Curate's Corner



Dear Friends,

The season of Lent should be a meaningful time of preparation for Holy Week and Easter. If you came along to our Lenten meditations in Lent, I do hope that you found them helpful and that they provided a space for you to come closer to Christ as we looked at His great 'I Am' sayings in the Gospel of John. For myself, it was a time to re-examine some favourite passages and verses from scripture and to really think about what they meant to me by writing down my thoughts in a journal.

Perhaps for some of those coming along to the meditations it was the first time that they had ever used a journal to write down their thoughts and then explore them a little further. Journaling has been around for a very long time and at times when we have difficulties or problems, when we don't know which way to turn, writing down our thoughts, the pro's and con's of decision making or even just writing down things we would like to say but can't for fear of hurting someone, has the effect of releasing our pent up emotions and helping us to see things a little clearer. If you have never

tried it, have a go next time you want to work something out in your head.

At the joint service at Lenzie Old Parish on Good Friday Evening I was asked to speak about 'what the cross means to me' and in order to prepare for that service I used a method, similar to writing in a journal, which I first used when I was preparing for exams in my theology course. I did some mind-mapping. As I began my training for ministry, I learned very quickly that I was a visual learner. If someone stood up and lectured for half an hour I would find it difficult to concentrate and stay awake. However, if they had a visual presentation I found I remembered more. And so I developed the technique of 'mind mapping.'

First of all I drew the cross and wrote the word 'Jesus' on the upright as well as on the cross bar. From there I added key words to remind me of the things that were important to me. You may have heard my thoughts on the cross or even read them in the Kirkintilloch Herald, but in case you missed it this is what I said: "First of all, as I place myself at the foot of the cross, I see the **Forgiveness of sin**, as Jesus in his last hour asked His Father to

Curate's Corner

"Forgive them, for they know not what they do." In these words I find great comfort. Knowing that no matter how hard we try we will never be completely free from sin, but that Jesus in His love for us has made provision for our sin to be redeemed. I don't know about you, but this means so much to me, 'a poor sinner.'

The next thing that I saw at the foot of the cross, coming from that forgiveness was the **hope of Salvation**. As Jesus was suffering there on the cross, two robbers were fixed on crosses either side of Him. Scripture doesn't tell us if these two men knew of Jesus before they were crucified, but since we read that the fame of Jesus 'spread throughout the land', I think it is safe to assume that they probably did. Jesus could so easily have condemned them for their crimes, as the Roman courts had, but when one of the robbers recognized just who Jesus was, he said to Jesus, "Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom." And Jesus said to him, 'Truly I tell

you, today you will be with me in Paradise.' I take great hope from these words, not only for myself, but for the whole world and its people.

Another thing that means so much to me is the **new life** that comes out of Jesus' suffering and death on the cross. This is so clearly illustrated to me as I stand at the foot of the cross, by the actions of the Centurion who was guarding Jesus there. Like the robber, he too saw that this was no ordinary man and as he saw Jesus breathe His last breath he proclaimed, 'Truly this man was God's Son.' By this proclamation, the Centurion was born into a new life with Christ. This also gives me great hope, knowing that those who do not yet know Christ and His saving grace, can, even at the last hour, come to faith in Christ Jesus.

And as I stand at the foot of the cross, I can't fail to recognize **Christ's Victory over death**. What re-assurance that gives me! What comfort comes from knowing that not only did Christ die for our sins, but He rose again from death that first Easter morning, to

go and prepare a place for us in His Fathers' house. And most important of all for me, as I stand at the foot of the cross, there at the centre of everything is love. The love of Jesus, who died for all men that they might live! Scripture says, "greater love hath no man, that he lays down his life for his friend." And also to know that 'God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son to die upon the cross for our sins' is amazing! Furthermore God's love for us is unconditional. There are no strings attached to His love, His love is for everyone. That is what the cross means to me, what does it mean to you?"

Seed Funds Sow Fruitful Future for Concrete Garden

An innovative garden and food-growing project is around £280,000 better off, thanks to seed-funding from Glasgow & Galloway.

Grants worth around £1,000 from our Church in Society Action Network* helped a dedicated group of volunteers at Possilpark's Concrete Garden to secure Climate Challenge Funding of up to £280,000, spread over three years.

Chaired by Revd David Wostenholm, priest at next-door St Matthew's, the Concrete Garden team won the cash for its Fruitful Futures project.

Said David: "This will provide a gardener and development worker.

"Its main aim is to work with all age groups, but especially the young, in making some attempt to change the wasteful and unhealthy eating culture embedded in this part of Glasgow which is mainly dependent on welfare and has some of the highest mortality rates in the UK, let alone Glasgow."

He explained: "The Concrete Garden links with other local projects and brings people together around gardening, education and celebration with an emphasis on the arts.



"It has an implicit spiritual value which resonates with the young and those trying to recapture their connection to the earth and the sustainability of local communities pulling together for the common good.

"Thank you for having faith in us, Church in Society!"

Last year, the Concrete Garden won a coveted Scottish Design Award for architects ERZ. You can view photos and updates on the Concrete Garden's Facebook page.

There was good support from other congregations in the North East Region, especially the Church of the Holy Name Cumbernauld, as well as from neighbouring churches in Possil and local MSP Patricia Ferguson.



Volunteering with



When Andrew Low (Director of Glasgow City Mission) came to our Sunday service a while ago, I was so impressed with the work he talked about I knew I wanted to be involved. St Cyprian's is known at the Mission as the 'stock cube church', so what happens to these stock cubes?

After you fill in the volunteer application form, you are called in for an 'interview'. I was very nervous about this, having managed to go through most of my life without having to be 'interviewed'. Needless to say it was fine, and so began my time with GCM.

Most of the volunteers give up one or more nights a week to help in the evenings, however because of other commitments I knew that evenings would be difficult, so committed to a regular daytime session. So began my Tuesdays of 'Can't Cook, Won't Cook'. This is one of the regular daytime sessions offered at the Mission. Others include an Art class, IT skills, CV preparation time, the gym, and a chance to have a shower or wash clothes.

The aim of 'Can't Cook, Won't Cook' is to give the clients the skills necessary to prepare nutritious food from natural ingredients. A number of local businesses donate food which is almost at its 'sell by date' and which they would otherwise have to destroy. This forms the basis of what is made on a week to week basis. Sausages, mince, and chicken are regular staples and any donated fruit and vegetables are also used. The clients help with the food preparation, cook the meal, set the tables, enjoy a cup of tea or coffee and then we all sit down to eat after a short prayer. Washing up is then followed by preparing the tables and chairs for the evening session. Most weeks there can be anything from 20 to 30 of us sitting down together. It's great fun, if a bit hectic at times, and the guys are great.

Everyone mucks in and the time seems to just fly. We are encouraged to chat with the clients and get them to talk about what is going on in their lives.

The evening sessions are where our stock cubes are used. Each day a volunteer makes a very large pot of soup. When I asked Irene, who makes the soup on a Tuesday, how many cubes go into each pot, she said she uses 24! The clients also have a roll and sausage, and any other cakes, fruit or bread which has been handed in that day. Most evenings there will be around 120 clients sitting down for this meal, although on one evening in February there were almost 200—which caused quite a strain on both the resources and the volunteers that evening.

Towards the weekend, food bags are also handed out if needed. These contain a number of tins – soup, pasta, meat or fish, vegetables and a 'sweet'. These provide food for over the weekend when the Mission is closed.

As volunteers, we are also invited to regular training evenings – held roughly every three months. These give an opportunity to meet some of the other volunteers and to listen to the staff members talk about their roles at the Mission. We also pray together and this is often the main focus of the meeting.

I love being involved with the Mission. We all have problems in life, but when you see the things these guys have to deal with, it makes you very thankful for what you have. The volunteer population is constantly changing, so new people are needed all the time. If you would be interested in joining us, let me know and I can let you know more about it and get you a volunteer pack! I will also arrange an evening – probably after the summer – when you can come and see for yourself. Watch this space.

Music in Our Worship

Fred Gunnee has decided the time has come to give up the role of organist. His last Sunday was Easter Day. A collection had been taken amongst the congregation and he was presented with a card and golf gift voucher. We thank him for his service to the congregation over the years and wish him all the best for the future.

Being organist is a demanding role and there is currently no one able to take it on, therefore we have to make alternative arrangements. However, the aim is to maintain music throughout the services in a similar way to that we have always enjoyed. The Vestry in consultation with Moira has agreed the following arrangements.

As I write, four members of the congregation have offered their services. Mary Boyd will play the organ as often as she can and will choose the hymns and generally act as music team leader. She's done this before and is highly skilled at the task. She has also offered to compile a rota so we know where we are with the music provision each Sunday.

Jill Taylor has agreed to play about once a month as needed if she is here, but she prefers to use the piano. Jill played for us on Low Sunday and I heard those who were there really appreciated it.

Peter Blayden has also offered to play the organ occasionally. He is due to play on the day this magazine is published.

A relative of a resident at Lillyburn has offered to play for that service when she can, but this will not be every time.

At present there is no offer of regular cover for the afternoon service though Mary may be available occasionally.

Clearly we are likely to have a number of Sundays when no one is available to play either for the main service or the afternoon

services.

The Vestry considered it was unlikely that we could secure the services of alternative organists and was concerned that the lack of familiarity with our services could be a problem. Also there is likely to be a significant cost unless we can find students who would welcome the opportunity to practice their skills on a voluntary basis.

Therefore the Vestry has agreed to spend a modest sum on obtaining a recorded music solution. This was given a trial run on 22nd April with our fourth volunteer, i.e. me, doing the honours. Everything went fine, we even had music to cover the places where a live organist improvises such as after the gospel, after the offertory and during the procession out, except for me hitting the wrong button and losing the place in the offertory hymn! How embarrassing—I'll not do that again!

We now have a considerable stock of music tracks to accompany all the hymns we use and plan to buy a dedicated mp3 player so that we are not dependent on me being there with my smart phone. If anyone has a good quality mp3 with at least 8GB of memory surplus to requirements, please let me know. Also if you feel confident in operating an mp3 player during the service, I'd be glad to hear from you. I've already got one volunteer.

Thank you to Mary for offering to take a leading role and to everyone else involved in the team.

The power of standing together

Christian Aid Week tells the story of a community in Sierra Leone that has seen remarkable change.

Tenneh Keimbay's life turned around when the Methodist Church of Sierra Leone (MCSL) started to work in her town, distributing tools and teaching farmers simple food production techniques. She talks enthusiastically about the difference this has

made: 'Now the children eat two meals all year round, whereas before it was one. They are growing well; they don't cry around me because of hunger. They are happy to go to school because something is in their stomach.'

The benefits of regular food speak for themselves. But the effects of the food production group have been more wide-ranging than this. Tenneh speaks of the huge difference working in a group has made to her.

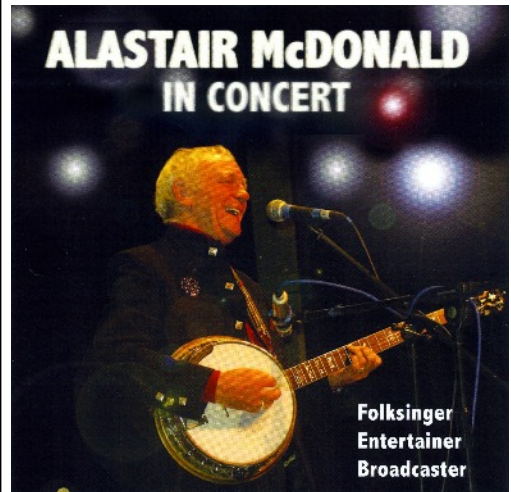

Acting together, the farmers can share their skills and work more efficiently. As she tells us, the bottom line is that 'the group work provides more food'.

Tenneh speaks of the support and the encouragement that the farmers give to each other, and how much can be achieved when the community comes together. Now that they are no longer limited by hunger, the people of Gbap (pronounced Bap) have come together and successfully lobbied for a new school and an agricultural work centre for the community. The people of Gbap have taken their future into their own hands.

Christian Aid currently works with 507 partners in 47 countries in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, Latin America and the Caribbean, helping people to make change happen. Our donations will be multiplied many times over as many small actions come together to make a huge change. But the giving that takes place during Christian Aid Week is not one-way.

Christian Aid Week is about raising funds. But it is also a call to unity – an invitation for churches to come together and celebrate the possibility of hope and life in parts of the world where mere survival can be a struggle.

This is a challenge, because division and inequality and injustice will always be easier than unity. But Tenneh's insistence that

remarkable things can happen when we come together is not new. We see it in the actions and ministry of Jesus, who pushed against all that leads to violence and separation and called his disciples into a new way of community.

Can we use this Christian Aid Week to allow ourselves to be changed? If we can work together, with each other, both at home and as far away as Gbap, then we may start to see huge change happen.

- £6.50 could buy a set of four hand tools for a farmer living in the town of Gbap.
- £50 could pay for advocacy training for two young people in a Kenyan slum, equipping them with the tools they need to pressure their government to provide essential services.
- £123 could buy a reclaimed aluminium greenhouse for women working on market gardening projects in Tajikistan, providing a vital tool for growing vegetables in a harsh climate experiencing extremes of hot and cold.

proposals for two fayres in the year based on our own premises.

The plan is to have stalls in the church and the tearoom and tombola in the hall. This should provide a large venue and reduce the amount of work needed for setting up.

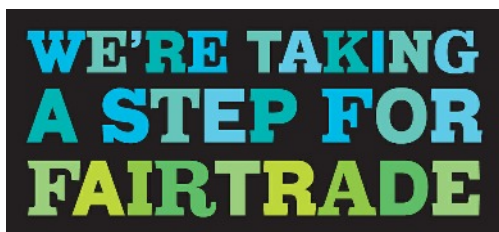

Vacancy News

In the week before this magazine was published, our vacancy was advertised again on the Provincial and Diocesan websites and a link to the advert placed on our own website.

You'll see we have taken a different and perhaps more controversial tack in suggesting that this is a rebuilding opportunity following a period of turmoil and decline that is now well behind us. We've highlighted the commitment of the congregation and the consolidation that has taken place over the last six years. We've also highlighted that we are in a fairly prosperous and growing suburban setting. With the Bishop's agreement, the term of the contract has been extended to five years and

there is an emphasis on the hope that the right person will be able to secure the appointment for the longer-term. The previous advertising of a three year term was seen as a major barrier, since most experienced priests know it takes longer than that to build a congregation.

At this stage, we haven't gone for print advertising because of the high cost and the lack of response from the print advertising previously. It's likely anyone looking for a move would search on-line anyway. I've just done a search for *Anglican vacancies Scotland* and ours is the second result returned. The closing date is set as 8th June 2012.

Please pray that the right person will see our advert and respond.

In 1953 she embarked on a new chapter in her life with her usual verve and vigour, moving with her husband and two small children to Larch Ave Lenzie from London. There she and her husband designed and built their own bungalow. (I believe some of the bricklaying was completed by Barbara). Her only complaint about the move was the lack of vegetables in the shops! It was from this time that she began to attend St Cyprians Church.

As her daughters pointed out, she was blessed with confidence and intelligence and an interest in others. She had a great way with words and always seemed to know the right things to say or write. Her other expertise were sewing and embroidery with an artistic flair well known in the Ladies Work Party. Barbara was a great stalwart and hard-working member of the work party, always ready and willing to help with fund-raising coffee mornings and our annual Christmas Fayre; helping to run the

craft stall. Those who worked alongside Barbara speak of her great sense of humour and the fact that she always liked to share a joke.

Her family was very important to her. She had great pride in her family which consisted of two daughters Linda and Janice who were a great part of St Cyprians in their childhood. The rest of the family consisted of her grandchildren Neil and Kirsten and great grandchildren Kimberly and David.

She was a regular member of the 8.30am service until her health failed when she reverted to the afternoon services as a very supportive member, enjoying the chance to chat over a cup of tea after the service was over and although in recent times she was only able to attend occasionally, she remained true to her Christian faith in the way that she lived her life.

Her desire to keep in touch with friends and family over the entire British Isles means that BT will be missing one of their very regular customers. Each one of Barbara's family and friends, and I count myself as one of them, can be proud of the way she lived her life and cherish many happy memories of Barbara that will live in our hearts and minds as the future unfolds in our own lives.
