From Our Interim Priest-in-Charge



Dear Friends,

The Anchor and the kite

The late afternoon breeze brought a much needed coolness to where we lived not far from the edge of the Thar desert in Northwest India. The remaining heat in the air had a scent, almost as if the baking of the air was now complete and you could smell it was well done. The sand was warm but no longer hot and my four year old feet could run bare on its surface at least until nightfall.

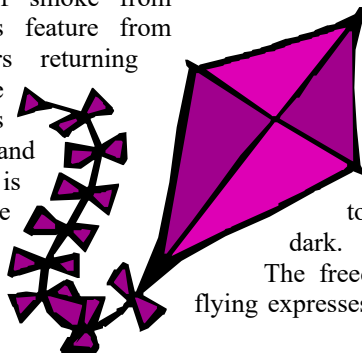
It was a magical time, people sitting on their doorsteps, the line of smoke from cooking fires – a timeless feature from Afghanistan to Burma – fathers returning tired from the field and the cattle being brought in. It was also the time for kite flying and one of my earliest memories is of the crispy, crackling texture of a small kite made of purple crepe paper tied onto four twigs, with a long piece of twine. My friends and I

would run around the grounds pulling our kites behind us, holding them aloft by the sheer speed of our running until we ran out of space or puff.

Then we had the idea of going onto the flat roof of the house. There were 6ft high domes that dotted the expanse, which included the roof of our neighbours, the Mukands. By getting on top of one of the domes we caught the breeze and soon four domes each had a small boy holding onto a rather flimsy and pathetic looking kite with a fierce pride and wild joy. No more running, the breeze did all the work for us, but we had to stop ourselves from slipping down the slope of the dome. We could have done with someone to anchor us, but balanced as best we could. We stayed up as the sun sank slowly from a dazzling glare to magenta and into the velvet dark.

The freedom and exhilaration of kite flying expresses itself when we explore, take

risks, follow dreams and ask questions. When we have the courage to hope and open our hearts to love and pay the price of the hurt it can bring. When we stake everything on what is invisible, on a God we cannot see but whom we cannot live without. When we press on into that God, higher up and deeper in, wanting more of Him even if it means letting go of control of what we hold dear, trusting him with what is most precious to us. When we take Jesus’ words seriously as words to build a life on, even if it means being buried like a seed or dying to self, taking up our cross and following him even if it seems no one else is doing that. The freedom of kite flying and on the edge living for God are only possible however if there is an anchor.

The hard won securities of faith are seasoned in conflict and struggle. Quite a few of our St Cyprian’s Family are going through hard times right now. The intimate experiences of God whom we have allowed access to the deepest secrets of our lives are precious to us.

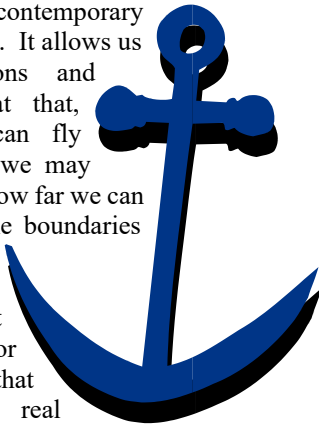
If you haven’t been before, why not make time for this special service. It’s very moving and well worth your time, as are all the services offered during Holy Week and Easter.

Wrestling with the bible and doctrine means sticking at it until we emerge chastened and blessed. Together all these give us an anchor so we can say with Peter... 'To whom shall we go, you have the words of eternal life'. An anchor allows us to keep our feet when we are in danger of losing our balance. It keeps us tethered to church and community and saves us from drifting solo on the tempting but fickle air currents of contemporary values and trends. It allows us to ask questions and difficult ones at that, because kites can fly really high and we may want to see just how far we can go in pushing the boundaries of faith and God. But it also reminds us that questions for questions sake, that have no real



willingness to accept answers we do not like can become like a kite that comes loose and is no longer a kite, but a piece of paper flapping in the wind.

For the anchor is what makes the kite a kite and not just aerial flotsam. The acrobatics and aerial displays that kids all over north India indulge in during the kite flying season playfully ride the wind anchored to a small boys safe in their Father's arms. Celebrate your faith this season of change at St. Cyprian's, fly a kite for Jesus.

A Taste of Pilgrimage and Retreat has been arranged at Carfin Grotto, Lanarkshire, on Saturday May 24th from 11.00 am until 3.00 pm and we warmly invite anyone interested or curious to come and experience what it's all about. The Shrine is Roman Catholic, but we have always been made very welcome there and encouraged to join in their worship and bring our groups for Retreat Days.



Revd David Cameron, one of our regular locum priests, will be leading the day and is keen to let us here at St. Cyprian's know about it and to encourage all who wish to come and join the event.

It's fairly easy to get there by train from Lenzie via Glasgow Queen Street and Central Stations to Carfin Station. The journey takes under an hour and the station is a 5 minute walk from the Shrine.

The church has been booked for Holy Eucharist at 11.30am and the Bernadette Suite (accommodates around 20 max.) for a light lunch, available from the new hospitality facility at the Shrine.

There are extensive grounds and gardens and, weather permitting, they expect to have Stations of the Cross and Benediction in the afternoon.

The cost is expected to be around £15.00

£20.00 depending on what is available for lunch and the hire of the Bernadette Suite. The Shrine does not allow food to be brought in now.

The organisers have held a Pilgrimage to Walsingham (Norfolk) in past years, but this has not proved financially viable this year. They are hoping this initiative allows the group to share this special experience with others 'nearer home'. Come, Taste and See.

Music @ St Cyprian's



The first day of March saw us welcome the JKL Duo, a married couple comprising Kerry Lynch on flute and Jacopo Lazzaretti on guitar. They played music straight from the heart, using the Flute and Classical Guitar to speak to us at St Cyprian's.

It was a beautiful concert featuring classical, jazz, movie and folk numbers, often fused together to great effect. There really was something to please all tastes. The duo released their debut album 'The International Poet' in 2023. They played a selection from it and we were able to acquire it for ourselves on the night. It was a joyous night to remember.

As this magazine went to print, we are looking forward to the next concert on the day before Mothering Sunday, with the **Lee-Horváth Duo** of Katrina Lee on violin and Alina Horváth on piano who will be with us from 7.30pm as usual. Both graduates from



the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and their partnership blossomed from a shared passion for exploring the rich chamber repertoire composed for their instruments. We are sure it will be another wonderful concert. There will be photos and report in the next magazine.

Following this, the last concert in the series will be on 26th April and is titled *Walk the Oars - Gullrun's Saga, She Built a Boat*. Danish storyteller, Svend-Erik Engh, accompanied by Neil Sutcliffe on the accordian (you may remember him as one half of Roo & Neil who were with us in May last year) tell a story inspired by the Viking's arrival in Scotland, with traditional Nordic tales and Gaelic and Scots songs woven into the narrative.

'Lausavisur', a 10th-century saga written by the great Viking writer Egil Skallagrimson, begins with the line: 'So my mother told them to build me a Boat'. Inspired by this opening verse, Svend and Neil delve into an imagined life of a young woman at the end of the Viking era. Gullrun ("Golden Rune") flees from Norway across the ocean towards Iceland, to seek a way back to the old ways, the old stories, songs and magic. On her way she meets a curious young man in Shetland, the last remnants of the Picts living there who helps her on her voyage.

Svend and Neil weave oral storytelling, music and song together to bring characters and images to life in this contemporary reimagining of the Sagas Songs in Old Norse, Shetlandic and Norn give a glimpse into the past, and

birdsong recordings transport us to each scene in the tale.

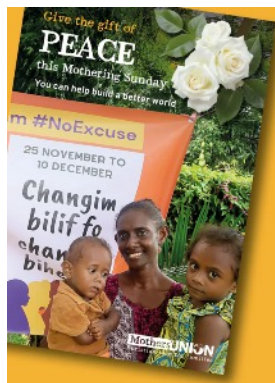


spring day as it was last time. Come dressed for the weather – all welcome.



Vacancy Update

There have been major developments since the last magazine was published. The latest situation is:

- Our advertising has resulted in applications by the closing date, 10th March.
- The Vestry has considered the applications and passed its recommendations to the Dean and Acting Bishop Andrew and these have been accepted.
- The Dean asked the Vestry to provide questions for the first formal interviews, which will be held over Zoom in the first full week of April. The Vestry has now submitted these questions.
- The formal interview invitations have been sent and accepted.

This is an exciting time in the life of our congregation. Please pray that the right person has applied to take us forward and continue to pray for the Vestry and everyone involved in bringing the vacancy process to a successful conclusion. There's still much to do in the coming weeks and months as we carry out interviews and make choices. There is now hope of bringing our vacancy to an end in the next few months.

We've still also got much to do to make the Rectory ready for a new priest, so please pray for the Vestry as we tackle this task too.

Sad News

We have lost two significant members of our congregation over the last two days before the publication of this magazine.
