From Our Interim Priest-in-Charge



Dear Friends,

When Jesus is presented as a baby at the Temple by Mary and Joseph, it was in keeping with the custom that all first born sons were dedicated to God. The story is told in Luke 2:21-40 and somehow in that great courtyard of milling crowds they were noticed by Simeon and then Anna. ...my eyes have seen your salvation which you have prepared in the sight of all people.



In our own Advents and our long waitings for God to answer prayers, or circumstances to change, or the world to become a more just place, or the church to reflect more unity, have there been fragile, ordinary, even innocuous visits from God that we have missed? God came in the form of a young infant, held by shy, overwhelmed new parents, trying to be faithful to what they had been given to do.

Can we learn from their example first of all, by keeping faithful to what is in front of us. What God may hereafter require of you, you must not give yourself the least trouble about. Everything he gives you to do, you must do as well as ever you can. That is the best possible preparation for whatever He may want you to do next. If people would but do what they have to do, they would always find themselves ready for what came next. George Macdonald.

Secondly could there been something stirring in our soul that we could easily have dismissed just as the Holy Family would have been easily dismissed amongst the great temple crowd. In the jumble, noise and confusion that often make up our inner worlds and fill the horizons of our awareness, how may our 'shy soul' be coaxed to make an appearance? This Advent can you find a bit of extra time to quieten yourself.

Who was St Mark?

Mark the Evangelist, also known as John Mark or Saint Mark, is the person who is traditionally ascribed to be the author of the Gospel of Mark, which is the Gospel we'll be reading most often this lectionary this year (Year B).

Many modern Bible scholars believe that the Gospel that carries his name was actually written by an unknown author, but that doesn't diminish its power or our interest in the life of St Mark.

William Lane held that there was an "unbroken tradition" identifying Mark the Evangelist with John Mark, and that John Mark was the cousin of Barnabas. However, Hippolytus of Rome, in *On the Seventy Apostles*, distinguishes Mark the Evangelist from John Mark and Mark the cousin of Barnabas and asserts that they all belonged to the "Seventy Disciples" who were sent out by Jesus to disseminate the gospel (Luke 10:1...) in Judea.

Eusebius of Caesarea records how Mark the Evangelist came to travel with Peter the Apostle. He states that in the first year of the reign of Herod Agrippa I over the whole of Judea (AD 41), Herod killed James, son of Zebedee and arrested Peter, with a plan to kill him after the Passover. Peter was saved miraculously by angels, and escaped out of the realm of Herod (Acts 12:1-19). Peter went to Antioch, then through Asia Minor (visiting the churches in Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, as mentioned in 1 Peter 1:1) and arrived in Rome in the second year of Emperor Claudius (AD 42). Somewhere on the way, Peter encountered Mark and took him as travelling companion and interpreter.

It is recorded that Mark the Evangelist wrote down the sermons of Peter, thus composing the Gospel according to Mark, before he left for Alexandria in the third year of Claudius (AD 43).



Acts 15 records the falling out between Paul and Barnabas after the Council of Jerusalem over whether they should take with them those who had deserted them in Pamphylia and had not accompanied them in the work. It implies that John called Mark was one such deserter. As a result, Acts 15:39 states that Mark went to Cyprus with Barnabas. Of course we don't know for certain if this is Mark the Evangelist or another Mark!

Then according to tradition, in AD 49, about 19 years after the Ascension of Jesus, Mark travelled to Alexandria and founded the Church of Alexandria. The Coptic Orthodox Church, the Greek Orthodox Church of Alexandria, and the Coptic Catholic Church all trace their origins to this original community. Aspects of the Coptic liturgy can be traced back to Mark himself. He founded the episcopal see of Alexandria, which was one of the five most important sees of early Christianity and became its first bishop. He is also honoured as the founder of Christianity in Africa.

Eusebius states that Mark was succeeded by Anianus as Bishop of Alexandria in the eighth year of Nero (62/63AD), probably, but not definitely, due to his coming death. Later Coptic tradition says that he was martyred in 68AD

Mark the Evangelist's symbol is the winged lion, the Lion of Saint Mark. The same lion is also the symbol of Venice. His feast day is celebrated on 25th April.

However the Mission has some immediate needs for funding to support rough sleepers this Christmas and for gloves, boxer shorts, shaving foam, razors and deodorants. Please contact Maxine if you can help in any way.

Our next meeting is Christmas Dinner at the Torrance Inn on 13^{th} December. The

Our January meeting will be the branch AGM followed by Chit Chat. It is planned to be on Wednesday 10th at 7.30pm. Watch out in the Link for confirmation of the time.

We must remember that Mothers' Union is also a charity doing important work to help those in need

locally and globally.

The Christmas Appeal has been launched. This year, the appeal aims to support women of Tanzania helping them to lift themselves and their families out of poverty through establishing savings groups and teaching business skills. The MU is partnering with The Big Give so that every penny (up to £38,148) donated to the appeal on line between noon on Tuesday 28th November and noon on Tuesday 5th December will be doubled. We're also planning a simple lunch on 17th December in aid of the appeal and church funds.

Every second Thursday of the month, members around the diocese get together on Zoom to pray at midday and 8pm. The *Prayer Space* usually lasts around 20 minutes so is a good way just to take a short break from busy lives. The next one is on 14th December. January's date will be the 11th.

Another great way to take a break is to come to the Provincial Retreat at St Mary's Monastery, Kinnoull, Perth. It takes place between 9th and 11th April 2024. There were more details in the last magazine.

All these events are open to all. You don't need to be a member, but of course we would love you to join us.

16 Days of Activism

Against gender based violence

Mothers' Union campaigns for an end to gender based violence, including domestic abuse. Since 2013 it has been a primary focus.

Women and girls face many injustices. As members of Mothers' Union, we play a unique role in helping to overcome this across the world. Our 16 Days campaign has evolved into RISE UP, the 365 days campaign about which there were more details in the last magazine.

Initiatives undertaken aim to develop understanding of the root causes of gender based violence, draw attention to unhelpful cultural norms, promote right and equal relationships, and highlight domestic abuse in our communities. We also work with other organisations and groups to increase our effectiveness.

The statistics are staggering. In 2018, two church studies showed that in Britain and Ireland figures are equally high in a church setting as they are anywhere else. 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men reported that they had personally experienced or witnessed domestic

abuse.

Most church goers indicated they had never heard a sermon on the topic, or they felt their church was inadequately equipped to support or deal with the issue of domestic abuse. Mothers' Union has tried to address this by providing a sermon outline for use during the 16 Days, which start on International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women (25th November) and ends on International Human Rights Dav December). MU has also produced a new compilation of prayers that aims to equip, encourage and empower you on your prayerful and spiritual journey, as we seek to bring into focus God's continuing love for all and to work together as the hands and feet of Christ in the eradication of all forms of gender-based violence.
