In Memory of William (Bill) Watt



Bill was a loyal member of our congregation for many years. It was only in the last two or three years that infirmity led him to move to a care home near Ayr to be near his son Graham.

His funeral was held in the lovely setting of Masonhill Crematorum on the edge of Ayr and was conducted by the Revd Paul Russell, a friend of his son. Paul and Pat Hindle and Kevin Wilbraham were there to take part in the celebration of his life and to show our appreciation for all he had been to St Cyprian's. His ashes will be interred in the Memorial Garden, next to his late wife, Joyce, after the 10.30am service on the day this magazine is published, Sunday 31st August 2025.

Our former Rector, Les, knew him well and was keen to write an appreciation from his

perspective, which is reproduced here.

Bill had been a loyal member and Eucharistic Assistant at St. Cyprian's for many years. Most people will remember Bill as a quiet guy, who "oversaw" the early service, but his life was far from quiet and ordinary.

Bill was brought up in Maryhill during the second world war, a time of struggle for everyone in Glasgow. He left school at 14 and took up an apprenticeship as a joiner in the shipyards. He qualified, and met his wife Joyce in those days, and after marriage they set up home in Possilpark and became great members of St. Matthew's church there. In the early days of their marriage, Bill continued to study at evening classes, then trained full time to be a woodwork teacher.

Bill and Joyce adopted two sons, with whom they maintained a great relationship throughout their lives. Graham lives in Ayr and Stephen (I think that is his name) lives in

South Wales.

Bill got a job as a woodwork teacher at the "Ragged School" in Kirkintilloch, and they bought their house in Kirkintilloch soon after, a house they kept, even while overseas, right up to the last year or so.

After a few years teaching, Bill applied to a government sponsored scheme to provide teachers overseas, and originally got a posting in Malawi. This however, fell through, although their car was already on its way on a cargo ship, and had to be sold at the quay when it arrived! Instead he got a posting as an FE lecturer in joinery in the United Arab Emirates, where he and Joyce (and the children when not at boarding school) lived for some years.

While in the UAE the Queen and Prince Phillip visited, and Bill and the metal work lecturer made pearl boxes for them as gifts.

After the UAE placement had run its course, Bill got a posting in Mombassa in Kenya, and again spent several years there.

On return from Kenya, Bill took a post of joinery lecturer in Fraserburgh in North East Scotland, a post he held for 17 years right up to retiring. In the latter couple of years, he ran the college course for adults with a learning disability — he reckoned it was the best working years of his life.

On retirement, Bill and Joyce returned to Kirkintilloch to live for the rest of their lives, apart from his final years when he went into care.

Retirement saw Bill develop a number of interests. He met the landlord in a local pub, who, when Bill was complaining that the only prospect for old people was playing bowls, suggested they go "Munro Bagging." (As you will know from Janet's exploits reported in the last magazine, that's climbing Scottish mountains over 3000ft.) Bill completed 28 of them, and

while still able, loved walking. He also loved watching war films, and visiting older bookshops in the West end of Glasgow – something he did every Saturday he could.

Joyce took ill with cancer in 2017, and on the 17th March 2018 she went into hospital and never returned home. It was a remarkable event – it was the weekend of the Beast from the East, and all Bill's neighbours gathered to dig out the snow so the ambulance could get to their house.

Bill continued, but struggled through Covid, becoming more and more stuck at home, and never recovered, leading up to going into care and his sad death.

So, in summary, Bill was a quiet man, a hugely skilled craftsman, a man of traditional views, an incredibly loyal man, and a good friend. His time had come to an end, but those of us who knew him well will hold his memory in high regard.

Saint Ninian Declaration

The signing of the Saint Ninian Declaration between the Scottish Episcopal Church and the Catholic Church in Scotland will take place in Edinburgh on Tuesday 16th September 2025 – the Feast of St Ninian.

The Declaration supports a deepening relationship between Episcopalians and Roman Catholics in Scotland, allowing both to work more closely together while acknowledging that there are distinct differences between the two churches.

The historic declaration of friendship will be signed at the capital's two 'St Mary's' cathedrals. The first part of the signing will take place at St Mary's Catholic Cathedral in York Place, and the second part at St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Palmerston Place.

The day will include a Symposium on the history of the relationship between the Catholic and Episcopal churches in Scotland.

This event will start at 2pm at St Mary's Catholic Cathedral, and the participants will be:

- Professor Gerry Carruthers, Francis Hutcheson Professor of Scottish Literature at the University of Glasgow, who will be in the chair;
- Michael Russell, Honorary Professor at the University of Glasgow and a former Cabinet Secretary for Education in the Scottish Government;
- Scott Spurlock, Professor of Scottish and Early Modern Christianities at the University of Glasgow and President of the Scottish Church History Society;
- Rev Canon Charlotte Methuen, Professor of Ecclesiastical History at the University of Glasgow and Scottish Episcopal Church Inter-Church Relations Convener.

At 4pm, the Declaration will be signed at St Mary's Catholic Cathedral by Archbishop Leo Cushley on behalf of the Conference of Bishops of the Catholic Church in Scotland and by the Most Rev Mark Strange, Bishop of Moray, Ross & Caithness and Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church. The Archbishop and the Primus will then move on to an Evensong service at 5.30pm at St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral, where the second signing will take place.

Archbishop Leo Cushley said: "This declaration is not only for us, but for the people of Scotland whom we are called to serve. By deepening the friendship, we strengthen our common witness to the Gospel in a world that longs for hope and reconciliation. True friendship does not demand uniformity, but grows through honesty, trust, and love.

"As we sign this declaration, we are saying to our people: let us walk together as brothers and sisters in Christ. Let our unity in Christ be a sign of God's love for all. May this moment encourage us to look outward, shoulder to shoulder, as friends and partners in mission."

Bishop Mark Strange said: "We sign this declaration on the feast day of St Ninian remembering the saint who first carried the Gospel to this land.

"Through this act we in the Scottish Episcopal and Roman Catholic Churches are committing to walk forward together as friends, on the same journey of faith that Ninian started over a thousand years ago.

"It gives us an opportunity to focus on what we share, and to trust that Christ calls us all to listen, to learn, and to serve this land as descendants of Ninian, side by side."

All are welcome to attend the signings.



World Ampersand Day

While looking for something to fill this space in the magazine, I came across a list of World or International Days, one of which is the title above and is observed on 8th September.

Chaz DeSimone, an artist who loves to use the ampersand, claims to have been the

founder of the day about ten years ago.

The ampersand, also known as the 'and sign', is the symbol '&' used in place of the word 'and', It originated as a ligature of the letters of the word et (Latin for "and") and it is thought to be over 2000 years old.

Traditionally in English, when spelling aloud, any letter that could also be used as a

word in itself (A, I, and O) was referred to by the Latin expression *per se* ('by itself'). The character &, when used by itself as opposed to more extended forms such as &c., was similarly referred to as 'and *per se* and'. This was routinely slurred to 'ampersand', and was recorded as having entered common English usage by 1837.
