

From the Rector



Dear Friends,

I have recently had the privilege of being appointed the "Bishop's Advisor for Healing Ministry" for our diocese. It is not an onerous task, but for me personally it is an important one, and hopefully one I have some insight and experience of from previous times "down south."

It is a role I am particularly looking forward to, and the first event I am involved in will be on Saturday 14th November, when we will hold a morning here at St. Cyprian's on healing for anyone who wishes to come along (10am start), with time spent thinking about what the bible has to say about healing, thinking about the practical issues surrounding the healing ministry, and then spending some time in worship where people will have the chance to receive prayer for healing if they want.

Of course, people have all sorts of different reactions to the ministry of healing. For some, it is obvious that we as a church should offer prayer for healing. Many have very fixed ideas of how a church should offer such prayer. For others, it can be a bit alarming, or worrying. For the odd person, it can seem "way out" following experiences in other traditions and movements within the wider church. For some it can feel embarrassing. Others feel it doesn't

have any point. Others are worried, anxious, wondering how people (themselves) will cope if they don't obviously get healed. I even heard someone say once "I was too sick to get to the healing service!"

I don't think it is surprising that there is such a range of reactions. We are different people, with different experiences, different traditions, and we do respond differently to things happening in our churches. However, I do hope that we can get past our "kneejerk" reactions to think about what the healing ministry is about. I thought I might say a few things here about this aspect of church life and ministry.

Firstly, the healing ministry acknowledges that God works in our lives and makes a difference in our lives. It's sometimes difficult to discern what God is doing, and sometimes we may feel impatient with him, but if we pray, we believe God makes a difference to us. It is obvious, I suppose, if we believe God is who he is – creator, sustainer, life-giver, that we believe he makes a difference, but sometimes we need to be reminded, and sometimes when we are struggling, we need to rely on other people believing that God makes a difference.

Secondly, I believe prayer for healing should simply be a natural part of our church Continued overleaf

and worship life. Not spectacular. Definitely not freaky! Not scary. Not denigrated. Just natural, part of our everyday life of worship. As natural and normal as saying the creed, or reading the bible, or having our intercessions, or sharing bread and wine.

Thirdly, healing says something about the infinite nature of God. If God is beyond us as infinite, then there will be many many times when we will not understand, when we will simply have to trust him. There are times in healing when we might ask — what was that about? What did that achieve? Did things change? Sometimes it can feel like prayer for healing is worthless. It should lead us to the question — can we trust God? He is working, but I'm not sure I know how, and perhaps I never will! But that is our calling — to trust, and trust is a huge part of the ministry of healing — it is putting our lives into the hand of God.

In terms of St. Cyprian's, everyone is welcome to come along to our "healing morning" at St. Cyprian's. We are also

thinking around how we might offer more prayer for healing in an appropriate way for us, and somewhere else in this magazine I have written a little about the practicalities. Here I just want to say that we are not going down the paths of the weird! We are not walking into the place of the bizarre. More and more I hope we are acknowledging that God does make a difference to our lives, that God does want to give so much to us, and acknowledging that we want to trust God more and more. It is for those reasons I believe we do get involved in prayer for healing, for those reasons prayers for healing should be part of our Christian life together.

The Story of the Hymn . . . — Glasgow's finest incomer!

John Dix was a surgeon in Bristol at the beginning of the 19th century. He was also a writer, particularly remembered for writing a biography of a minor poet called Thomas Chatterton, as well as a book of pen pictures of famous preachers. When his son was born on 14th June 1837 he named him in honour of Thomas Chatterton, so William Chatterton Dix was born.

William Chatterton Dix studied at the grammar school in Bristol to enter business, and on leaving school became a clerk in the post office in Bristol, then later manager of a Marine Insurance Company in Glasgow, a job he held for the rest of his working life.

Chatterton Dix had a particular interest in poetry for worship, and began to write. At the age of 29 he was struck with a life-threatening illness, spent many months in bed and was severely depressed, and had some sort of religious conversion experience in this period. Ironically this period was the most productive period of his life when he wrote many of his best known hymns. Also he wrote hymns based on Greek Orthodox psalmody, and translated hymns from the Abyssinian (Coptic) church.

William Chatterton Dix published a number of collections of his hymns, as well as two devotional books. However, his hymns became significant when contributed to "Hymns Ancient and Modern." In the early 19th century there was a vast range of hymn books used in the Anglican Church, and an increasing drive to have one book which would be embraced by most of the church. Henry Williams Baker was a key figure in this,



collecting the important hymns that were around, and inviting new hymns to be submitted. Many of William Chatterton Dix's hymns were submitted, accepted, and through this project found widespread fame. The first "print run" for the new hymn book was in March, 1861.

William Chatterton Dix died in September 1898 while living in Cheddar, Somerset, where he is buried in the local parish church.

The remarkable thing about William Chatterton Dix as a hymn writer is how little is known about him, for a man of his great stature as a hymn writer.

He was married to Juliet and had eight children. His fifth child was Hilda Sandford who became a noted artist and illustrator. Another daughter – Gertrude Nicol was a novelist and noted socialist, and someone with a colourful personal life! But then many questions: Why come to Glasgow? Where did he live in Glasgow? Why did he die in Cheddar? All of this seems unknown.

We do know many of the hymns he wrote including "As with gladness men of old," "I heard the voice of Jesus say," "What child is this...." However, perhaps the greatest of his hymns was:

Harvest Thank You

I know that Glasgow City Mission always send an 'official' thank you when donations are handed in, however can I also thank everyone at St Cyprian's for all the support you give.

Some of them are really good cooks, and the classes give them the confidence to try things out at home.

Come and see for yourselves, visitors are always welcome, and I could easily arrange a tour if there is enough interest. There are also leaflets at the back of the church if you would like to volunteer – or have a look at their website.

Bits of our Service

The Peace

Thirty-odd years ago I was in a service. We were part way through, and the words were spoken: "Peace be with you," to which we all responded: "And also with you." I turned and held out my hand to someone in the row behind who said to me: "Sorry I don't believe in that!" He refused to shake hands with me. I felt totally humiliated, rejected. Luckily I'm tough enough to put up with it!

I know no-one today would do that, but it does show something: the controversy which surrounded the peace then, and still does today. It is without doubt the most controversial part of modern liturgical reforms – the introduction of the peace, where we actually share the peace!

Many people love the peace, and some love the peace very enthusiastically! There is no question that the majority of people in the Episcopal Church appreciate the peace. There are others who feel uncomfortable with the peace, that it isn't part of the traditional worship, that the

breaking out into the shaking of hands is an interruption to their time of worship with God. They question: what is the point of it, why do it?

Well, I have to be honest

I love the peace, and I think it is not a gimmick, it says something profound about what we are doing when we worship together.

There is a bit in the bible (Matthew 5:23-24) where it says: "So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift." The passage makes it clear that before we come to God to offer our gifts – to offer ourselves to God, we should be reconciled to each other. We do come to God at the communion and offer ourselves – can we do that when we are not at one with each other? The peace is about that.

Of course some would argue that sharing the peace is not a moment of reconciliation with someone we had a row with, and they are right. However we do a lot in our worship – a major component of our worship – is that we do symbolic things which represent what we

want to say, represent what we believe. We give a little in the collection as a sign that we dedicate our possessions to God. We say prayers, as a token of all we say, wanting all our words to be glorifying to God. We take bread and wine as a sign we want to be fed by Christ. The actions we do, the tokens we give are important in what we are saying. The peace is one of those actions, one of those tokens.

When we share the peace we may not be putting to bed an argument, or differences that we have with others. BUT we are saying in an active and symbolic way – we want to be at

peace with our brothers and sisters in Christ – ALL our brothers and sisters in Christ. And we are going to speak and act that commitment as we share the peace.

On one level the peace is greeting friends. It is helping the lonely to feel part of our family*. It is sharing something with those who may not experience much love in their world. It may feel a bit chaotic (and if the chaos is a bit much for you, then please stay in your pews and let others come to you). However, please remember it is symbolic of something much deeper, much more profound. It is symbolic of our Christian yearning to be at one with one another, our yearning to make peace with others when our relationship might be marred. And for that reason I do believe it is an essential part of our worship together.

*As a footnote, one of the most profound things I heard someone say was in a bereavement group I ran for a time. The person, a widow, said something like: "now that I have lost my husband, the peace is the only time in the week when someone touches me." It reduced the group to tears.

May we never be hasty in judgement, and always generous.


Let us take time for all things; make us grow calm, serene, gentle.

Healing Ministry - Why? How? When?
