soon.




