#### Dear Friends,

This is probably my last Curate's Corner for the magazine as next month Revd. Les Ireland, our new Priest-in-Charge will be in place and I am sure you will all look forward to hearing from Les (see page 7).

When Revd. Dr. Geoff Scobie retired in October 2009 and I agreed to look after St. Cyprian's with Bishop Gregor as Interim Priest-in-Charge, I am sure that none of us expected that it would be three years before we appointed a full-time priest.

However, the experience I have gained in those three years, especially in presiding at Marriages, Baptisms and Funeral Services has been invaluable and a great privilege. At times it has been a bit stressful, especially when I was still working at Holy Family Primary School, trying to balance work, home life and vocation, but it is something that I did willingly.

In this last letter to you, I want to say thank you to everyone who has supported me in this ministry over the past three years. The help, advice and support I received from Revd. ## From Les & Lucy Ireland

It feels like our move to Lenzie and Kirkintilloch is rushing up on us at the moment, and while there is a huge amount to

sort out here before our move (and a load of collected junk to throw away), we are getting excited about our move to Scotland.

We are not getting excited at the thought of arriving in Scotland just as winter is beginning to set in, but that is all part of the experience for us. I did live in Paisley for a year in 1976-7, but don't have any memories of snow or bitter cold—perhaps the years let you keep good memories and forget the bad! As the licensing approaches on the 11th November, I thought it might be good to write and introduce ourselves a little.

We have been ministering in our present parish of Levenshulme—part of the city of Manchester—for thirteen years, looking after two churches. Before that we were ministering in Oldham for 9 years, and before that I was a curate in Bolton. It was while I was a curate that we got married—Lucy had already been ministering in a church in Mansfield before that for two years—we had met at Theological college. Levenshulme has perhaps one claim to fame—the biggest Indian Restaurant in Europe is here—seating about a thousand customers, with function rooms for another 3000 customers. And the food is really good!

For myself, I have been Rector of the two parishes, but have also been Area Dean of our deanery for over 8 years (Sorry—not sure what the equivalent is to an Area Dean in Scotland—all part of new system I'm looking forward to experiencing and learning about). Lucy currently works part-time in the parish

and part-time as a hospital chaplain at the Manchester Royal Infirmary, but is looking forward to having a bit more time to indulge her obsession—gardening.

I was brought up in Somerset, then went to York University before working in Darlington for a few years. Lucy was brought up in Zimbabwe, attended university in Harare and Capetown before coming to the UK in her mid-twenties—to "broaden her horizons." Sadly none of her family now live in Zimbabwe—others moving around the world to widen their prospects, others having to leave because of the farm clearances there.

We have two children. We have a son (Corin) who is 23, and currently works as head sommelier for the local Michael Caines Restaurant, living in Manchester in a flat with a friend, and we have a daughter (Leah) who is currently on her third year (of four) studying American studies at Nottingham University. For this year Leah is studying at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, in the southern states. I know they are both very much looking forward to visiting Kirkintilloch and Lenzie and to meeting people at St. Cyprian's. They are both planning to be with us at Christmas.

We are also very grateful to the vestry for their support in the process of coming to Lenzie and Kirkintilloch, and particularly to the officers who have done so much for us already. I look forward to meeting you all and sharing with you in God's life at St. Cyprian's over the coming months and years.

## **Praying with Eyes Open**



This was the theme of the Revd. Peter Neilson's address to the congregation at the Autumn ACTS Service held in St Cyprian's on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> October 2012.

Peter had come all the way from the East Neuk of Fife to be with us. He has been a key player in encouraging mission in the Church of Scotland for many years.

He started by reading from the Gospel of Matthew 9:35-10:10 as it is presented in *The Message*. He followed this up with a reading from Acts 18:1-10 (both well worth reading at any time). He asked us to notice what Jesus said and what he did in the passage from Matthew. Jesus had compassion, he was heartbroken at the plight of the people he saw. There was a huge harvest of people to be brought to God and not enough workers to do it. He couldn't do it all on his own, he needed helpers. He asked his followers to pray for more workers and the prayer was answered. That's when he called the twelve and sent them out into the "harvest".

Peter reminded us that the "harvest" is still there as big as ever and there are still far too few workers. You just need to walk to a bus stop and see the people standing there. You



can see in their faces, if you take the time to look, that they have problems. Others may not be so obvious, but he asked us to look below the surface. There are lots of people here right where we live who need help. They may be living in destructive family relationships, they may not have enough to eat, or the pressures of daily life are too much for them. They are all God's people and he has compassion for them.

Peter mentioned walking about the east end of Edinburgh at various times of day and deliberately noticing how the population changed. Office workers rushing about harassed, then folk going to the pubs and clubs, many doing so to get drunk in order to forget their problems, and then the street sleepers. Again they are all God's people ripe for harvest. We need to pray with eyes open to see the need. We need to pray for the workers to do the harvest work.

A particularly uncomfortable message for us in the churches is that Jesus wants us to be working in the harvest not in the barn. Peter reinforced this by commenting that the people doing God's harvest work are often not church people. The workers outside the church are often the ones closest to Jesus exhortation that you don't need to fundraise to buy equipment, you are the equipment and you just need three meals a day to keep going. Travel light!

So he asked us to pray for workers and to remember that we might be part of the answer to prayer. We are called to share the gifts we have received and the life of God right where we are in Lenzie and Kirkintilloch. There's no need to go wide, go deep. Let God go wide!

## **Breaking the Cycle of Poverty**

Barbara Parfitt would like to thank everyone who donated wool for the students at Grameen College in Bangladesh. Also someone put a 20 pound note in with one bag of wool so she would like to thank them too.

She writes: "I have now distributed almost all the wool and needles and over 400 squares knitted by ladies from a Church in Worcester. When the students have knitted a square I give them four more and they join them and make a scarf. They crotchet round the edges and put tassels at each end. We have some really lovely results. They now want to make woolly hats, so I am appealing for more wool and needles for Dave to bring out when he comes at the end of November, preferably double knitting also knitting needles and crotchet hooks. My sincere thanks to everyone."

Barbara now has a blog where she posts snippets about daily life at the College and the city of Dhaka as well as some trips further afield. It's well worth a look. The address is:

"So another busy week with our third year



students practicing midwifery skills in the simulation lab. We have a wonderful mannequin who is computerised and actually delivers a baby *(below)*. We call her Noelle,



pronounced by us as Nelly! We can programme her to experience a lot of obstetric problems and the students have to manage the situation. Hopefully this helps prepare them for practice.

The knitting practice continues (below left) although we don't have any completed squares yet. Students are studying for their exams this week. They start mid term exams on Sunday. I have just finished reviewing the question

papers of 10 different examinations. The biggest challenge is to ensure that the teachers set the exams at a level that actually tests the students knowledge rather than questions that will ensure they will pass ..with an A!"

"I spent almost a week travelling to and from Turkey to receive a Human Rights and Nursing Award (2012) from the International Centre for Nursing Ethics, University of Surrey, UK. This was awarded in recognition for the project here







in Bangladesh. They gave me an engraved crystal bowl and a cheque as well as paying my expenses to travel to and from Turkey.

"The presentation itself (above) was quite moving and I was touched by their generosity and appreciation for what we are doing. The cheque will be very useful and I plan to use it to support the research that we are doing into the impact of this educational programme on the well being of both the students and their families here in Bangladesh."



challenge another when demonstration took place outside of the Grameen Bank complex gates. Our college is situated inside the Grameen Bank building complex. We have one hostel, for first and second years inside the complex and another hostel outside. The residence for the senior management of the Grameen Bank is also inside the complex and my apartment is in that block. The demonstrators refused to allow any one to come in or go out of the main gate and the police supported them.... Students due to go on clinical placement were unable to get out of the complex so we had to cancel their practice and then this evening when staff were trying to go home they had to resort to climbing up a ladder and going over the wall at the back of the buildings. Quite a Especially as at least one is performance! pregnant and due in about one month."

"Professor Frank Crossan from GCU has been here this week working with the module leader and teaching the leadership and management course to our third years. ...he organised a learning cafe or street party style session where students dressed the tables and themselves in a common theme (Frank had brought stuff with him) and there was a lot of laughter during the session." Ruth was a dedicated and faith-filled member of St Cyprian's for over 40 years until deterioration in her health led to a move to a nursing home in Dunoon to be nearer her elder daughter. She died there on 12<sup>th</sup> October 2012. The funeral was held in Holy Trinity, Dunoon on 22<sup>nd</sup> October and her ashes interred beside her husband's here at St. Cyprian's the same day. It is interesting to note that the freestanding altar in St. Cyprian's, which was given by Ruth in memory of her husband, was dedicated on 22<sup>nd</sup> October in 1995—quite a coincidence!

The tribute reproduced here was given during the service in Dunoon. It has been edited slightly.

Ruth was born in Tynemouth, Northumberland and moved to Scotland when she was four years old. She always considered herself Scottish except when the rugby was on. She took great delight in sending David a wooden spoon when the Scottish team received one!

Her parents were Grace and Thomas and with sister Joan (only 2 years older) Ruth

enjoyed a very happy childhood. Joan has many tales of life firstly in Uddingston and then in North Mount Vernon. For example, when Joan (aged 8) persuaded Ruth (aged 6) to play with matches underneath the sofa, they set fire to their Mother's piano music and almost set the house on fire! Their Mother called to their Father 'Tom, Tom come quickly the sofa is on fire' to which he replied 'Just a minute, Dear, I am drying my hands'!

Both Ruth and Joan attended Glasgow High School for Girls. When war broke out, the High School was closed and Ruth was sent temporarily to Hamilton Academy. She must have done well at school and behaved herself because later when she needed a reference and asked the headmaster, he said he would give her such a good one, it would get her into the kingdom of heaven!!

On leaving school she went to Glasgow University where she met Forbes at the Scottish Episcopalian Society Then she helped the war effort by joining the WRNS (Wrens). One of her best friends from school, Bette, also went to the Wrens and explained that not only did she train with Ruth, but they were both transferred to RNAS Jackdaw at Crail and incredibly ended up sharing bunks in a 'Nissen Hut' with 34 other Wrens. Ruth enjoyed life in the services. When she returned to civilian life, she didn't return to university but instead chose to work in the Library Service. In 1946 tragically her Mother died. Even this early, Ruth always thought of others first and she stayed at home and looked after her Father while continuing to work in the libraries.

She kept in touch with Forbes and they were married in 1950, with Bette as her bridesmaid. In fact Forbes moved into the family house so that Ruth could continue looking after her Father until he died 2 years later. Maureen was born a year after their marriage, followed by David, Alistair and

Pamela over the space of the next 10 years.

She became a full-time mother, a role she really enjoyed and her children agree she was the best mother they could have had. She very seldom lost her temper, in fact Pam can only remember twice in her whole life. She loved animals, particularly horses, was a beekeeper and there was always a dog and cat for the children to play with.

Ruth and Forbes moved to Lenzie in 1961 and lived happily there for 20 years. At St. Cyprian's, Ruth was present at all the services, ran the crèche and played badminton. She was always to be found making coffee or doing dishes at church events.

She always loved books and when a neighbour told her there was a part time job going in a publishing company in the early 1970s, she jumped at it. She continued there for 25 years, well into her 70s and only retired to prevent younger staff members losing their jobs. Ruth was again putting others first.

From the 60's to the early 80's, Ruth and Forbes loved caravanning. When the family were small they all went on the annual caravan holidays and Ruth and Forbes got to know a lot of friends through the Sprite Caravan Club. The children remember the holidays with pleasure. Even after the family had all left home Ruth and Forbes continued caravanning regularly. They used to take the cat and the dog with them and David remembers once the aged cat which had previously belonged to a great aunt went missing and didn't come back before they left for home. Ruth persuaded Forbes to return to the caravan site 3 times to look for it and to her delight they found him. That showed just what her nature was like.

In 1982 and not long after moving to be nearer to his work, Ruth was devastated to learn that Forbes had terminal cancer. For 10 months she took care of him and never said anything. She had immense strength of char-

acter and coped with Forbes' death amazingly well – they were both only 59 at the time.

After Forbes' death she took great delight in travelling around the world with Pam, an air stewardess with Lufthansa. She went to lots of interesting places and enjoyed riding elephants and camels, visiting the Taj Mahal and the Great Wall of China, going to Latin America and Australia. In 1984 she moved back to Lenzie and lived there for another 25 years.

Also around that time she became a grandmother for the first time when Delia, Alistair's daughter, was born. She adored Delia and loved being a Gran! She saw a lot of Delia when she was young. remembers a lunch one day when Delia was very small when Ruth got up from the table to get a wine glass for Delia to drink the juice from her fruit! Maureen commented that she would not have been allowed to do that. Ruth replied that it wasn't ok for a child to do that but it was ok for a grandchild!! She was overjoyed when Pam had two sons, Oliver and Florian and loved going over to Germany to see them. She was immensely proud of the achievements of her grandchildren.

In 2002, Ruth had Alzheimers Disease diagnosed. She bore that with amazing dignity and stayed in her home in Lenzie as long as she could. When it was time to move to a care home she never complained and settled well.

All her life she has had a strong faith and that helped her get though the difficulties life threw at her. Joan says in all of the 88 years she and Ruth never fell out. Surely not many sisters can say that. Ruth had an amazing nature, always thinking of others before herself. Everybody who knew her loved her. In her latter days at Ardenlee Care Home everyone loved her. Her faith sustained her through her life and now, as she often said, she is reunited with her beloved parents and husband in God's kingdom.
