This will be the first of a number of very special events coming up through the year, until the end of our celebrations on the 1st October when we close our celebrations with Sung Evensong. ## **From the Magazine Archives**

You may think that the current Rector's letter is too long and complicated. Well, perhaps you should read this great one instead from a former Rector – Keith Trudgill – from Easter 1982:

Dear Friends,

Without any doubt, the two greatest mysteries of the Christian faith are the Incarnation and the Resurrection. When we try to consider the concept of God becoming man, as we do every Christmastide, we are faced with all kinds of theological as well as intellectual problems. But this we accept in faith; that in some inexplicable way Jesus of Nazareth came to be accepted in the church as God Incarnate.

At Eastertide we have the second great mystery, the Resurrection, and make no mistake about it, the Resurrection is absolutely vital to the faith. If Christ had not risen, our faith would be meaningless!

Again, as with the incarnation, there are all kinds of problems! Who moved the stone? And Why? How did the grave-clothes come to be lying as if Jesus had simply dematerialised? How did Jesus walk through closed doors and solid walls, and yet appear to be still flesh and blood?

These are puzzling questions, and scholars have struggled with them for generations; and the truth is that there are no neat answers. There are only suppositions and hypotheses. The Resurrection is one of the mysteries we accept in faith, as countless generations have done before us. We believe quite simply, that Christ was crucified and buried, and that he rose again, and was seen by his disciples – Alive! It is a mystery, but he was seen by so many people that the evidence is irrefutable!

But what makes Easter so central to our faith is the fact that Our Lord told his followers, "Because I live, you will live also." We are promised Eternal Life – nothing less! We are also promised something more – that the Risen lord will be always with us – that we can live in the presence of the living Christ!

This is why we call Easter the Queen of Festivals; it is not merely a celebration of the Resurrection, but an assurance of the continual presence of Christ, and a promise of life everlasting for every believer!

If that isn't good news – what is? May Easter be a time of Spiritual joy and Blessing to you all; and may Christ be with you.

# Music @ St Cyprian's

## It's been another busy couple of months for Music @ St Cyprian's. We've had two very different and enjoyable concerts.

The first took place on 18<sup>th</sup> February featuring a trio (*below*) made up of Kanako Ito on violin, Andrew Berridge on viola and Martin Storey on cello. It was an amazing sound that seemed much more than you might expect from the three instruments. Some pieces were solos and duos covering Bach to Mozart. A great evening!

Four weeks later, we had Scots Baroque (*opposite*) with us for a concert that featured old instruments and baroque style music with a Scottish flavour mainly written by female composers either anonymously or under a male pseudonym. There were also original reflection pieces written by the group members, Aaron McGregor – Violin, Lucia Capellaro – Cello, Eric Thomas – Theorbo (the massive lute-like instrument) and László Rózsa – Recorders. Eric was a late addition

because Alex McCartney was unavailable. It was another very enjoyable concert with toetapping and reflective content. Thank you to the group for a wonderful evening.

We now take a break for Easter. The next concert will be the St Cyprian's 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Concert featuring Seonaid Aitken and Rose Room. Seonaid was voted Scottish Jazz Awards 'Best Vocalist' in 2017 & 2018 and is also a virtuoso violinist. Rose Room's members are Jimmy Moon on double bass, Tam Gallagher on rhythm guitar and solo guitarist Conor Smith. It's sure to be an exceptional concert and a worthy way to mark our anniversary.



## Scottish Bible Society Volunteer Conference

## I attended this conference on 18<sup>th</sup> March as St Cyprian's representative. It was a fascinating experience.

I learned that adults in China can freely go to church, but not children. The government considers Sunday Schools to be places of indoctrination. However, the churches get over this by saying the children need to be looked after while the parents are at church. So they find a hall nearby for children to go and have fun. Within this fun, they sing choruses and read stories. The parents when they return are given materials to work with the children. The parents are allowed to teach children and give them the Christian message. Materials for this are designed and printed on Chinese printing presses. They can only print this material for so many months of the year. The other months they print Christian material for export.

Another fascinating experience came from Egypt where they have a National Quiz based

on Christian beliefs. It is televised and Children's bibles are distributed to help the participants to answer the questions.

In Ukraine, the Bible Society has been giving bibles to soldiers on the front line where there is an incredible hunger for them. Not one has been refused. The Government called for a day of prayer in Kyiv at the Cathedral. Water, Bibles, food, a bomb shelter, and a hospital could be found here. There was a big push to get bibles out for independence day when everyone was asked to read Psalm 31. There have been 800,000 bibles sent to the Ukraine and Russian borders last year.

They also talked about a course called "Healing the wounds of TRAUMA". It started as a 5-day residential course, but is now a weekly Zoom course. It is recommended that two people from one church go on the course to work together within the church. The leaflet I was given is available for anyone to see.

# From St Cyprian's to the World

In the last couple of magazines, I wrote about former members of St. Cyprian's Church who went on to do something interesting. . . Another former member was Revd Tom Collings.

Tom moved to Lenzie and joined St. Cyprian's in the mid seventies with Julie his wife and five children. He came North to be a lecturer in Maths at Strathclyde University. In early life, he had been a great student, attending Oxford University where he gained a degree in maths, and Wycliffe hall where he gained a degree in theology. He also studied for a masters in New York, and a further degree at the University of Essex.

Following all that study, he taught maths at North East London Polytechnic before moving North to lecture at Strathclyde, as well as being the deputy director for the (Scottish) Health Services Operations Research Unit at the University of Strathclyde.

Tom was ordained deacon at St. Cyprian's in December 1979, the first ever ordination at St. Cyprian's, and only the second member of St. Cyprian's to be nominated by St. Cyprian's to be ordained (the first being Arthur Hodgkinson who became Provost of Aberdeen Cathedral).

Tom and his family left for Canada in 1980, where he was ordained priest.

From 1980 - 82, Tom was Assistant at St John's Cathedral in Winnipeg, then from 82



- 85, Rector of 6 churches in a rural area of Manitoba, where he developed a real interest in ministry amongst indigenous people. After this, he was Dean of St. John's College in the University of Manitoba until he was elected as Bishop of Keewatin, a diocese in Ontario,

For Tom, one the great emphases he brought to his ministry was inclusion, valuing the ministry of both indigenous people and women. Later, he had the great privilege of ordaining his daughter, who was a University Chaplain for 15 years and is now an Archdeacon. At some stage, his wife Julie was also ordained.

In 1996, Tom retired from being Bishop, and took over a parish jointly with his wife in Saskatchewan before retiring to Manitoba, where he lived and ministered until his

# Ian G Stother 1945 - 2023

## On the 14<sup>th</sup> of March we held the funeral of Ian Stother, who had died a couple of weeks before.

When I arrived just over ten years ago, Ian was already struggling with Parkinsons disease which affected his health for the last 20 years of his life and caused his early retirement. However, he coped with the illness immensely well and with great courage, finding ways to continue with the things he enjoyed.

For Ian, there were three major parts to life - family, work and cars. Specifically vintage cars.



Ian was husband to Jacqui, who he had met at university and been married to for 54 years. We were very lucky at St. Cyprian's to enable them to renew their wedding vows on their golden wedding anniversary. Ian was a great support to his twin daughters Clare and

Lyndsey, as well as their partners and their children.

In terms of work, Ian came to Glasgow in 1977 to be a consultant orthopaedic surgeon, and played a huge part in the life initially of Stobhill hospital and subsequently the Royal Infirmary. Ian had a huge reputation as an incredibly skilled surgeon, and even more as a great mentor for many younger doctors going through training and placement within his team.

And Ian loved his cars and, right up to the last couple of years, spent time and energy working on his beloved Bristol. Sadly, in the end, his illness became too much and the car had to go. (I still remember my 60th birthday when he appeared on the door step early, drove me to the back of Auchinloch, and let me drive the car. It was a stunningly beautiful car, but a real pig to drive!!!!!).

Ian was a great supporter of St. Cyprian's church, and was a great support to Jacqui in the roles she played within the church. Ian will be missed by all of us, and I am sure our prayers continue to be with Jacqui and family.

# Where we are with Covid?

Covid never seems to appear on the news these days – maybe too many other things to make us miserable! However, it is still around and hitting a significant number of people. At least one member of St. Cyprian's has had it in the last few weeks – for her the third time in a year. So, where are we with it?

Well, we try to be appropriately cautious, but do not overrule practical things by that caution. What does this mean in practice? Well, three things.

Firstly, we have recently moved the handwashing station to the church porch, where it will stay for the foreseeable future. We moved it because the porch has recently been cleared, and it makes the back of church less cluttered.

Secondly, the Rector has taken the decision that he will offer handshakes to people when

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appropriate – for example, as they leave church. If you don't feel comfortable accepting a handshake, please don't and don't worry. The Rector will understand and will not be offended!

Thirdly, we will continue to encourage people to spread out when in church, and we do this by spreading our service books out. It means people tend to sit where we put the books. However, this is not written in stone – please sit where you want! There are times when it is not possible to encourage people to spread out. For example, we have had a couple of funerals recently where the church was full to overflowing. We accept that this may happen and will not enforce any form of spreading out. If you feel uncomfortable with sitting close to others, please join us on the Zoom link. We now attempt to "Zoom" all funerals and 10.30am Sunday services.
