#### **Curate's Corner**



#### Dear Friends,

We are fast approaching Advent and the lead up to our Christmas Services. As you know, Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Christ child and it is also a time for us to reflect on the year that has past and to look forward to the future. All of us lead busy lives and too often we can get caught up in the frenzy and hype of a commercial Christmas.

One of the ways in which we can prepare ourselves for Christmas is to take part in the Advent Meditation evenings which will be advertised soon in the Link.

Advent is all about a time of waiting. In Biblical times the people were waiting for great prophesies to be fulfilled and quite often they had to have endless amounts of patience. I suppose that the pace of life was much slower than what we face today in our busy and sometimes chaotic lives, but the waiting is still the same.

Most of us probably feel 'waiting' is something that seems like a waste of time and can cause us to become increasingly impatient, anxious or even at times angry. There are lots

of things in our lives which affect us in this way: rushing to catch a bus that doesn't show up and we have to wait for the next one; sitting in the dentist or doctor's waiting room for what seems like an age before we are seen; waiting anxiously for a letter to arrive offering us an interview for a job or news of a relative who is In an age when we live by the clock, waiting can be interminable!

But waiting is a holy word. It is a Bible The Old Testament is just that; a thousand year record of waiting for the coming of the Messiah, for the great Day of the Lord, when His power and glory would be revealed to all nations. And in the New Testament we finally hear of the coming of Jesus Christ, the true Messiah for all people, and whose disciples in their turn again had to wait.

In chapter one of the Acts of the Apostles verses 4 and 5 we are told, "While staying with them. He (Jesus) ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This,' He said, 'is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." ROC

Moira, Susan, Pat and I took up an invitation to take part in a ROC Conversation at Kirkintilloch Baptist Church on Tuesday 25th October 2011.

None of us was quite sure what we were letting ourselves in for! We'd been promised a meal and conversation, but it was so much more. It was a very interesting exploration about how churches, public services, voluntary organisations and local authorities can work together to bring major improvements in our local community.

I found myself at a table with three police officers, a fire officer, a Church of Scotland minister and a local councillor. After the meal, we were given a series of short presentations highlighting the work ROC has done around the UK especially in the Manchester area. One initiative in particular is the ROC Cafe, a concept that provides safe places for younger people, who might otherwise get into trouble, to meet and have fun.

Then we were asked in our table groups to consider three questions for our own community:

- What do we hope our community will look like in 5 years time?
- What resources do we, at this table, have to offer our community needs?

• What could be done through working together?

The time allocated was quite short so the discussion could have gone on much, much longer nonetheless it was encouraging to see how much goodwill and enthusiasm there was around the table. The key points and our individual contact details were captured and in due course we should receive a summary of all the discussions. It is hoped this will form the basis of us forming a ROC partnership locally.

#### More about ROC:

Redeeming Our Communities is a National Charity founded in 2004 with outlets and partnerships across the UK. The aim of ROC is to be a catalyst for community transformation by promoting partnerships which open up more opportunities for crime and disorder reduction, and enhanced community cohesion. We bring together community groups, churches, the police, the fire service, local authorities and voluntary agencies encourage them to work together in positive partnerships for practical change. As a result, statutory agencies have improved access to the support of community/church groups, and thousands of volunteers are enabled to better serve the needs of their community. This idea is proving to be even more valuable in the light

of the current economic climate and the Big Society.

Strong vision for social change: we are committed to see real and sustained social change for the good of people and communities.

Positive focus: seeing the good in people and places—there is much to applaud and commend in every community and we have seen how powerful it is when goodness is identified and celebrated.

#### **Annual General Meeting**

The Annual General Meeting of the congregation will take place on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> November 2011 (Remembrance Sunday) after the 10.30am service at approximately 12noon.

Nominations are invited for a number of elections and all members of the congregation are encouraged to attend. A booklet of AGM papers will be available at least one week before the meeting.

This year sees the 90th Scottish Poppy Appeal. Poppyscotland uses money raised from the Appeal to provide support to veterans of all ages and from all conflicts. In recent years Poppyscotland has seen an increase of 84% in its average expenditure per beneficiary and the charity needs to raise more money as it believes there will be an increase in the numbers of veterans needing its support in the future.

McGregor, Chief Executive of Poppyscotland, commented: "This is a very important year for Poppyscotland. When the Scottish Poppy Appeal was created in 1921 no-one would have considered that ninety years on it would still be needed. Sadly, it is needed as much now as it ever was, with more and more veterans requiring a great deal of support to help them deal with often complex and multiple needs. That's why we are calling for the Scottish public to give as much as they can to the Appeal to ensure that veterans and their families and Scotland will receive the help they need and deserve now and in the future."

As part of the 90th anniversary celebrations an independent historian has compiled an account of the history of the Scottish Poppy Appeal, to highlight its origins

and the driving force behind it. A two-week TV and radio advertising campaign, currently underway with the theme of Unforgettable, will help the charity convey how the poppy helps veterans today, while still keeping remembrance at its core, but reflecting it in a positive and forward-looking way.

The charity has also launched a new idea on its website, "a virtual poppy for you to share". Whether you want to show your appreciation, to remember a loved one or just to show you care, you can plant a "virtual" poppy with Poppyscotland and share it with your friends and family (click the link on the home page of www.poppyscotland.org.uk). You can also sign up there to receive the supporters' newsletter.

As always the Gardens of Remembrance in Edinburgh and Glasgow will be open to the public right up to Remembrance Sunday.


