We have been thinking in the sermons recently about how lovingly God deals with us, even when we let Him down. Peter (John. 21.15-19) after his denial of Jesus, had a special recommissioning back into leadership of the small band of followers, which was destined to grow into the Church. Paul (Acts 9. 1-6) on the Damascus Road was called away from persecuting the Church to the life of an Evangelist. Each had a very personal encoun-



ter with Jesus, which addressed their fears and misgivings and enabled them to follow Jesus. Paul seems to have had a conscience about what he was doing, but, instead of stopping, was becoming more and more aggressive in his pursuit of the new Christians until God brought him up short on the way to Damascus.

The positive message for us from these two encounters is that Jesus treats us exactly like the apostles, in a personal and individual way. No matter what we do, how many times we fail, or how seriously we fail, Jesus meets us in a very special way. He addresses our needs, offers us His love and compassion, and then gives us a new task in His service. Each of us has his/her our own special story. God does not want us to give up when we fail, or when things become difficult. Peter and Paul went on to become great leaders of the Early Church. In the same way, God offers us His forgiveness, encouragement, and a call to continue in His service.

I hope you had a spiritually uplifting Easter and that you are looking forward to Ascension Day and Whitsun. May God have something special to say to each one of us and give us ears to hear His call.

Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway Synod Meeting

The meeting was held on 10th March this year. I attended as Lay Rep and Glennis Tavener as Alternate Lay Rep from St Cyprian's. Geoff and Enid Scobie were also there.

A copy of all the papers for the meeting are available from me on request.

The key agenda items dealt with during this Synod Meeting were as follows:

- 1. The structure of the meeting was discussed and agreed.
- 2. A welcome message was given by the Principal of Barony College.
- Business matters were dealt with including minutes, accounts and amendments to Canons.
- 4. The child protection report was given with a strong reminder of the importance of both child and elder protection within our churches.
- 5. The current status of the strategic review of the organisation of the Scottish Episcopal Church was given. It was noted that the focus of the review was to look at

- ways to make the church leaner and more efficient and to remove unnecessary expense and duplication of services.
- 6. Progress on the stewardship campaign was reported. Glennis Tavener is on the committee and participating in the campaign. She plans to speak to the Vestry on the activities that might take place in St Cyprian's.
- 7. The participants were reminded that Glasgow and Galloway is a Fair Trade diocese and encouraged to promote Fair Trade wherever possible.
- 8. Details of the Bishop's Lenten appeal were outlined. He has designated the Ali Arab hospital in Gaza for the funds to contribute towards the development of a breast screening unit.
- 9. Four five-minute slots were allocated for presentations on GRF Radio, details of an essay and history of the Episcopalian church in Scotland, the cycle of prayer and the growing together projects April 23rd-May2nd.

I believe in....?

The Lenten study groups in Castle Douglas this year took for their theme the development of the Nicene Creed—a story as fascinating as it is complex. As we wrestled with the nuanced conflicts of arians, semi-arians, homoousians, homoiousians, economic trinitarians and the myriad other early Christian groups attempting to interpret the mysteries of our faith in the three-fold God, we were kept sane by a Baptist member who would gently point out that his denomination sits lightly to credal formularies and contents itself with the declaration: "Jesus is Lord."

Those three words became for us a kind of touchstone as we tackled the succession of theological propositions that eventually coalesced into the Creed. If brain-fade, or a threat to belief, or a renewal of the ancient disputes within our groups seemed imminent, the murmured mantra, "Jesus is Lord", sufficed to put everything back into perspective.

Reflecting on that experience in the light of Easter, it seems to me to point up a serious failing in the way we go about interpreting the faith to ourselves. We expect people to sub-

scribe to all manner of theological statements (creeds, canons—dare I mention covenants?) that describe or define what we believe when the issue is not about what, but about whom. The Apostles, from John at the empty tomb, through Thomas in the upper room, to Paul on the road to Damascus, were brought to faith not by credal formularies but by the risen Christ. And that's as it should be for us too. Our faith is not about a kind of antiquarian interest in documents—however precious—but about a personal and corporate relationship with the living God: "Jesus is Lord."

This is scarcely cutting-edge theology. But, in an age when we are once again devising tests of orthodoxy to ensure that only the "right" people are allowed to be Christians, it is essential to keep reminding ourselves that what truly matters is not submission to such tests, but the spirit of Christ in us. A century ago the poet and hymn-writer John Oxenham put it better than ever I could:

Not what, but whom, I do believe, That, in my darkest hour of need, Hath comfort that no mortal creed To mortal man may give; — Not what, but whom! For Christ is more than all the creeds, And His full life of gentle deeds Shall all the creeds outlive. Not what I do believe, but whom! Who walks beside me in the gloom? Who shares the burden wearisome? Who all the dim way doth illume, And bids me look beyond the tomb The larger life to live? Not what I do believe, but whom! Not what. But WHOM!

Bill and Pauline celebrated their anniversary with with their three children, six grandchildren and twin great-grandchildren.



With that mixture of sadness and yet hope we mark the passing of two longtime and much valued members of the congregation.







Christian Aid Week13–19 May 07

Resisting the hurricanes



Chus works with Christian Aid partner Aprodehni, putting down tyres and filling sandbags to strengthen the river bank. This vital work helps his community to live with the effects of climate change

"We definitely have more hurricanes and floods than we used to. I've lived here all my life and it wasn't like this before. Strong winds and big waves from the sea cause more floods now."

Dominica Echevarría

Jesús Antonio Echevarría, usually known as Chus, is 15 and lives with his sister Dominica and her husband in the San Luis la Herradura area of El Salvador. This area is particularly prone to natural disasters. Hurricanes are a growing threat, and the low-lying land is very susceptible to flooding.

Chus's father died when he was a baby and he sees his mother only occasionally. He has been brought up by his sister and her husband. The family live in three huts close together. Chus shares a hut with his brother and the family's livestock. Chus's hut was battered by Hurricane Stan in 2005, and this has left holes in the roof. The family survives on just a few dollars a day.

Chus likes to get involved with his community in a practical way, and has worked on the local river bank with Christian Aid partner Aprodehni. He has always wanted to do this, although he was initially told he was too young. However, his enthusiasm paid off and he was allowed to work, in return for some food. He is seen in the picture opposite strengthening the river bank with tyres and sandbags. In the aftermath of Hurricane Stan he helped to make up food parcels for other families.

Chus is not the only member of his family to be involved with Aprodehni. His sister and brother-in-law play an active part in analysing what needs to be done in the community, organising working groups, and carrying out practical work on the river bank and drainage channels. Even his seven-year-old cousin, Jackeline, participates in Aprodehni's workshops, which use sport and art to help children forget the trauma of hurricanes and earthquakes. She has also taken part in rubbish-collecting brigades.

Aprodehni encourages people to get involved in, and take responsibility for, protecting and developing their own communities. Its work includes reducing the risks created by natural disasters, reducing environmental pollution and responding to emergencies. The changing climate is creating a situation that calls for an urgent response. The increased frequency and intensity of hurricanes and subsequent flooding

demonstrate the catastrophic effects that climate change is already having on some of the world's poorest people.

Archbishop Oscar Romero memorably referred to the 80 per cent of El Salvadoreans living in poverty as a 'crucified people'. Romero worked tirelessly on behalf of poor people, speaking out against injustice and oppression. This brought him into conflict with the government and the military. He was assassinated by the army in 1980.

Chus is just one of these 'crucified people'. Yet with the help of Aprodehni, he is helping to save lives. Although he is poor, he is helping people to adapt to climate change and to live with the effects of natural disasters.

A gift of just £6 to Christian Aid would enable Aprodehni to clean a well after a flood. However, your support will be giving so much more than this. You will also be paying for the education and training of the local community – people who can make an immediate difference, particularly young people like Chus.

Lenzie Churches' Holiday Club

6th to 10th August 2007 2 - 4pm

The Lenzie Churches' Holiday Club is organised by volunteers from the three Lenzie Churches and meets during the last full week before the children go back to school after the summer break.



The club is based at Lenzie Union Parish Church New Hall and is open to **all** children who will have just completed, in June, any of the school years from Primary 1 to Primary 7.

The aim of the club is to provide a fastmoving, fun and action-packed holiday club programme in safe and welcoming surroundings, with leaders who care about what happens to young people.

The format of the afternoon is well tried and tested over the years.

Clubbers arrive and are registered so that we know who is there and how to contact a parent/guardian or a doctor if need be.

Once they are registered, they join in the warm-up games in the hall, where our young leaders, in particular, start to get them in the mood for a fun time

We follow this with a special welcome with lots of singing, actions, and other entertainment.

Next, they can choose whether to make crafts, practice for a drama, or play games. The older children normally go to Ingleside for football and hockey, unless it's pouring down, in which case the Academy usually helps out.

The younger ones stay in the hall or its grounds and play parachute games and the like.

About half way through the afternoon everyone comes back together for an interval with a tuck shop, which gives the young people time to chat with friends and to meet new people.

Then the children are split into groups by age for the story and teaching slot on the theme of the week (see opposite).

Finally we have a really messy game, where some of the young leaders get soaked or covered in flour or cream, some corny jokes, and more singing before the clubbers go home.

If you feel you could help in any way, we would love to hear from you. Just come along to the next meeting on Thursday, 21 June 2007 at 7.30pm in Lenzie Union New Hall or give me a ring.

Vestry Notes

A special meeting of the congregation was held on Sunday 1st April, after the 10.30 service, at which the Rector explained in detail about the proposal to acquire a storage unit, to allow redistribution of items stored in the choir vestry, so that it is more suited for its intended purpose.

The area between the church and the WRVS garden has been widened for the unit, creating more space for cars to manoeuvre. It is being resurfaced with chippings and will be landscaped as required. Additionally, these works are being seen by many as tangible evidence of the healing and rebuilding within St Cyprian's, as is evidenced by the very generous donations towards the project.

The Rector also explained that, sadly two families are leaving, and that as a result, arrangements for the organist will be changing. The congregation agreed that it would be appropriate to have a team of organists, comprising Fred Gunnee, David Jamieson, and Mary Boyd. Hymns for services will be chosen by the Rector, jointly with this team.

The Vestry have held 3 meetings during March and April, and have reviewed recent events, such as the Holy Week services, and considered both items mentioned at the congregational meeting, as well as reports from the Lay Representative, the Marketing group, the Constitution group, the Social group and the 3Cs group.

Future events and activities, which have been agreed by the Vestry include:

- A jumble sale on 29th September
- An evening "Songs of Praise" service, with the opportunity for the congrega-



tion to suggest hymns, with refreshments afterwards,

- A musical event on June 8th, to be run by David Jamieson and a team to support him,
- An informal evening, hosted by Enid Scobie, in the Church hall, on 14th May at 7.30pm, to consider setting up a Mothers Union in St Cyprian's.
- The next "rebuilding" meeting on the theme of Nehemiah, to be held in September, to provide a chance for members to review the church rebuilding activities which are taking place just now
- A production of "Joseph" in the autumn

Property works undertaken recently include the installation of a new dehumidifier and drain; repairs to the heaters, lights and to the vandalised gate; and the church sign has been renovated.

The Vestry were delighted to support the appointment of Eric Parry and Moira Jamieson as Pastoral Assistants, and Glennis Tavener and Jean Kinnon as Eucharistic Assistants.

The charities committee are proposing £3,700 of giving, divided roughly equally amongst local, national and international charities

The Vestry agreed that the church should apply for Fair Trade Registration. This will mean using Fair Trade tea and coffee at all church meetings, and using other Fair Trade products whenever possible.


St Cyprian's is Online

Youth Action Network

The Diocesan Youth Action Network has been following a policy of encouraging local youth groups to host small events across the diocese. To this end we have had meetings in St. John's Dumfries for a walk and barbeque; St. Mary's Hamilton for Worship and Pizza; St. Mary's Cathedral to join in the service for AIDs day, and a youth Christmas meal afterwards; St. Cyprian's Lenzie for worship and indoor bowls.

At the moment we are preparing for a Diocesan Youth Weekend, beginning 25th May in Millport and are being encouraged by the Bishop's staff Group to think of youth workers for the diocese.

World Religions 3: Hinduism



Overview

With Hinduism you can have whatever you want.

If you want to live a hedonistic lifestyle, Hinduism will show you a way to live it without hurting yourself or others. If you want to dedicate your life to worldly successes, Hinduism will show you the way to do so within limitations

If all you want to do is your responsible duty to your neighbors, go ahead and do it. If what you want is liberation, you can be shown the way. Hinduism is a very complex and thought out religion that essentially gives an answer for any question that you might have about your life.

With each answer, Hinduism gives a reason and a possibility of strengthening your understanding of the answer. In Hinduism, the human spirit and God live in the same place but are separate.

The Goal

The goal is to unite the two spirits through a series of yoga that include not lying, not stealing, self control, cleanliness, contentment, self discipline and a desire to reach the goal. There are many different ways to reach the God inside you, just as there are many ways to undertake any journey. Some are easy and some are difficult and take a long time to accomplish.

A path is designed for each of four personality types.

Jnana yoga is for people who are reflective and seek knowledge and find their divinity through rationality and spirituality.

Bhakti yoga is the path to God through love and devoted service. It insists on God's otherness and teaches love of God through adoration.

Karma yoga is the path to God through work. Be productive and strive to work towards high rewards and work unselfishly.

Raja yoga is known as the path to reintegration, a way to God through psychophysical experiments. Self-searching could be one way of describing Raja Yoga. Looking inward to discern the humanness from the Godness and bringing them together. It involves meditation and self discipline.

Hinduism has been practiced for thousands of years and has developed philosophies that include everybody in every walk of life. It is thorough without a doubt, but it seems too strictured even though it claims to be flexible.

Hinduism has relegated everything into categories and everyone falls into more than one category because people are different and can't all be one personality type. Each category is like a roadmap to help you find the right path to God. You may be on the correct road, but at the wrong time.
