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

From the Rector



Dear Friends,

There are times when the press and TV news programme relish bad news, or difficult news. I suspect it makes for easy writing and fulfils their agenda, which is to see everything as badly as possible, as they think this sells newspapers or draws viewers. They are already (mid-November) relishing how bad Christmas is going to be. Already heard about possible turkey shortages. Cost of living crisis. No heating with the energy crisis. To listen to the press and TV you would think that Christmas this year is going to be dreadful. I would like to tell you - and them - it is not going to be dreadful. It is going to be wonderful. Fantastic. A great Christmas.

I know some people generally struggle with Christmas, but the cost of living crisis and the energy crisis is not going to make it worse unless we allow it to, and if we buy into the agenda of the press and TV news programmes.

It may well be different. It is for us – this is the first year ever our son and daughter will voluntarily not be with us, but we are not sad about that. Our son is off to Sweden with his Swedish girlfriend to celebrate in Swedish style (apparently Sweden has no tradition of roast dinners!); our daughter is spending Christmas with her boyfriend's family, a family that came to this country – with their own traditions – after Idi Amin expelled the Uganda Asians back in the 1970's. I would never begrudge them the new experiences!!

For many, Christmas is sad for many different reasons: a tough time – and I'm sure our hearts are with those who find Christmas difficult.

What the press and TV news don't get, and drag so many people into thinking and believing - Christmas is not about food and drink and presents - they are just the window dressing of Christmas. Christmas is a bit about families and relationships, and the people we spend Christmas with. But most of all -Christmas is about Christ, About Jesus, About the baby born in a stable. And Jesus is not affected by the cost of living crisis! Truth is there are times events turn aside the veil and allow us into the very heart of the event. And for many people all the trimmings of Christmas are just that – a veil over the truth of Christmas, a veil that hides us from the baby in the manger, the manger in a stable in Bethlehem.

This Christmas let's turn again to the baby

Peace in Our Time?

This was the title of the local ACTS (Action of Churches Together in Scotland) group service held in St Cyprian's on the first Thursday of November. Our guest speaker was the Revd. Neil Galbraith, minister of Cathcart Old Parish Church and CEO of Charity at Glasgow the Caring City Charity.

Neil talked about the work of the charity both here in the Glasgow area and further afield. The particular focus this time was on the help being given to victims of the war in Ukraine. He had some amazing stories of generosity and courage. They assess the risk of carrying aid to wherever it's needed so as to avoid putting anyone in harm's way, but now and again local circumstances change. There were some remarkable stories of flexibility needed to get out of tight situations.



After the address, Concordia, the local ecumenical choir sang and we prepared for a time of reflection on conflict and peace by lighting candles. The focus again was on praying for an end to the suffering of the people of Ukraine.

An Introduction to Matthew's Gospel

The church year, in terms of our readings and festivals, goes from Advent Sunday to Advent Sunday. So this year began on 27th November. In terms of readings, we work on a threeyear cycle. The year 2022 - 23 is year A.

Each year has a particular gospel assigned to it, and the majority of our gospel readings come from that gospel. So in year A, most of the gospel readings come from Matthew, year B, from Mark and year C, from Luke. There is, of course, a fourth gospel - John, and parts of John are read at the great festivals and sometimes on particular Sundays throughout the year. So over this coming year, most of our gospel readings will be from Matthew. The question is – what to look out for in Matthew's gospel? What are the things Matthew wants to emphasise?

It is said that Matthew's gospel is the most "Jewish" of the gospels. To some extent that is true. The gospels were each written for a community of Christians, of which the gospel writer was a part. They were written in their final form more than 30 years after Christ. Matthew's gospel reflects is What community who had been Jewish before converting, but still held strongly to the Jewish traditions, scriptures and teaching. It gave them two major issues:

- Firstly, how do you make sense of Christ from a Jewish tradition? How does he continue that tradition, and how does he break that tradition?
- Secondly, how do you relate to people of the Jewish faith who do not accept that Jesus was the Messiah?

Firstly, Matthew wants to show that Jesus is the natural descendant of Jewish Tradition. The story of the birth of Jesus with the



emphasis on Joseph, which emphasises, shows this. Calling Jesus the Son of David shows this. And throughout the gospel, we see Jesus reflected as the natural descendant of Jewish tradition and teaching. He is the Messiah which the Jewish people were expecting and waiting for.

Secondly, Matthew wants to show that Jesus also transformed Jewish tradition. He didn't get rid of it - he transformed it, took it back to what God really wanted. We see Jesus, particularly in the sermon on the mount, show that love matters, that individual faith matters and that reaching out to others matters. All these things seemed to have become forgotten in the history of God's people.

Thirdly, Matthew demonstrates a love/hate relationship with the Jewish people. He is quite scathing of the Jewish leaders - the Pharisees and the Sadducees. They were the leaders, and were leading the people astray. For the Pharisees, it was because of their selfrighteousness. For the Sadducees, because of their greed. Throughout the gospel, there are sharp encounters between these leaders and Jesus.

At the same time, Matthew has a real love for the people, and that is reflected perhaps most strongly in the beatitudes - that famous passage at the start of Chapter 5.

In the end, Matthew accepts that Jesus was not only for the Jews, but also for the gentiles. And that was a huge step for him to take.

Of course, there is a lot more to Matthew, I hope you enjoy hearing it read over the coming vear.

The audience clearly enjoyed what they were hearing and I'm sure it won't be too long before we welcome them back again. Thank you to everyone in the band.

We now look forward to the McOpera Wind and the Douglas Academy Music School side by side in concert on the first Saturday (3rd) of December. We are promised music new and old from professional musicians and emerging talent.

Mothers IN ON Christian care for families

Our November meeting saw our MU learning a lot about post-Covid CPR and first aid.

Some of the information shocked us golden oldies who thought we knew all about it. No we did not! First you do not automatically put the patient in the recovery position. You first feel over the body for injury. You do not give rescue breaths only compression for your resuscitation. You press in 5cm when giving compression which can be enough to break ribs and you do it fast enough to match the rhythm of 'Staying Alive' - about 100 compressions a minute. The photo shows Aileen finding out how hard it is to do that. They reckon it is hard to keep it going longer than two minutes, so you really need to get someone else to help do it in relays. You also need them to call for an ambulance and to find the location of the nearest defibrillator. When it arrives, it tells you how to use it and a lot more. I really recommend you find yourself an updated course.

When we came to children and babies, we learned a tremendous amount about the process and had a chance to practice on models which was tremendous because, for those of us with mobility problems, we could use tables and the stage to practice.

God bless and Best regards from Lizo Mazwai – Loskesiki; Transkei,

Lizo Mazwai had studied medicine in some way in Glasgow, and attended St. Cyprian's Church when Keith Trudgill was Rector.

I checked out Lizo Mazwai on Google. He is still alive, but now retired. His career was remarkable - he was the only surgeon in Loskesiki, a community of 300,000 people. Before retirement, he achieved the highest recognition for his work. In an article, it said "Mazwai is the past president of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa (CMSA), Honorary Fellow of the CMSA, Former Chairman of the South African Medical Research Council and past president of the South African Medical Association. He is also a founding Chairperson of the Board of the Office of Health Standards Compliance in the National Department of Health and has received seven Honorary Academic Fellowships throughout his career."

St. Cyprian's had a small influence in a remarkable career, which affected for good thousands of people in South Africa!

Dear Sir.

Although not unhappy about the change in Scripture readings for the Eucharist to those from the ASB lectionary (ASB – Alternate Service Book from the Church of England), I shall be most sorry if this also means a change in the collects, in particular, at this time of the year, the collect for the Sunday next before Advent which begins "Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord"

All my married life I have made Christmas cakes and puddings on "Stir up Sunday" and I should be sorry to see the loss of this traditional start to Christmas preparations.

Generally speaking the collects of the ASB are different to those in the Prayer Book for, like the scripture readings, they are linked to the "Theme" for the day. However in their wisdom the compilers of the ASB decided that on certain days there should be 'alternative' collects. One such day is the fifth Sunday before Christmas (the Sunday next before Advent in the prayer book) when the alternative is the 'Stir-up Sunday' collect, although obviously in less traditional language than the Prayer Book version.

So 'stir away', Mrs. Stother, stir away, the traditional start to your Christmas preparations remains.

I did ask Jacqui whether she remembered writing the letter – but she didn't! She did promise me, however, that she still makes her Christmas puddings on Stir-up Sunday!

Could he help transport some important people 500 miles west to another country?


Tambour never turned down work. He managed to find some smart saddles for his camels, and they set out along the great trading route west.

Back to Normal???

We are still taking some precautions such as the Rector and the server wearing masks during the distribution of communion, but the question now is whether that is really necessary.

The Rector intends to canvass views of the congregation to see whether people would be comfortable with going back to normal. This will not be a majority decision. It has to be unanimous. We don't want to put anyone off coming to church.

We continue to offer indefinitely the option to attend online for those who can't come to church in person for whatever reason. The instructions for joining are emailed out with the Link each week and are also available on the home page of our website. You can also sign up there for the email. One of the cameras is movable so it can be used to stream from the Choir Vestry and the Hall when there is a need (e.g. for the AGM).

We are still looking for more volunteers for the coffee rota. A turn only comes around once every two months, so don't be shy! Please let Pat or Paul Hindle know if you can help.
