We can rejoice that the world comes together for the Games. This doesn't mean that divisions among nations are completely forgotten, but when athletes from all over the world live together in the same village, eat together in the same vast dining hall and get to know each other through conversations and discussions, this can only be a good thing. Human contact is a great thing for bringing people together and creating more understanding between cultures and traditions.

Local communities have also come together, as was clearly demonstrated in the carrying of the Olympic flame from Athens around the British Isles. And who could have missed the great significance in the opening ceremony when the individual stems were lit and then brought together to form a united cauldron of flame. This symbolic act spoke powerfully of God's purpose to unite all things in Christ. The Olympic volunteers who gave

of their time and energy at the Games will, I am sure, have found that serving others in new ways is wonderfully rewarding.

Churches throughout Great Britain have also come together during the time of the Olympics and offered fellowship and friendship by getting into the Olympic spirit and holding events for their communities.

Watching the Games also encourages people of all ages to take up sport and to try to keep themselves healthy and the stories we have heard of athletes who were inspired by previous Olympic Games to take up a sport and go on to compete this year is incredible.

We also have the Paralympic Games to look forward to and be amazed by. For those involved in the Paralympic Games the sheer dedication and will to succeed is a lesson to us all.

The Olympic Games (and the Paralympic Games) are a powerful reminder of the words in 2 Timothy that "an athlete does not receive the victor's crown unless he competes according to the rules." It's heartening to see that those badminton players were disqualified for deliberately losing their matches and that the stringent testing of athletes for the use of illegal drugs continues to increase. There are many more references to participating in a race in the New Testament and the majority speak of the need to persevere and to continue right to the finish in the "race" that is the Christian way of life.

Someone has written that if there were a Gold Medal for moaning about the Olympics then it would be won by Great Britain! However, Paul did not hesitate to use the positive aspects of the Olympic and other Games of his time to illustrate his God-given teaching. There were doubtless many things that he could have criticised about the Games of his era but he chose to speak of their athletes as good examples of what is needed in the Christian life

Let us celebrate the good things that have come from these Games and try as hard as we can to be good Christians, running the race to win and not giving up when we meet the first hurdle

I hope you have all had a good summer and have managed to get a break (or maybe even two) and that you have returned to Church refreshed and looking forward to new challenges when our new Priest-in-Charge, Rev. Les Ireland and his wife Lucy join us at the end of October/beginning of November. Like the athletes in the Games, let us ask God to unite us in support of Les's ministry here at St. Cyprian's, working together with great hope for our future, never giving up, but persevering in all things.

Robert (Bob) Provan 1919-2012

July 14th saw the passing of a true gentleman at the ripe old age of 93. His funeral was held in St Cyprian's on 27th July 2012 and it was a real celebration of a life well lived. There were reminiscences of his life, readings, poetry and of course singing, one of his great loves. Members from two of the choirs of which he had been a member attended and swelled the singing.

Bob was born in Glasgow on 24th May 1919. At the age of five he sailed with his parents to Hong Kong where his father took up the position of Marine Engineer with the Whampoa Dock Company.

By all accounts he was a bit of a rascal at school in Hong Kong. His son Alan, who spoke about reflections of his father at the funeral, remembers being regaled with stories of China. Stories of stink bombs and catapult firing; it seems though, as Alan said, he was a lucky boy. Like Oor Wullie or Just William he managed to extricate himself from the consequences of his mischief. Clearly this was a happy and influential period in his life and he would often relate stories of this time to friends and family and in later years to the staff at Buchanan House.

The family returned home to Glasgow every five years and in 1935 Bob remained in Glasgow with his grandparents so that he could complete his education at Queenspark Secondary School.

The war intervened and Bob didn't see his parents again until the sixties when they came back to Scotland. His mum and sister Ann were evacuated to Australia during the war years and Ann met and married her husband there. She still lives in Australia and has two sons and four grandchildren. Bob didn't see her again until 1981 when they were reunited after 46 years!

Bob also married. He had a very happy marriage to Grace for many years until her death in 1988. They had two sons Alan and Melvin and five grandchildren.

Bob had a career in the steel industry as a metallurgist. He could tell you the right grade of steel to use for any application and what was added to the steel to give it the right properties plus how to test for those properties.

After Grace's death, Bob studied Biology with the Open University. He also joined a German class where he met Vivienne in 1991. The Biology degree fell by the wayside when he married Vivienne in September 1992.

Bob had a great love of music and especially singing. He was an active member of the Phoenix Choir for over 40 years and became its President in 1986 and then Honorary Vice President. He retired from active involvement at the age of 80, but remained on the list of Honorary Members of the choir till his death.

The Phoenix Choir saw him travel far and wide, to North America, Europe, as well as many places in the U.K. After retiring from the Phoenix Choir, he joined the joint churches choir Concordia who came to pay their respects to Bob by singing at his funeral. One former member of the choir said that the choir's cherished memory of Bob was that he was the most accurate singer of bass lines.

He learned to play the violin as a boy, but then more or less gave it up until Vivienne encouraged him to start again in his late 70s. He then played with the Glasgow Senior Citizens' Orchestra raising money for charity.

Bob had always enjoyed painting. He took up water colour painting in his retirement. After he had been diagnosed with dementia a few years ago, he was introduced to a special painting class where he received one to one tuition in oils at age 89. He has three and a half oil paintings to his credit (unfortunately he was

unable to finish the last one).

Bob was a keen gardener and grew vegetables and tomatoes and always said he was a 'veggie' man and not a flower man. However, Vivienne knew that deep down he really loved flowers as he would buy her a bunch nearly every week.

Vivenne also recalls that nothing was too much trouble for Bob whether ironing, cleaning the kitchen floor or taking out the rubbish, though, sadly, his cooking skills were not quite so hot!

On 1st October 2009, Bob suffered a small stroke which took him into hospital and from there into Buchanan Care Home in Bearsden. After a while he settled quite well and was well liked. They enjoyed his mischievous nature and loved and cared for him in an exemplary way, especially towards the end.

Bob had an unwavering Christian faith. He had strong beliefs and was well versed in scripture, always sharing his knowledge and his faith in many study groups. The Sunday before he died Moira was able to share in a short service of anointing with Bob and Vivienne. Although by that time Bob couldn't speak, his faith was still evident in his actions and reactions to the service.

In his Reflections, Alan said, when thinking of his father, we should think of the letter L. Three words beginning with L are particularly relevant: Lucky, Life, and Love.

He was a lucky man to have lived the life he did. A life that embraced love in many different ways.

He was lucky to have the experience of growing up in Hong Kong and his family is lucky that he came back to the UK when he did otherwise the family wouldn't have existed.

Love is perhaps the most important word. He was lucky to have the love of two women in his life. He had a love of the family both the Provans and the extended Robertson families.



love of the outdoors, love of the church, love of travel and love of music.

However, reminiscing with his cousin Roger in Australia brought up another L word. Roger talked about Bob's larrikin spirit, an Australian term that can be used to refer to a mischievous spirit, a part of Bob's character we've already commented upon.

So Alan finished by saying Bob was a lucky man who led a wonderful life embracing and giving love with a larrikin spirit!

Bob will be sorely missed by his family and his many friends and not least by the congregation here at St. Cyprian's. We pray that he will rest in peace and rise in glory.

I would like to thank all friends, family and members of the congregation for their kind thoughts and comfort in recent weeks. I have received over a hundred cards and letters and the support at the funeral was overwhelming.

Do you Gift Aid your donations to St Cyprian's?

If you do you are giving substantial, additional funds to the Church for which we are very grateful.

Here are the basics:

- Any taxpayer can use Gift Aid.
- Unlike the old covenant, there is neither a minimum amount nor a minimum period.
- Even a single donation can be covered.
- All you have to do is sign a Gift Aid declaration form (obtainable from me).
- The only stipulations are that your payment can be identified as coming from you (e.g. bankers order, cash in a freewill or other suitably marked envelope, or cheque) and that you must have paid at least as much income or capital gains tax as the church and other charities reclaim on your donations in the tax year.
- Gift aid is a way of increasing your giving to the church at no cost to you. In certain circumstances it can even save you tax (e.g. you can increase the threshold for claw-back of age-related personal allowance).
