

## From the Rector



#### Dear Friends,

Every year, the clergy of our diocese (the Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway) have a clergy conference at a hotel somewhere: last year – 2022 – it was in Hamilton. We had a speaker who I found difficult to be inspired by, but one session at the conference I was interested in. The session was on the viability of a church, particularly the spiritual viability of a church.

When people talk about the viability of a church, it normally revolves around a couple of things. Is the building sound, or is it going to cost huge amounts to fix in the near future? Secondly, can the church survive financially—can we meet our overheads? Maintenance costs, heating, insurance, etc., etc. The irony is that if we see the building and the money as the measure of viability, then you can picture a time when a church has a good building and lots of money in reserves, but no-one attending, and be called "viable"!

The truth is – there has to be the third strand – is the church SPIRITUALLY viable?

Of course, this is controversial. How do you measure spiritual viability? Cam you really put a value on the spiritual life of people, on an individual's relationship with God?

Well, the diocese is trying to look at this, and come up with a way of discerning "spiritual viability," particularly when a church is in \*interregnum (i.e. currently without a priest) so we will leave them to that! But the question is worth asking – what makes a church spiritually viable? What makes St. Cyprian's Church "Spiritually viable?"

I hope you are still reading this, because it can sound rather esoteric. It isn't. It is asking – are we as a church serving God as he wants us to? Do we, as individuals, have the relationship with God that he wants us to? Do we have the relationships with each other that God created us to have? Do we have the love for our wider world that God calls us to have? And are these things TOP of our agenda? First in our priorities?

This year is the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the opening of St. Cyprian's Church. There had been a worshipping Episcopal Community in Lenzie before 1873, but the church opened in that year, on April 7<sup>th</sup>. There are on our website histories of St. Cyprian's Church, and

our hope is that we will produce a new history at some stage through the year - takes a bit of time to write a book and then get it published. The history is full of practical issues. desire to tell others about our Christian faith, that a new church – the St. Barnabas mission would have been set up? A huge spiritual achievement for the church.

## A Remarkable Bishop

In our December Magazine, I wrote an article about someone – Lizo Mazwai – who had attended St. Cyprian's at one time, and became one of the leading surgeons in South Africa. The truth is there are many people who attended St. Cyprian's and made huge and interesting impacts on our world, Another one is Keith John Benzies. Someone no-one seems to remember!

I was recently given a box of old documents (the majority being old magazines) by the family of Bill Morris who was a former secretary of the church. In the box were two letters from Keith Benzies to someone called Margaret written in the 1990's. I have not been able to track down who Margaret is. However, Keith Benzies is an interesting character, and this is his life as I can piece it together.

He was born in 1938, brought up in Stepps, and studied French and Czech at Glasgow University. He must have moved away at that stage. He next appears training for ministry at Salisbury Theological College, being ordained deacon at the age of 28 in 1962, and priest a year later. He served his curacy in Hull.

There is a comment in one of the letters on how his family lost contact with St. Cyprian's after his mother and younger brother were killed in a plane crash. This was at Kano in Nigeria in 1958 — what they were doing in Nigeria and details of the crash seem to be unknown.

After completing his curacy in Hull, he was sent by USPG (United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel) to Madagascar in 1966 to be vice-principal of St Paul's Theological College, Ambatoharanana, and then principal from 1969 to 1979. He also ran a home for 30 destitute boys at this time.

In 1982, he was elected Bishop of Antsiranana (one of 6 diocese in Madagascar)

a post he held until his death in 2002, aged 64, when he died of malaria and complications from Parkinson's disease. He was awarded an OBE in 1993. He was buried in the cathedral grounds in his home city in Madagascar.

In his letters, he talks about some of the issues he faced in his role. There were 80 churches in his diocese, and only 8 clergy. The diocese was 480 miles from Antisiaranana to the furthest reaches. The city itself is on the northern tip of Madagascar, and was very isolated. The diocese could not afford to cover the costs of a car, so he travelled everywhere by public transport – mainly buses, sometimes planes.

Keith Benzies was never married, but adopted a number of boys who were destitute or handicapped, putting them through education and helping them to work. The last one he adopted, aged 17, had no legs. He was living in complete destitution and squalor.

In many ways, John Benzies was one of that group of "Last of the colonial bishops," but made a huge impact on the church in Madagascar. Surprising to think the reaches that St. Cyprian's church has, and how God has used our church to make such a difference to the worldwide church and witness to Christ.

John Benzies was a remarkable character and Bishop – humble, strong, committed to the poor of the country he came to love. You can read a longer version of his ministry here:

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Ed note: After Les told me about Bishop Keith Benzies, I spoke to a fellow trustee on the Mothers' Union Worldwide Board who is based in Madagascar. She immediately recalled him. She had met him regularly in the latter years of his ministry and obviously recalled him with fondness and high regard.

## **Property Matters**

Quite a bit has happened in and around our property in December, particularly on the roof and with the heating system in the hall.

The rotten timber at the west end of the roof has now been replaced and the lead flashing to the coping of the west wall properly attached and sealed to prevent further water ingress, which was the problem that caused the rot in the first place. The scaffolding is now away and work stopped for the time being. More work will be needed later in the year especially around the gutter outlets, which are far too small and can be blocked by a single leaf. It seems nature is very good at placing falling leaves in just the right places!

Many of you will have seen me making regular forays into the ladies toilet to check the pressure in the heating system and top it up. This loss of pressure was gradually getting much worse. We had the boiler attended to because the pressure relief valve seemed to be leaking. It was. This seemed to be a cure until a few days later when there was a total loss of pressure. Refilling worked for about 24 hours and then no pressure again. This was right in the middle of the very cold spell, when no heat was not something we could live with. There was no sign of leakage from the boiler, but I could hear a hiss from the radiator in the staff toilet. That was the problem. The pipe had been resting on a brick sleeper wall and was carrying the weight of the main return pipe. Over the years, it had simply worn away due to movement caused by expansion and contraction. The picture shows the wear on the pipe that has now been replaced. I'm grateful

A week or two earlier, I got a call about all the lights in the hall being out. I found that one row of lights in the hall had a short-circuit fault. This has happened before due to a ballast failing. The fittings are nearly two decades old now and the cost of buying spares would go a long way towards buying new LED fittings that would save a considerable amount of energy as well as offering better lighting. The Vestry has agreed to this and we have an offer to cover the cost, so this is planned to go ahead during the Easter break.

If anyone fancies being Property Convenor or can donate to the funds needed for property maintenance, please let me or the Rector know.

## **Special Tree?**

Do we have a special tree at St. Cyprian's? If you sit in the hall, and look out the first window from the right, opposite the door, there is an alder. It has a nest box on it. But is it special?

One Sunday in the Autumn, we saw a treecreeper (little, but beautiful, brown and white bird) climbing up it. A week or so later there was a small flock of long-tailed tits flittering through it (small pinkish birds with long tails and very white head bands). I've also seen blue tits using the nest box. Squirrels perching in it. A fieldfare (A beautiful winter thrush) sitting on it. That's as well as other common birds blackbirds. dunnocks etc. It seems to attract birds! BUT why mention it now? Well one of the birds that I've seen in the tree in the past is even rarer and more beautiful. A bird almost uniquely attracted to alders. And generally only visits in early spring - February/March. It is small, delicate, green, often mistaken for Greenfinch (which generally looks a lot "heavier"). Let's look out for and hope for a



visit this year by some siskins..... (indeed some have already turned up in January!)




## **Ash Wednesday**

This year, Ash Wednesday falls on 22<sup>nd</sup> February and at St. Cyprian's Church, we will have a special service at 7.30pm, which includes the imposition of ashes. For those who do not make it, we will offer the imposition of ashes at our Thursday morning service on 23<sup>rd</sup> February. By tradition, the ashes are made from burnt palm crosses.

Ash Wednesday, including the imposition of ashes, did not come into being until the 10<sup>th</sup> century, encouraged by the then Archbishop of Canterbury – Bishop Aethelwold – and monarch, King Edgar. It was only in the 11<sup>th</sup> century that the Church as a whole throughout Europe began to adopt the ceremony.

In the bible, there are many references to repenting – making public confession of sins – in sackcloth and ashes. Jesus himself spoke of the act. As the church developed, so many churches used this act for those who needed to





repent, but it was never associated with Lent. Lent then began on the Sunday after. It was only in the 9<sup>th</sup> century that Lent was extended by four days and ashes associated with it, and the tenth century when it became something for the whole church.

From the tenth century, the keeping of Ash Wednesday with ashing has continued in the Roman Catholic Church right up to today. In the Anglican Church from the reformation (approx 1525), Ash Wednesday with ashing was discouraged and in places banned. It

disappeared from the tradition until the middle of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

In the 19th century, the Oxford Movement (a movement which wanted to re-introduce catholic practices into the church, from which we at St. Cyprian's are descended) began to bring it back to the church. It was controversial, but grew in popularity in the first half of the 20th century. There was no given liturgy for ashing in the Anglican Communion until 1986. At our churches in Manchester, it only became something we did in about 2008.

Today, for us at St. Cyprian's, it is a very special occasion. We do worship on Ash Wednesday. We do include ashing. It is the beginning of Lent. It is a time when we face God in sadness for the things wrong in our lives. Please come along at 7.30pm – Ash Wednesday really matters!!!

## Peter Mundy 1953 - 2023

On the 2<sup>nd</sup> February, we will be holding the funeral for Peter Mundy who sadly died after a short illness on 12<sup>th</sup> January. The funeral will be at St. Cyprian's Church at 10.15am, and afterwards at Daldowie Crematorium.

Peter had spent his life from his early years in Lenzie, and was always involved in the life of St. Cyprian's, although over recent years this was much more in the background, and as a support to his wife Aileen. In his earlier years he was a server, a member of the choir, property convenor, part of the youth club, amongst other things. In earlier years, he loved his motorbike and loved Badminton. Peter spent all of working life as an Environmental Officer for the local council. Most important for Peter was his family and the great support he showed to Aileen and his three daughters Sheila, Fiona and Lisa. Over the last five years



or so, Peter had enormous struggles with health, and that period of struggle revealed the great character and courage that he had. Having said that, I will remember him as a friendly man who was simply great company to be with.

Peter will be missed by his family and friends, and I am sure our prayers are with them at this time.

Mostly, I hope we have a great time, and a great celebration — 150 years is not young!!!!!!!





## Where we are with Covid?

Where are we with Covid – I think the answer is "delayed!" In December, we took a minor step forward – we agreed those administering communion could stop wearing face masks after consultations with the congregation.

However, I think we are still in the position of continuing with the few restrictions we still have. We still encourage people to sit apart, and we do this by where we put the hymn books and service booklets in church. We still have a hand-washing station for people as they enter church. Perhaps for me the saddest is that we still only share the peace by waving at each other, rather than shaking hands, with the occasional hug.

Having said that, I still think we have to continue with these precautions for the time being. It was thought the pandemic was going away. It isn't – indeed the numbers are worse now than they have been, as much as the illness is not so severe in most cases as it once was. At least four members of our church have had Covid since the last magazine was printed! So, just to be on the safe and cautious side, we will continue being careful for the time being.

We continue to offer indefinitely the option to attend online for those who can't come to church in person for whatever reason. The instructions for joining are emailed out with the Link each week and are also available on the home page of our website. You can also sign up there for the email.
